The progress of Lent

We were reminded a couple of weeks ago about the character of Lent in the words of the Second Vatican Council, and that there is a twofold purpose in these weeks before Easter. The first mentioned is a time of preparation for Baptism, the second is as a time of penance. The length of forty days is derived from the time Our Lord spent in the wilderness and his time of temptation, but that is not what gives the season its character, only its duration.

As time went by there were fewer adult Baptisms, and the preparation aspects of Lent were overshadowed by penitential activities. However it is of value to see the way in which the Sunday readings take us through the season.

The first Sunday in Lent always gives us the account of the temptations of Christ and reminds us of Our Lord's forty-day fast, but the second Sunday is always an account of the Transfiguration. The preface to the Eucharistic Prayer for today helps us to see the significance of this: “After he had told the disciples of his coming death, on the holy mountain he manifested to them his glory, to show, even by the testimony of the law and the prophets that the passion leads to the glory of the resurrection”.

On the third Sunday of Lent the gospels are different for each year, but in each year there are messages encouraging repentance, which is an important part in the preparation for Baptism.

The fourth Sunday takes us to a growing understanding our the relationship we have with God; this year through the parable of the repentant son (usually known as the ‘prodigal son’), who “came to his senses” while reduced to being a pig-man on a farm. (The connection with mothers [Mothering Sunday] came from the medieval era when the passage from Galatians which speaks of “The Jerusalem above, she is free, and she is our mother” (*Galatians 4:26*) — this passage no longer forms part of the Sunday readings.)

The fifth Sunday speaks to us about resurrection to eternal life; in year A through the raising of Lazarus, in year B through the teaching about the grain of wheat falling on the ground and dying and yielding a rich harvest. This year we will read about the woman caught in the act of adultery whose punishment should have been death by stoning, but had her life given back by Jesus — another way of understanding resurrection through the forgiveness of sins.

The following Sunday is Palm Sunday, and brings us to Holy Week, but as we have journeyed through Lent we have left behind the wilderness in order better to understand the true significance of our Lord's Passion, Death and Resurrection. In our Lenten penances, we must not forget this, which we are told is the first purpose of the season.

Pastoral Area Councils

Last Saturday Bishop Peter called a meeting which took place at Thornton College near Buckingham to inspire our Pastoral Areas to look forwards in planning.

When Pastoral Areas were set up, their first task was to consider how, in each local area the work of the Church could be maintained with fewer priests, as this is the reality for this and almost every diocese. This we have one, and the first and obvious result has been the reduction in the number of Sunday Masses in each parish. We have also established the Rosary Link prayer for vocations to the priesthood. In this we have sought to keep going as much as we could of the existing structures and ways of working to which we have become accustomed.

When Bishop Peter instigated ‘Together in Faith’, one of the objectives was the identifying and training of suitable lay-people

for different ministries within the Church. This is not simply so that we can “keep the show on the road”, and Pastoral Area Councils are tasked with becoming more outward-looking.

First, we are asked to identify those things that we do well, and at the meeting those from our pastoral area filled a whole page of achievements. However, we are also asked to look to the opportunities that we have which we may not have yet undertaken or not yet even considered.

This is a very encouraging move — the slogan ‘From Maintenance to Mission’ is one with which we have become familiar, and what the Bishop is asking is exactly in line with our vision to become “a truly thriving Catholic community, confidently and humbly proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ”, not just for our parish or pastoral area, but across the whole diocese.

Luke, whose account of the transfiguration we read today is the only evangelist to speak of the purpose of the climbing of the mountain as “to pray”. Our prayer today links the transfiguration and the command to “listen to him” with the Lenten preparation for Baptism as we pray that “spiritual sight” may be made pure.

The connecting of the words “nourish” and “word” indicate a Eucharistic overtone.

O God, who have commanded us to listen to your beloved Son, be pleased, we pray, to nourish us inwardly by your word, that with spiritual sight made pure, we may rejoice to behold your glory.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Inward nourishment is not merely through receiving the word through our ears, though that is in itself important. Our inward nourishment is also derived from receiving the Word made flesh made bread for us in the Eucharist.

The glory that we pray we may behold is not the momentary glory of the transfiguration, but the eternal glory on the Resurrection. However, on our earthly pilgrimage we are sometimes given a foretaste of the glory of heaven, just as Peter, James and John were given theirs on the Mount of Transfiguration.

