These are hard times for so many people. Thousands are enduring floods, forcing them to abandon their homes, and frequently with the loss of precious things; not so much the consumer goods that can be replaced, but the loss of precious photographs and other items carrying with them family memories, sometimes going back generations.

Then there are more than thousands who are affected by coronavirus; those who are ill, bereaved or have died, and those who are held in quarantine and isolation.

Beyond them, there are those whose business and employment is threatened by the disease and its epidemic.

That is just those things that the news media are telling us about. There is continued fighting in Syria and in many other places in the world; more refugees; more migrants.

The real origin of coronavirus in humans has yet to be discovered with certainty, but only a tiny number of eccentrics deny the reality of climate change, and the near-certainty that human activity is the chief cause of that change. Human activity is equally the cause of war.

In today's first reading we see the primal sin, again, in human activity. In the first readings at Mass on Friday and Saturday of last week, from Isaiah chapter 58, we heard about the sort of fast that God wants. This involves doing away with injustice, and links it to our support for fair trade. It involves letting the oppressed go free and links in with our care for refugees and migrants. It involves clothing the naked and giving bread to the hungry, and links in to our giving food and clothes to the Hope Centre. The fast that pleases God is not just a private affair, nor just a spiritual

effort, but is directed towards the realisation of our prayer that God's kingdom may come, and that his will may be done on earth, as it is in heaven.

Climate change is a reality; we are experiencing "once in a hundred years" events far more frequently, almost every year we see weather records being broken, and most significantly, in all this, we see then poorest and most disadvantaged suffering most. This is particularly true in the developing world. In we are to be keeping the fast that pleases God, we need to be engaging in these issues in a direct way.

Last week we saw the Court of Appeal decide that the plan to build the third runway at Heathrow was unlawful. We are told that air traffic is one of the biggest contributors to the human carbon footprint, and the approval of HS2 and other less polluting means of transport must be better than increasing air travel. It is to be hoped that passengers will be given economic incentives to travel by more environmentally friendly means, such as public transport.

For the Church, this presents issues too. Here we struggle with a shortage of parking spaces, and in some places there are suggestions that large "out of town" churches with mega-car-parks are the answer to having fewer priests. However, should the Church be paying more attention to more environmentally friendly ways of getting to Mass, such as running bus services for Mass?

Scripture Readings 1st March 2020, 1st Sunday of Lent, Year A

From Genesis we have the second and probably older description of the creation of humanity. This expresses the truth that God made us as “living beings”. By eating the forbidden fruit, man does “become like God”, able to make choices, but without the wisdom needed to choose well. Perhaps like a child’s growing self-awareness. The mischievous serpent later came to be interpreted as Satan.

This penitential psalm begs pardon for our sins, asking to be restored to grace and purity, and promising to make God's mercy known to others.

Paul has been arguing to the Romans that righteousness comes only through faith. Human beings are unable to become righteous by following the Law given to Moses, which identifies – but does not help to avoid – sin. God offers righteousness as gift, through Jesus’ obedience to his Father.

In Matthew’s Gospel the devil introduces each temptation with the words: “If you are the Son of God”, exploring what can it mean for Jesus to be “Son of God”? Is he a miracle-worker, able to satisfy all desires without effort? Is it about showy displays of power or trying to make God do what we want, in return for belief in him? Jesus dismisses Satan, showing his real power. Jesus will rule over all creation, but only through the Cross.

Actions to Live Simply :

Although in Lent, we commemorate SS Perpetua and Felicity.

“When my father in his affection for me was trying to turn me from my purpose by arguments and thus weaken my faith, I said to him, ‘Do you see this vessel—waterpot or whatever it may be? Can it be called by any other name than what it is?’ ‘No,’ he replied. ‘So also I cannot call myself by any other name than what I am—a Christian.’”

So writes Perpetua: young, beautiful, well-educated, a noblewoman of Carthage in North Africa, mother of an infant son and chronicler of the persecution of the Christians by Emperor Septimius Severus.

Perpetua’s mother was a Christian and her father a pagan. He continually pleaded with her to deny her faith. She refused and was imprisoned at 22.

In her diary, Perpetua describes her period of captivity: “What a day of horror! Terrible heat, owing to the crowds! Rough treatment by the soldiers! To crown all, I was tormented with anxiety for my baby.... Such anxieties I suffered for many days, but I obtained leave

for my baby to remain in the prison with me, and being relieved of my trouble and anxiety for him, I at once recovered my health, and my prison became a palace to me and I would rather have been there than anywhere else.”

Despite threats of persecution and death, Perpetua, Felicity—a slavewoman and expectant mother—and three companions, Revocatus, Secundulus and Saturninus, refused to renounce their Christian faith. For their unwillingness, all were sent to the public games in the amphitheater. There Perpetua and Felicity were beheaded, and the others killed by beasts.

Felicity gave birth to a girl a few days before the games commenced.

Perpetua’s record of her trial and imprisonment ends the day before the games. “Of what was done in the games themselves, let him write who will.” The diary was finished by an eyewitness.
