The Body of Christ

On the feast of Corpus Christi in 1978 Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger celebrated Mass in the Marienplatz in Munich where he was Archbishop. His homily is included in his book: “God is Near Us”, published by Ignatius Press. What follows is based on that homily.

There are three distinct components to the celebration of the feast of Corpus Christi; Standing before the Lord, Walking with the Lord and Kneeling before the Lord.

Standing before the Lord.

From the earliest days of the Church, congregations were drawn from many different backgrounds, having only one thing in common — their love and service of God revealed in the person of Jesus. In his choice of the Apostles Jesus shows that people’s backgrounds, ethnicity, education, previous life or political views are of no significance. All of them had their relationship with Jesus, and it was this, not any other quality or characteristic that bound them together.

In the letter of James and in St Paul’s letters we see that sometimes the early Church struggled with this, but it was recognised that the wealthy and the poor were beside each other; the rich must not be held in higher regard than the poor (*James 2:1-4*). St Paul tells the Corinthians not to quarrel among themselves (*1 Corinthians 1:10-13*) even though they are each different people. They are all called into fellowship with Christ. (*1 Corinthians 1:9*).

Initially the Church was concerned that each town should have only one Christian community, and all were gathered around the one bishop of that town, but as towns grew bigger and more people became Christian, the idea of parishes became established and that a town might have many different Eucharistic communities. However the original concept of the single Christian community in each town was never forgotten, and the feast of Corpus Christi where parishes join together for a single celebration is one example of this principle. Last week we celebrated the anniversary of the dedication of the Cathedral and this is an obligatory feast in every parish of the diocese, reminding us of this essential unity across the entire diocese. Together we stand before the Lord; men and women, rich and poor, clever and not-so-clever, gathered from every ethnicity and skin-colour, speaking many different languages. We celebrate this in the procession at Billing on Sunday afternoon.

We should remember this at every Mass; that we are standing together before the Lord. We do this because we are fellow-followers of the Lord. At some point in our life we, each one of us, made a

conscious decision that we are a disciple (one who learns) and that we would follow where Jesus leads us.

Walking with the Lord.

When we come to receive Holy Communion we walk in a procession (please, not a queue!); walking *to* Jesus. The Corpus Christi procession takes this one step further (or rather, many steps!). We are now not walking *to* Jesus, we are walking *with* Jesus. This is, or should be, a parable for our whole life; a walk *with* Jesus. In this the Church is offering us a new interpretation of the Exodus story, of Israel’s wandering in the wilderness. God was leading them in the form of a pillar or cloud or of fire. In this journey the people were fed with Manna “Bread of angels” (*See psalm 78/77:24-25*). Yet the Old Testament teaches us, and Jesus himself reminds us that “man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God” (*Deuteronomy 8:2-3, Matthew 4:4*). In Jesus we have the “Word made flesh” (*John 1:14*), thus we are led by Him who is both Bread and Word.

After his resurrection we have a beautiful picture of walking with the Lord on the road to Emmaus (*Luke 24:13-35*) where the disciples come to understand the mystery of Jesus’ life, death and resurrection as they walk with him. In the light of this mystery he gives us the pattern of life; how we should walk day-by-day and how our steps, our words and our actions should be guided.

Kneeling before the Lord.

At the end of the procession we kneel to receive the Lord’s blessing. Above all, we kneel in adoration. St Paul tells us of the importance of recognising the presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament (*See 1 Corinthians 11:29*), and when the Apostles recognised the risen Jesus they “fell down before him” (*Matthew 28:27*).

We too fall down in adoration before Jesus, crucified, risen, ascended and now truly present to us under the forms of bread and wine. However, this is more than simply abject servility.

We remember that Jesus himself knelt down before his disciples at the last supper and washed their feet. He said that he is “among us as one who serves” (*Luke 22:27*), and has told us that we must “wash one another’s feet” (*John 13:14*). We are required to see Jesus in those who are in need (*See Matthew 25:40*), and in this response, Jesus will be living in us.

What we experience in the Corpus Christi procession points to our daily Christian life. May we live Corpus Christi every day!

Becoming a Catholic: For adults interested in becoming a Catholic, the parish runs Journey in Faith process (RCIA). This is a well-known prayer, being used at Benediction on the Blessed Sacrament, and in terms of most of the prayers in the Missal, is relatively recent, dating from the thirteenth century. (Most date from the sixth.)

