## "Love one another"

There are a number of themes that regularly occur in this newsletter, and the words from today's Gospel link them all together. Christianity is a "package deal", not a "pick and mix"! The starting point is the Lord's absolute command: "Love one another". It is a mistake to limit this to within the Christian community since the Lord also commanded us to make disciples of all people. This love must therefore be as unlimited as is the love of Jesus himself. (See 1 Corinthians 12:12-30 and Matthew 28:19.)

These themes are not in any particular order of importance; they are all important. However, just as the human body is made up of many parts, and each part has it particular function, so within the Church, each person will have a major focus on one particular area of importance, while recognising the importance of those areas in which he or she will not be directly involved.

In highlighting some of those areas of importance, there is no intention of diminishing those other areas which may not get a mention today.

If we truly love one another, we will not be seeking to become more wealthy than each other. The lover does not want the beloved to be poorer than the lover. This means that the relentless quest for increased personal wealth cannot be compatible the Christian life. While a world in which everyone has exactly equal wealth is impossible, the growing inequality of our country should be a matter of concern for all of us. Academic research has shown that there is a direct correlation between inequality and many social evils such as infant mortality, shorter life expectancy, mental illness, crime and many other problems. (See the 'Equality Trust' for their research on this.)

This must inevitably involve is in the murky world of politics, but this is not a 'party political' issue; in this country we have seen the divide between rich and poor growing under every government, whatever its political colour. It is first-of-all a moral issue which relates to the life of the early Church as described in the Acts of the Apostles: "None of their members was ever in want, as all those whom owned land or houses would sell them and bring the money from the sale of them to present to the Apostles; it was then distributed to any who might be in need." (Acts 4:34-35) This was clearly not an absolute rule; in Corinth Paul lodged in the house of Aquila and Priscilla (Acts 18:1-3), but it indicates a mode of living that was not dominated by self-interest.

For some people this concern may be expressed in political involvement, and it is important that committed Christians should

stand for Parliament and local government. (The electoral system that the British Government uses for the European Elections with party lists is very poor; most European countries have a system where votes are for candidates, not for parties.) For other people it will be direct involvement in such work as with the Hope Centre or CAFOD.

Arising from our love for one another and recognising that God loves each one of is must be our respect for human life, from its first beginning to its natural end. While not all Christians will be pro-life campaigners, we cannot discriminate against some of God's people just because they are not yet born, or because they are terminally ill or for any other reason. Equally, on the same basis we cannot be racist or seek to deprive other humans of benefits that we enjoy.

Care for the environment is related to this; we treasure the gift of life and for the planet on which that gift is given. We want that benefit for the next generation, both that they should have life itself and also that they should be able to enjoy it in a planet free from pollution and not damaged by climate change. Not all Christians will be ecowarriors, but we should all be willing to modify our behaviour to protect the planet on which we live.

We cannot expect those who do not share the Christian faith to live by Christian standards. Our country can no longer seriously claim to be a 'Christian country' — indeed such a concept is actually meaningless, as a country itself cannot have a faith. It is the people who have faith, not the country, and at present, in terms of active Christians, we are in a minority; even more so as Catholic Christians. This means that the command of the Lord already quoted to make disciples of all nations must be particularly important. Not all Christians will have the gifts to be 'front-line' evangelists, but, for example, we can all invite a friend to come to an Alpha course.

Evangelisation takes place in many different ways; one which is of great importance is helping young people to grow in their faith, and action on equality and on care of the environment are frequently seen as important by young people, although they do not always see it as a Christian imperative. All too often the failure of adult Christians to embrace these concerns is a reason why many young people turn away from the Church. Not all Christians will be called to be catechists, but we must all support young people and their parents as they seek to help their children to grow in faith.

A further form of evangelisation is in the welcome that is given in church. Worship that is welcoming, with good music, good proclamation of the Scriptures, good preaching and all genuinely directed to God — all these themes are important.

meaning that the saving work of God was completed. For this saving work to be accomplished within us can only be totally fulfilled when the last clause of the prayer is answered and we come to the joys of eternal life, but the prayer speaks of a constant accomplishment, and connected with to intention that we should "bear much fruit", speaks of our daily Christian life.

## Scripture Readings 19th May 2019, 5th Sunday of Easter, Year C

Last week in Acts the first mission of Paul and Barnabas started. They preached in synagogues, with mixed receptions. Many Jews became Christians. But many did not, stirring up hatred and violence against the Apostles, leaving Paul for dead. Barnabas and Paul then preached to the Gentiles, showing how they could recognise God's activity in nature. Today we hear how this first mission ends, with religious leaders appointed in each church, and a report of "what God had done".

The Psalm praises the Lord's kindness and care for creation.

In Revelation the promise of salvation described last week is now accomplished. The new Jerusalem comes down adorned as a bride for her marriage with the Lamb, the union of the Messiah with the community of the elect. God dwells with men on earth, after the

"former heaven and the former earth" are replaced by a "new heaven and a new earth". God's ancient covenant is fulfilled.

In the Gospel we hear the first of Jesus' farewell discourses at the Last Supper. Jesus is sad to leave his followers. After washing the disciples' feet, Jesus draws out the meaning of this action. He predicts his coming death and gives a new commandment: love one another. The true mark of discipleship is that we "have love for one another".

Psalm Response: I will bless your name for ever, O God my King.


## Pilgrimage to Walsingham

Chaucer observed that when April, with her sweet showers comes, folk long to go on pilgrimage. We are a bit late but every year when June comes round, the Diocese of Northampton goes on pilgrimage to Walsingham, led by the Bishop.

"Pilgrimages evoke our earthly journey toward heaven and are traditionally very special occasions for renewal in prayer. For pilgrims seeking living water, shrines are special places for living the forms of Christian prayer in Church. (Catechism of the Catholic Church §2691)

In the document of Vatican II we find the clear understanding of the Church herself as on a pilgrimage (*Lumen Gentium Chapter VII*), and we, as individuals are all on a pilgrimage from cradle to beyond the grave, and, we pray, to heaven. Modern psychology often speaks of "journey".

It is a journey we make in



company; the Church is a community of faith. None of us should travel alone on our journey through life because in the Church we are all brothers and sisters, called to love one another, to serve one another and to support one another as we each make our way towards heaven.

Long before Canterbury was a place of pilgrimage; long before Our Lady appeared at Lourdes or at Knock or nearly every other holy place in the world, she came to Walsingham. The story is told in the "Pynson Ballad", named after him because he printed it in 1495, although he did not write is himself, at it is certainly older that the date of the printing. The ballad dates the foundation of the shrine to the year 1061, and became the chief place of pilgrimage in England until the martyrdom of St Thomas Becket, but still remained an important place of pilgrimage up until the destruction of the shrine under Henry VIII.

Our Diocesan Pilgrimage is on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> June, and a coach will leave from St Gregory's at 8.00 am, and will return by about 8.00 pm. There is a charge of £13 for the coach, and you will need to bring a picnic lunch.