Scripture Readings 17th March 2019, 2nd Sunday in Lent, Year C

While Abram was wandering round Canaan before 1500 BC, his kinsman, Lot was captured in Sodom. Abram and his allies freed him. To celebrate this victory, bread and wine were brought out and Abram was blessed by Melchizedek, Priest-King of Salem, traditionally identified with Jerusalem. Then the Lord promised Abram a land of his own, an heir, and numberless descendants. A firebrand signifying the Lord's presence, pass between the halves of the animals, a common way at that time of confirming a covenant.

The psalm asserts complete confidence that God will not abandon but will rescue us, while asking for guidance and protection.

Paul wrote to the Philippians about 60 AD. A devout Jew and Pharisee, Paul has nevertheless concluded that righteousness does not come from the Law but through faith in God, as shown by

Abraham. As citizens of heaven we owe allegiance to Christ, not Caesar. Since God will transfigure our bodies, we must not be ruled by bodily appetites but gradually transform ourselves into images of Christ.

Luke describes Jesus' appearance being changed. Moses and Elijah, representing the Law and the Prophets, are talking with him about his “exodus”, his coming passion and death. The disciples are confused, but then God tells them they must now listen to Jesus, the representatives of old Israel have departed.

Saints of the week: Patrick and Joseph

This year 17th March falls on a Sunday, and there is no liturgical celebration of St Patrick in England. However he is an important saint, not just for Ireland and the Irish.

Saint Patrick was born early in the 5th century in Britain. At the age of sixteen he was taken captive and brought to Ireland where he worked as a slave. Life was not easy for Patrick as a young man as he worked long hours on the bleak hillside minding sheep. After six years he escaped back to Britain to his family who were glad to see him return home.

Patrick became a Christian and he visited France where he continued his studies after scriptures and reflected on Christ's teaching. Near at the end of his life he put in writing his reflections on his search for God and the blessings God had given him in his life. In the Confessions of St Patrick, we read of the absolute trust Patrick had in God's loving care for him, his gratitude for the gift of faith and he rejoiced in the way God had transformed the lives of Irish men and women who became Christian on his return to the island as a missionary. Today we celebrate the great blessings entrusted on Patrick by God to bring the good news: Christ the Light of our World to our land.

He wrote: "So I am first of all a simple country person, a refugee, and unlearned. I do not know how to provide for the future. But this I know for certain, that before I was brought low, I was like a stone lying deep in the mud. Then He who is powerful came and in his mercy pulled me out, and lifted me up and placed me on the very top of the wall. That is why I must shout aloud in return to the Lord for such great good deeds of his, here and now and forever, which the human mind cannot measure."

Like him, we too are raised up, and like him, we must proclaim God's glory. St Joseph was included in the Eucharistic Prayers a few years ago; a recognition of his importance.

“Exercising his paternal care over Jesus, Saint Joseph of Nazareth, set over the Lord's family, marvellously fulfilled the office he received by grace. Adhering firmly to the mystery of God's design of salvation in its very beginnings, he stands as an exemplary model of the kindness and humility that the Christian faith raises to a great destiny, and demonstrates the ordinary and simple virtues necessary for men to be good and genuine followers of Christ. Through these virtues, this Just man, caring most lovingly for the Mother of God and happily dedicating himself to the upbringing of Jesus Christ, was placed as guardian over God the Father's most precious treasures. Therefore he has been the subject of assiduous devotion on the part of the People of God throughout the centuries, as the support of that mystical body, which is the Church.

The faithful in the Catholic Church have shown continuous devotion to Saint Joseph and have solemnly and constantly honoured his memory as the most chaste spouse of the Mother of God and as the heavenly Patron of the universal Church. For this reason Blessed Pope John XXIII, in the days of the Most Holy Second Ecumenical Council of the Vatican, decreed that Saint Joseph's name be added to the ancient Roman Canon. In response to petitions received from places throughout the world, the Supreme Pontiff Benedict XVI deemed them worthy of implementation and graciously approved them. The Supreme Pontiff FRANCIS likewise has recently confirmed them. In this the Pontiffs had before their eyes the full communion of the Saints

who, once pilgrims in this world, now lead us to Christ and unite us with him.” (*Decree from the Congregation for Divine Worship*)
