Lady Day in Harvest

The cycle of seasons and feast in the Church's year both point to heaven and keep us grounded on earth. We are reminded in the most solemn and sacred liturgy of the year, the Easter Vigil, that “all time belongs to Him”; that is to say, to God. (*Blessing of the Paschal Candle*)

“In the cycle of the year, as she celebrates the mysteries of Christ, the Church also venerates with particular love the Blessed Mother of God, Mary, and proposes to the devotion of the faithful the Memorials of the Martyrs and other Saints.” (*From the introduction of the Roman Missal, on the Calendar.*)

The Old Testament teaches us that “seven times a day I praise you” (*Psalms 118 (119): 164*), but Jesus tells us to “pray all the time”, and St Paul tells us to “rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.” (*1 Thessalonians 5:16-18*) The Letter to the Hebrews says “Let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God” (*Hebrews 13:15*).

This presents to us a very different idea from that of simply “saying prayers”, and requires a totally different attitude to life and prayer.

Part of our prayer is most certainly to be found in the celebration of Mass and in other forms of prayers that we say. However, that cannot be the whole of the story.

Central to this understanding of prayer is the idea of living in the presence of Christ, and meditating on the Assumption of Our Lady might give us an insight into this. Mary was assumed into heaven that she might be with her divine Son for all eternity. However, we know that during his life on earth, she was regularly with him. “There is no part in the history of Jesus but Mary has her part in it” (*Blessed John Henry Newman, in his devotions for the Way of the Cross.*) For us too, if we are to pray continually, we need to be close to him, not just when we are ‘saying prayers’ but all the time.

Mary, then offers us a school for prayer, a way of prayer in which we can speak to Jesus and listen to him: “the kind of talk friends have with one another, or perhaps the way a servant speaks with his master, asking for some kindness or apologizing for some failure, or telling him about some matter of business and asking for his advice”. (*St Ignatius of Loyola, Spiritual Exercises §54*)

“Lady Day in Harvest” reminds us of the continuing cycle of the year, and a time when we reap the blessings of the fields. Before the days of industrialization, it was a season of hard labour; even the

children were put to work in the fields. That is why there is a long school holiday at this time of year.

It is worth keeping in mind that the origin of the word ‘holiday’ is ‘Holy Day’, and in our modern parlance, a Holy Day is one on which we particularly are careful to come to Mass. But what day is not holy? Is there a day that was not made by the Lord? If we should be praying ‘all the time’, there cannot be a day in which we do not pray. There is no day in the year in which the Church does not pray.

Every day is holy in that it is a gift from God; part of his divine creation. But yet each day needs to be made holy by prayer and good works. God has sanctified each day by his loving gift. We need to sanctify each day by our life of faith.

Thursday of this week is a ‘Holy Day’, and extra opportunities are made available to be at Mass that day. Every Thursday is a special day here at St Gregory's as we have the opportunity to spend time in adoration before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament.

The opportunity for adoration comes from the reality that the celebration of Mass is a step into the eternity of heaven, and the abiding presence of Jesus in the tabernacle is the eternal continuity of the Mass, and the localised presence of the sacrifice of Christ on Calvary.

Although the Old Testament speaks of praising God seven times a day, we find in Deuteronomy a way of helping us to be closer to God all the time. “Hear, O Israel: The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. Keep these words I am commanding you today in your heart. Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise. Bind them as a sign on your hand, fix them as an emblem on your forehead, and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates” (*Deuteronomy 6:4-9*).

The Jewish Law interpreted this in a literal way. The spiritual meaning of this is that we should think about God, and talk to our children about Him. In keeping them in our heart, we are praying, when we are at home or when we are away, when we are in bed or when we are up. When we trace the sign of the Cross with our hand we are reminding ourselves of our Baptism, and the emblem on our forehead comes from when we were ‘sealed with the Holy Spirit’ at our Confirmation. When we go through the door of our home, we remember that our true home is in heaven. (*Philippians 3:20*)

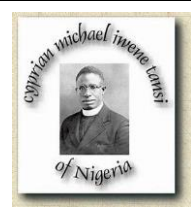
Notices of Interest

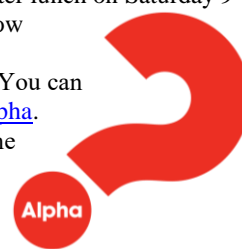

The week's prayer is one of the very few of which the Latin text was changed for the most recent edition of the Missal. The phrase: "taught by the Holy Spirit" was added, and reminds us of Jesus' promise that "the advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything".

