
St Oscar Romero

Oscar Arnulfo Romero was born on the feast of the Assumption of Our Lady in 1917, one of eight children. At the age of 13 he became aware of his vocation and entered the junior seminary. He completed his formation for Priesthood in Rome and was ordained in 1942.

After 25 years working in parishes in El Salvador he was chosen to be secretary to the Bishops' Conference, and he also became the editor of the diocesan newspaper, which under his leadership became noticeably conservative. In 1970 he was ordained Bishop, and in 1977 was appointed Archbishop of San Salvador, much to the disappointment of many of the clergy who saw him as reactionary and would not be supportive of their commitment to the poor. The government saw him as a “safe pair of hands”.

Just a month after his appointment to San Salvador, a friend of his, Fr Rutilio Grande SJ was assassinated by a death squad. The Archbishop said of this: “When I looked at Rutilio lying there dead I thought, ‘If they have killed him for doing what he did, then I too have to walk the same path.’”

From then onwards, Archbishop Romero would see the situation from the side of the victims. As part of his support for victims, he opened a legal aid centre and began documenting all killings and disappearances. Each week he preached a sermon over the radio using a station run by the Church. He was able to do this every week except when the station was bombed. In this broadcast he listed all those who had been murdered, disappeared or been tortured in the

past week — it was regarded as the programme which had the largest listenership in the country.

This was in the era that “Liberation Theology” was getting a bad reputation, being accused of following Karl Marx more than Jesus! It was alleged that there were priests who were members of armed militia opposing the government. While being totally committed to the preferential option for the poor, he had no sympathy for armed rebellion.

He knew that his forthright opposition to the government was dangerous. Friends suggested he should have a bodyguard, to which he replied: “Why should the shepherd have protection when his sheep are still prey to wolves?”

He knew that he was likely to be killed, and accepted this calmly. On 24th March 1980, while celebrating Mass he was shot through the heart by a sniper. On the previous day he had made a broadcast in which he had asked the soldiers to stop, killing innocent civilians.

After his funeral the army opened fire on the mourners, killing many in a crowd of over 100,000. El Salvador degenerated into civil

war in which over 75,000 people were killed.

Today in St Peter's Square, Pope Francis will declare him a saint. He has already inspired many to work for a more equal world and a fairer distribution of wealth.

“It is not God's will for some to have everything and others to have nothing. That cannot be of God. God's will is that all his children be happy.”

Scripture Readings 14th October 2018, 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

The last of the Old Testament books to be written, the Wisdom of Solomon was written to encourage Jews living in the rational Greek culture of Alexandria. Today's reading is part of a speech ascribed to Solomon, describing what Wisdom is, and why we should seek her. Solomon prayed and was given wisdom which he sees as "a breath of the power of God", "a reflection of eternal light", "an image of God's goodness". And so to be desired above all riches.

The psalm, attributed to Moses, compares God's awesome eternity to the shortness of Moses' and our lives, asking God for wisdom, so that our work be firmly based. Filling our short lives with God's love is all we need to be full of joy.

The Letter to the Hebrews has insisted Jesus, a man like other men, is capable of leading into God's rest those who hear and obey

We have a double prayer today; first that God's grace "go before us and follow after", and second, that we make be always determined to carry out good works.

These two petitions are linked, for without God's grace we cannot do anything good.

May your grace, O Lord, we pray,
at all times to go before us and follow after
and make us always determined
to carry out good works.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,
who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Jesus continues to teach on his way to Jerusalem: the rich man appears to have heard the good news, but does not have the wisdom to let go of his riches. How hard it is to do so! We cannot practise this wisdom without God's help.

CAFOD and MISSIO

Last week there was an interesting presentation from CAFOD and MISSIO. CAFOD is the Catholic Church's main agency for foreign aid and MISSIO is the umbrella agency for foreign missions, best known through the "red box" collection.

The purpose of the presentation was to illustrate the way in which these two agencies complement each other and work together. We were shown how the work of MISSIO provides the infrastructure of the Church which makes the work of distributing the aid provided by CAFOD easier and fairer because the Church already has a presence in the areas of need.

That is not to suggest that the first purpose of the presence of the Church in mission areas is simply to provide aid; the first purpose

must always be the proclamation of the Gospel. Jesus himself fed hungry people, healed the sick and cared for the outcast. The Church must do the same; this is an essential part of the mission.

CAFOD and MISSIO are natural partners. This week we have an emergency appeal for the earthquake and tsunami in Indonesia. Because of the mission work of the Church, CAFOD's partner agency, CARITAS is able to work with the Church in the dioceses of Makassar in South Sulawesi and Manado in North Sulawesi.

This makes the distribution of aid much more efficient, and means that CAFOD does not need to send large numbers of aid workers to disaster areas.
