The Spirit of Truth

The opening prayer speaks of the “Word of Truth”, and in the Gospel we hear Jesus speak of the “Spirit of Truth”. Jesus describes himself as “The Way, the Truth and the Life” (*John 14:6*), and St Paul, in a beautiful passage towards the end of his letter to the Philippians says: “Whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things . . . and the God of peace will be with you.” (*Philippians 4:8-9*)

“The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life. It is the mystery of God in himself. It is therefore the source of all the other mysteries of faith, the light that enlightens them. It is the most fundamental and essential teaching in the “hierarchy of the truths of faith”. The whole history of salvation is identical with the history of the way and the means by which the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, reveals himself to men “and reconciles and unites with himself those who turn away from sin.” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church, §234*)

What we are celebrating today; the mystery of God Himself is the central truth; the Truth of all truths. In understanding the concept of “hierarchy of truths”, it is not that some truths are “more true” than others; it is that our understanding that some truths flow from other truths. The truth of the Holy Trinity — three in one; three persons in total unity is a revelation of divine love; that “God is love” (*1 John 4:16*). This love cannot be simply the love of itself, because love is by nature inclusive. This love is manifested in God’s love for his creation, and was poured out on mankind in the person of Jesus himself. Thus the incarnation, and Jesus’ sacrificial death and resurrection form the next layer of this hierarchy of truths. Flowing on from this is the existence of the Church, the body of Christ still on earth (*See 1 Corinthians 12:27*). Through the Church, the divine love is mediated in the Sacraments, through prayer and in pastoral care.

These truths lead us on to the next; the infinite dignity of the human person. Our concern for the unborn and our opposition to abortion and euthanasia, and opposition to capital punishment as well as our involvement in the care of the marginalised and in overseas development are a direct consequence of this truth. All our moral teaching and social teaching spring from this truth.

Embracing all these truths takes us back to the Holy Trinity, and the essence of unity. The truths themselves form a unity of the Faith, and

speak to us of unity as a virtue in itself because it is of the very nature of God Himself.

It is concerning that many people speak of a “post-truth” era. The idea of “post-truth” is that what matters is not any provable reality, but how people feel about it. This was exemplified by a politician being interviewed about the growing use of food-banks, and his response that what he saw were people in growing prosperity.

President Trump said in an interview that “I don’t see any protest, I did see a small protest; very small, so a lot of this is fake news”. The reality is that tens of thousands of people actually protested.

This is the reality of what Pope Benedict XVI was frequently warning us about; what he calls “relativism”. Truth is limited to what the individual sees or feels.

An attempt to bring a private prosecution against Boris Johnson for “lying” about £350 million a week being given to the European Union was rejected by the High Court, and although their reason has not yet been given, the clear message is that it is acceptable for politicians to lie.

“Post-truth” is not a recent idea:

“in the big lie there is always a certain force of credibility; because the broad masses of a nation are always more easily corrupted in the deeper strata of their emotional nature than consciously or voluntarily; and thus in the primitive simplicity of their minds they more readily fall victims to the big lie than the small lie, since they themselves often tell small lies in little matters but would be ashamed to resort to large-scale falsehoods.”

These words were published in 1925, having been dictated by Adolf Hitler while he was in prison. It is concerning that this book, “Mien Kampf” has recently become a best-seller in Germany.

Our feast today in which we honour the very nature of God Himself is not just a recognition of a particular teaching of the Church; it speaks to us about our human situation. It would be good for our politicians to take note of this,

The Catechism of the Catholic Church speaks of the importance of truth (Paragraphs 2464 to 2513). We are all accountable to the Truth.

If truth itself is set at no value, we set God at no value, and then we have nothing worth valuing at all.

St Paul wrote to the Ephesians: “In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit” (*Ephesians 1:13-14*).

St John tells us that “the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of the Father’s only Son, full of grace and truth” (*John 1:14*).

This prayer echoes the words of Scripture.

God our Father, who by sending into the world the Word of truth and the Spirit of sanctification made known to the human race your wondrous mystery, grant us, we pray, that in professing the true faith, we may acknowledge the Trinity of eternal glory and adore your Unity, powerful in majesty.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The fullness of the mystery of God is beyond our human capability to fully understand but in passages of Scripture such as these, we are given pointers to help us.

The word “acknowledge”, which is so much less than “understand” is contrasted with “adore”, which is our appropriate response to the mystery of the Holy Trinity. The alliteration in the Latin text makes this much clearer.

Scripture Readings 16th June 2019, Trinity, Year C

Written after the return from the exile in Babylon, the Wisdom books contain the practical knowledge of both the Israelites and the peoples around them, accumulated over two thousand years. Wisdom is the art of living a life at peace with God and with other people. It was developed by reflecting on the great questions: life, death, suffering, love, evil, relationships. It was seen to be a universal guide for living, and so given by God. So Wisdom came to be seen as a person – the caring, feminine side of God, existing from all eternity. In today’s reading from Proverbs Wisdom speaks of sharing God’s delight in His work at the beginning of creation.

The Psalm expresses our amazement at the dignity the infinite God has given to mankind’s finite nature in his wonderful creation.

In his letter to the Romans Paul insists that being justified, or made “at peace” with God, means that our previous alienation from God is overcome. God’s love “poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit” has brought us into an intimate relationship with God, but we confidently hope in a more glorious intimacy in the future.

No wonder Jesus says in John’s Gospel “I have yet many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now”. The Spirit gives us understanding.

Corpus Christi Procession at Great Billing

There is a record of the Corpus Christi procession at Billing in 1875, at which the Bishop Amherst, the second Bishop of Northampton presided. The report in the “Tablet” says that there were over 1,000 people present. It was described: “It was a most glorious sight, for all the way of its long course was amongst large trees celebrated even here for their size and beauty; and the Blessed Sacrament was treated with the utmost respect by the villagers, who were Protestants, and devotion, of course, by

Catholics; and to see the groups kneeling about as it passed was a sight that will, I know, be long remembered here”

The procession has continued down the years, and is now the occasion for all those who have received Holy Communion for the first time to walk in front of the Blessed Sacrament, and it always an occasion of great joy. This year it will be next Sunday, 23rd June, and the procession begins at 3.00 pm. All our First Holy Communion children are invited to take part, as is everyone. Remember this is next Sunday!

God “sends His message on earth” and “His word runs swiftly” — says the Psalm (*147:4*). The Word of God runs, it is dynamic, it waters every terrain on which it falls. And what is its force? Saint Luke tells us that the human word becomes effective — not thanks to rhetoric, which is the art of good speaking —, but thanks to the Holy Spirit, who is the *δυναμις* of God, the power of God, His force, which has the power to purify the word, to make it bearer of life.

For example, in the Bible there are stories, human words, but what is the difference between the Bible and a history book? The difference is that the words of the Bible are taken from the Holy Spirit who gives a very great force, a different force, and who helps us so that that word is seed of sanctity, seed of life, effective. When the Spirit

visits the human word it becomes dynamic, like “dynamite,” namely, able to light hearts and break schemes, resistances, and walls of division, opening new ways and expanding the boundaries of the people of God.

He who gives vibrant and incisive voice to our very fragile human word is solely the Holy Spirit, through whom the Son of God was generated; the Spirit that anointed and sustained Him in the mission; the Spirit thanks to whom He chose His Apostles and guaranteed to them proclamation, perseverance, and fruitfulness, as He also guarantees it today to our proclamation.
