Christ is our King

We are in the throes of the election campaign, and also of a royal ‘scandal’, and it is a good time to consider who actually rules our life.

We claim ourselves as subjects of Jesus, and this needs to inform the whole of our life, and the decisions that we make, including our use of the power of our vote.

In 1925, the world found itself in deep unrest. During the pause between the great World Wars, it was clear that the precarious peace that existed between the nations could not last. Surely conflict would come again, plunging the world deeper into misery. In response to this anxiety, Pope Pius XI instituted a new liturgical feast, one that would proclaim Jesus as the true ruler of all, Christ the King. He wrote that “these manifold evils in the world were due to the fact that the majority of men had thrust Jesus Christ and his holy law out of their lives; that these had no place either in private affairs or in politics: and...that as long as individuals and states refused to submit to the rule of our Saviour, there would be no really hopeful prospect of a lasting peace among nations” (*Quas Primas I*). Without Christ as King, the world must devolve into misery and chaos, and it is only when he is proclaimed as the ruler over all that peace can come into the world.

Although the Church has always proclaimed the kingship of Christ over all peoples and all nations, this kingship is not limited to the political realm, as the Jews at the time of Jesus assumed of the coming Messiah. After all, Christ himself said that “My kingdom is not of this world” (John 18:36). No, his kingship means that first and foremost he reigns over the hearts of men, and kingship is given to Christ not because of anything he does but because of who he is.

Although Christ’s kingship is not outwardly political, it does have political ramifications, as Pope Pius XI understood.

Those rulers who allow Christ to reign in their hearts and their nations will rule differently than those who do not, understanding the inherent dignity of all men and women and striving to protect that dignity through their policies, with far-reaching consequences in the political affairs of the nations.

In our modern world which rejects Christ’s Kingship, both in the individual’s heart as well as over nations, we must make Christ our king, and allow him to rule over every aspect of our lives.

This is why our Bishops frequently produce guidance before elections to help us to decide where to cast our vote. However, it is seldom the case that we can wholeheartedly and unreservedly support one political party or one particular candidate. Someone who supports pro-life issues may not support care for refugees (every bit as much a life

issue as abortion or euthanasia); there are many other matters in which a party or candidate may partly be in accord with Catholic teaching but also oppose it in some areas.

The Scottish Bishops have issued a Pastoral Letter in which they highlight five areas of concern:

Human Life; abortion, assisted suicide, euthanasia

Marriage and the Family

Poverty; the Stewardship of Creation, International Aid

Freedom of Religion and Conscience

Nuclear Weapons and the Arms Trade

It would clearly be wrong (indeed sinful) simply to vote for the party which is promising to make me richer. Election promises are, in any case like piecrust (easily made, easily broken), but simply to vote in self-interest is not to acknowledge Christ as King, but to make self the most important person — self-worship!

SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION

Baptism Preparation: The next Baptism Preparation Session will be on Monday 2nd December, 7pm, in the Sacristy.

First Holy Communion — 2020 The preparation has now started, & no more registrations can be accepted. All families should have the full programme; the next preparation day is November 23rd, & this is a longer session, beginning at 10.00am at St Gregory's school, Grange Road. This is preparing for First Reconciliation, & it is essential that children attend this session. It is also essential that children attend Mass each week.

Confirmation Preparation: Those interested in Confirmation in 2020 are invited to join the Youth Alpha programme. This isn't a compulsory part of the preparation, but it's an excellent & enjoyable prelude. Young people in Year 7 & above wishing to be Confirmed, should collect & complete a registration form from the hall after Mass. Forms will be available from 6th October. When Pope Pius XI established the feast of Christ the King in 1925, the opening prayer ended with the petition: "that all the families of nations, fragmented by the wounds of sin may come under his gentle rule".

When the Missal was revised in 1970 those words, which reflected the state of the world after the First World War were replaced with words drawn from the documents of the Second Vatican Council. However, there is a relevance in the original petition of the prayer.

Almighty ever-living God,
whose will is to restore all things
in your beloved Son, the King of the universe,
grant, we pray,
that the whole creation, set free from slavery,
may render your majesty service
and ceaselessly proclaim your praise.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,
who lives and reigns with you
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, for ever and ever. Amen

Although we are mercifully spared war on the scale of 1914-1918, we live in a world in which there are wars .in 2018 more than 76,000 people died in warfare across the world.

We recognise that in a world which in large measure lives by a different standard, the "gentle rule" of Christ would bring about greater peace. As we "proclaim your praise" in Church, may we also proclaim your Gospel to the world..

24th November 2019, Christ the King, Year C Ordinary Time, Year C

The Books of Samuel, Kings and Judges, tell of Israel's history from when they entered Canaan about 1200 BC, up to their exile to Babylon in 587 BC. After the death of Saul, David became King of Judah. In today's key reading David then becomes King of all Israel. He goes on to capture the 1,000 year-old city of Jerusalem, and makes it his capital. He then brings the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem, making it also Israel's religious centre.

The Psalm celebrates arriving in Jerusalem, goal of pilgrims and seat of government.

The letter to the Colossians was written because they thought that angelic beings and other spiritual powers were either rivals to Christ or were needed to supplement Christ's work. Paul says this detracts from the person of Jesus Christ, who possesses the totality of power

needed to gain our freedom, "the forgiveness of sins". The hymn praises Christ, who is the image of the unseen God. He existed before all things, which were created in him, and He is supreme over all creation. He has reconciled all things, the whole cosmos, by "the blood of the Cross".

In Luke's Gospel the crucified Jesus is recognised as King, both by the good thief and in the inscription written by Pilate, a Gentile.