However the main scriptural reference is to St Paul's letter to the Romans: "You have received a spirit of adoption. When you cry 'Abba', Father it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that

Almighty ever-living God,
whom, taught by the Holy Spirit,
we dare to call our Father,
bring, we pray, to perfection in our hearts
the spirit of adoption as your sons and daughters,
that we may merit to enter into the inheritance
which you have promised.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son
who lives and reigns with you
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint-heirs with Christ. (*Romans 8:15-17*)

We see the great wonder of our faith, that God is indeed Almighty, and yet we can address him as 'Abba', the most intimate and familial way to address our Father.

Yet, like the prodigal son, we "have sinned" and are "no longer worthy to be called" God's child, but yet we pray that like the prodigal, we may enter into the promised inheritance. (*See Luke 15:11-32*)

Scripture Readings 11th August 2019, 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

The Wisdom of Solomon was the last book of the Old Testament to be written. It was written in Greek, not Hebrew, so not in the Septuagint nor therefore in the Protestant Bible. The final chapters meditate on the Exodus, contrasting the woes visited on the Egyptians at the first Passover with the gifts given by God to the Israelites.

The Psalm celebrates God's faithfulness, power and wisdom, justifying our confidence in him.

The 2nd readings in August from Hebrews describe faith, which gives assurance to our hopes. Abraham is the prime example of a man of faith: he obeyed God's command to go to a new land; he believed God's promise that he and Sarah would have a child in their old age; and he passed the supreme test of faith when God

asked him to sacrifice his only son, Isaac. God's last minute reprieve for Isaac is seen as a return from the dead.

In Luke's Gospel, following the parable we heard last week about the rich man building a bigger barn, Jesus assures us that we will be given all the resources we need to meet the Lord's demands. He then urges us to have faith and to be prepared.

Psalm Response: **Happy the people the Lord has chosen as his own.**

(Wis 18:6-9 Ps 32(33):1-22 Heb 11:1-2,8-19 Lk 12:32-48)

October — Mission Month

Pope Francis has written in his message for World Mission Day this October about Christ's command to proclaim the Good News: "This missionary mandate touches us personally: I am a mission, always; you are a mission, always; every baptized man and woman is a mission. People in love never stand still: they are drawn out of themselves; they are attracted and attract others in turn; they give themselves to others and build relationships that are life-giving. As far as God's love is concerned, no one is useless or insignificant. Each of us is a mission to the world, for each of us is the fruit of God's love. Even if parents can betray their love by lies, hatred and infidelity, God never takes back his gift of life. From eternity he has destined each of his children to share in his divine and eternal life (*see Ephesians 1:3-6*).

This life is bestowed on us in baptism, which grants us the gift of faith in Jesus Christ, the conqueror of sin and death. Baptism gives us rebirth in God's own image and likeness, and makes us members of the Body of Christ, which is the Church. In this sense, baptism is truly necessary for salvation for it ensures that we are always and

everywhere sons and daughters in the house of the Father, and never orphans, strangers or slaves. What in the Christian is a sacramental reality – whose fulfilment is found in the Eucharist – remains the vocation and destiny of every man and woman in search of conversion and salvation. For baptism fulfils the promise of the gift of God that makes everyone a son or daughter in the Son. We are children of our natural parents, but in baptism we receive the origin of all fatherhood and true motherhood: no one can have God for a Father who does not have the Church for a mother (*see Saint Cyprian, De Cath. Eccl., 6*)."

There are many ways in which the mission of the Church can be accomplished. A wise priest once said that no one was argued into heaven, only loved into heaven. Inviting someone to a meal is a good sign of love, and there is an offer of a free meal at the Alpha course!

St John tells us that three of the apostles came from the city of Bethsaida (Peter, Andrew and Philip) (*John 1:44*). We know that Bethsaida was on the shores of the Sea of Galilee but its exact location has been debated by experts for many years.



Recent archaeology has made a significant discovery. During the summer a mosaic floor and carved stones have been discovered, and the building has been identified as the church which was described by Bishop Willibald in the year 725 as having been built over the house of Peter and Andrew.

This discovery confirms that the location of Bethsaida is the current El-Araj. It provides yet more evidence of the accuracy of the Gospels. There are some who dismiss the whole of the Bible as fiction; even denying that Jesus ever existed, but here we have modern archaeology supporting the evidence of the Gospels.

By knowing the Scriptures better we can be more able to explain to sceptics and dis-believers that our faith is not a fantasy, but that modern science agrees with what we read in the Bible
