# The Ordination of a Priest

It has been 45 years since the last time a parishioner of St Gregory's was ordained to the Priesthood in this diocese; that was Fr Michael Bingham SJ; since then we have been honoured to host a number of ordinations, and next Saturday Deacon David Donaghue will be ordained in the Cathedral.

The ceremonies of ordination are all of great significance, and you will see a number of actions that indicate aspects of priesthood.

The invocation of the Holy Spirit and the intercession of the saints are an important foundation of the ordination. It is moving to see the candidate for priesthood lying prostrate on the floor, indicating that all the priest does is empowered by the Holy Spirit and supported by the prayers of the saints.



The Bishop and everyone else kneels in prayer to show that we pray in union with the whole company of heaven.

Prayer forms a vital part of the life of the priest, and his priesthood begins with prayer. However, there is a great more to priesthood, and the prayerful support of his parish is every bit as important as his own prayer as he has to spend time in many other tasks in the busy day.

The laying on of hands indicates the giving of priestly authority handed down from the Apostles, but also shared in the universal priesthood. No priest is ordained to a solitary ministry, but shares in the Diocesan priesthood or in that of a religious community or an ordinariate. It is always impressive to see not only the Bishop but also all the other priests present sharing in the laying on of hands. This speaks loudly of the community of the priesthood.



At Baptism we are all anointed with Sacred Chrism; the holy oil which is blessed by the Bishop each year at the Holy Thursday Mass of Chrism. At Confirmation we are anointed again; both these anointings are on the head. At ordination the anointing is on the hands, and the hands of the priest are anointed that his hand will bring blessing, forgiveness and call down the Holy Spirit.



The giving of a chalice and paten speak of the authority of the priest to celebrate Mass, and following the ordination, Fr David will celebrate his first Mass at St Gregory's next Sunday at 11.00.



We are all aware that we have fewer priests than in past years, and we should be praying that all those whom God is calling to priesthood will respond to that call. Pray too for those who are preparing for ordination, and today for those being ordained Deacon at Palazzola from the English College in Rome

## **SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION**

**<u>Baptism Preparation:</u>** The next Baptism Preparation will be at 7.00 pm on Monday  $8^{th}$  July in the Sacristy.

<u>First Holy Communion — 2020</u> For a variety of reasons we will have to limit the number of children in the preparation programme for First Holy Communion in 2020. This will initially be done on a "first come, first served" basis, following the beginning of registration which will be on 8<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> September after either Mass. No registrations will be accepted until then. The main preparation sessions will take place on seven Saturdays leading to First Holy Communion in May 2020.

**Alpha in the Autumn** The present "Alpha" course is nearing its end, and the dates have been fixed for the next, which will be in the autumn, starting on 17<sup>th</sup> September and running in Tuesday evenings until 3<sup>rd</sup> December. Many people have spoken of how this has revitalised their faith; please think about joining if you haven't already!

In the liturgy of Baptism there are six questions that are put to the parents and godparents just before the pouring of water. The first three are a renunciation of evil, the second three are a declaration of Christian faith.

The same elements are found in this prayer, although in the reverse order. We pray that those who profess the Christian faith may reject everything that is opposed to it. We can understand that we are praying to be faithful to our Baptism.

O God, who show the light of your truth to those who go astray, so that they may return to the right path, give all who for the faith they profess are accounted Christians the grace to reject whatever is contrary to the name of Christ and strive after all that does it .honour

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

However, the prayer is not just for ourselves; it is speaks of 'those who go astray'. We all probably know people who have chosen a different way of life, or for whom the 'cares of this world or the lure of wealth' (*Matthew 13:22*) have separated themselves from the Church; or who have rejected the Church because of the Church's failure in some way.

As we pray that we may 'strive after all that does it (Christ's name) honour', we pray that we may in instrumental in finding the lost sheep.

## Scripture Readings 14th July 2019, 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

The book of Deuteronomy, the "second law", evolved over many centuries. It restates the Jewish Law and the covenant God made with Abraham. Our reading starts with an imperative, but this follows "if": "you will prosper if" you choose to follow God's law. And God's Law is not difficult to find: it is written "in their hearts". Put the covenant into practice, and so choose life, not death.

The psalm implores God to save him from unmerited suffering. The reference in an omitted verse to "vinegar to drink" and the expectation that "God will save Zion" led Christians to think of Messiah – Christ.

In this beautiful hymn from Colossians Paul spells out the awesome reality of Christ: "Christ Jesus is the image of the unseen

God". We know God through Jesus. Jesus is fully human in the way God intended all humanity to be, and so He shows us the way to God. But reconciliation comes with a proviso: "that you continue in the faith".

Jesus has rejoiced and given thanks with the 70 disciples for their successful mission. He then responds to a sincere questioner by updating the Jewish Law to what was originally intended. Everyone is our neighbour. The priest and the Levite were more concerned with ritual purity than with love.

Psalm Response: Seek the Lord, you who are poor, and your hearts will revive.

In the presence of God, during a prayerful reading of the text, it is good to ask, for example: "Lord, what does this text say to me? What is it about my life that you want to change by this text? What troubles me about this text? Why am I not interested in this? Or perhaps: What do I find pleasant in this text? What is

it about this word that moves me? What attracts me? Why does it attract me?" When we make an effort to listen to the Lord, temptations usually arise. One of them is simply to feel troubled or burdened, and to turn away. Another common temptation is to think about what the text means for other people, and so avoid applying it to our own life. It can also happen that we look for excuses to water

down the clear meaning of the text. Or we can wonder if God is demanding too much of us, asking for a decision which we are not yet prepared to make. This leads many people to stop taking pleasure in the encounter with God's word; but this would mean forgetting that no one is more patient than God our Father, that no one is more understanding and willing to wait. He always invites us to take a step forward, but does not demand a full response if we are not yet ready. He simply asks that we sincerely look at our life and

present ourselves honestly before him, and that we be willing to continue to grow, asking from him what we ourselves cannot as yet achieve.

## **Pastoral Area Day of Reflection**

Over 40 people attended the day with every parish represented, 10 from Rushden, 10 from Wellingborough, 10 from Weston Favell, 8 from St Gregory's, 3 from Billing; 4 priests and one deacon. We reflected on ways of working together better as a pastoral area, and after seeing a presentation on video of Bishop Peter, in small groups, we reflected on the good things that are happening in the parishes of our Pastoral Area. Among the things that were mentioned was the Bible Timeline courses, Alpha, the support for the Hope Centre and food-banks, ecumenical groups, the work of the Legion of Mary and SVP, the variety and diversity of churches and the contribution of the Ordinariate, small communities, work with children and young people, our freedom to worship and that we are having this day, moving forward as a Church.

Over lunch we each were invited to find out more about anything that had been spoken of that we did not already know about. In the afternoon we looked as specific projects that might be undertaken, including video-linking all our churches, ways of

improving parish and pastoral area communications, regular and frequent (3 or 4 times a year) pastoral area gatherings including a meal together and further development of youth ministry.

Out of this meeting will grow a new Pastoral Area Pastoral Council, and from this meeting will come the initial agenda. High on this agenda will be initiatives for mission, both those already in progress and new ideas. Linked to this will be new forms of pastoral ministry following a plan run by the Diocese called "Mandated Pastoral Ministry" which will be authorised by the Diocese, following training provided by the Diocese.

We had to end at 4.00, as advertised, but the way in which many people stayed behind to talk to each other indicates that this day was both welcomed and appreciated, and that the proposal to have further meetings was received with applause!

Many thanks to everyone who came, to the many people who helped arrange the day, and above all, to Avril Baigent who led the day and kept us enthused and on-task.