The word "Mysteries" was one of the words used by the early Church for the Mass; we pray that we may "revere the sacred mysteries" that we celebrate at every Mass.

O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament have left us a memorial of your Passion, grant, we pray, so to revere the sacred mysteries of your body and blood that we may always experience in ourselves the fruits of your redemption.

Who lives and reigns with God the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

This is what we now call "active participation" — a full, deliberate and conscious engagement with the celebration of the Mass.

In so doing, we pray that we may experience the fruits; that is to say, that in sharing in the Sacred Mysteries, we may become fruitful Christians, bearing the fruits of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control. (*Galatians 5:22*)

Scripture Readings 23rd June 2019, Corpus Christi, Year C

In Eucharistic Prayer I – the Roman canon – we hear these words just after the Consecration: "the bread and wine offered by your priest Melchizedek". Melchizedek, the Canaanite priest-king of Jerusalem, offered food and drink to Abram and his 318 retainers as they returned from victory, blessing Abram in the name of the one God they both believed in. Abram accepted Melchizedek's blessing and gave him a tithe. Their shared meal confirmed them both as God's people.

When David captured Jerusalem he took over this priest-kingship. Hence today's psalm praising David, appointed by God as a "priest for ever of the order of Melchizedek", while also asserting the dignity of the Messiah as both king and royal priest.

The author of Hebrews saw Melchizedek's priesthood as superior to the Levitical priesthood and saw Jesus, descendent of David,

with his gift of bread and wine to his disciples, as succeeding to this ancient priesthood.

Paul had told the Corinthians to stop misbehaving during the Eucharist. He then gave this earliest description we have of its institution during the last meal Christ shared with his disciples before Calvary.

Melchizedek's offering of food to Abram is echoed in the feeding of the 5,000 in the Gospel, anticipating Christ giving himself to us as heavenly food in the Eucharist.

Corpus Christi Procession at Great Billing

As Catholics we know that we are part of something much bigger than our parish or congregation; we are part of the universal Church. We must never become merely 'parochial', with our Christian experience limited to our own parish and church. The local manifestation of the Church is the Diocese, and within our diocese, parishes are grouped into 'Pastoral Areas'. Our Pastoral Area, which encompasses us, Sacred Heart at Weston Favell, Our Lady's at Billing with St Anselm's at Earls Barton, Our Lady's at Wellingborough with St Edmund Campion and St Peter's at Rushden is under the patronage of Our Lady of Perpetual Succour.

Bishop Peter has encouraged the parishes in each pastoral area to work together "confidently and humbly proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ". Our Corpus Christi procession at Billing is one way in which we pray together, walk together, witness together and grow together.

Come rain or shine, we walk with Jesus! This is the occasion for all those who have received Holy Communion for the first time to walk in front of the Blessed Sacrament, and it always an occasion of great joy. The procession begins at 3.00 pm. All our First Holy Communion children are invited to take part, as is everyone. Remember this is today!

Pastoral Area Reflection Day: July 6th

Bishop Peter has asked all Pastoral Areas to have a "Reflection Day", to consider pastoral provisions for the future. This is not to do with the deployment of priests; rather it is to do with the third part of the "Together in Faith" campaign which was the development of Lay Ministry. It is a fundamental part of every service in church that we read from the Scriptures. But this is no mere 'reading'; it is a proclamation. This requires two vital components. It requires that the proclaimer truly understands what it is that is being proclaimed. Only

when it is truly understood can it be effectively proclaimed, because only then will it be proclaimed with confidence.

That is why we regularly have training courses for those who proclaim the Scriptures in Church and is part of the value of the Bible Timeline courses. They need to understand the meaning of the words that they are proclaiming.

The second vital component is the skill of being able to speak the words in a way that can be understood. There was a time when the Scriptures were proclaimed in Latin at Mass, even though many, perhaps most of the congregation could not understand the language. The Church technically always insisted that the readings should be understood; she just took a long time to recognise that most people were not fluent in Latin!

However, an indistinct pronunciation or incoherent proclamation is no more understood than Latin or Greek. This coming autumn there will be a major course for all readers.
