The World on Fire

At the time of writing the forest fires in the Amazon are burning out of control, it would appear that these are the worst fires in a decade. What is clear is that large areas of rain forest are being lost, and that the oxygen supply of the entire world is suffering as a result. In addition, carbon is being released into the air which will increase the problems of climate change.

It is good news that our Bishops have made a commitment to help in the process of halting climate change through the energy supply to our churches and schools.

All our gas and electricity is now entirely supplied from green and renewable sources, and the bishops are pledged to “invite our people to engage in this urgent challenge” (*Guardians of God’s Creation: a statement from the Bishops of England and Wales*).

This invitation from our bishop is aimed at the “diocese, parishes, schools, families and individuals”. Each one of us is asked to reflect on what more we can do to help to recover the stability of the climate.

There are some who deny that climate change is taking place at all, and there are, inevitably, prophets of doom who so magnify the risks that fuel the arguments of the deniers. We all need to be accurately informed about the true situation, and be prepared to listen to rational arguments from respected experts.

As Catholics, we also need to heed the teaching of the Pope and the Church. We should also heed the real experiences of those we know. This summer the monsoon in Kerala has again brought devastating flooding, as it did last year. We should also note that then worst effects of climate change are always felt by the poorest who do not have any option but to stay and face drought or flood, heat or cold, hurricane or tornado while those with the means to move can do so.

The Bishops, in their statement say:

“A Catholic Response

It is possible to change course. Scientific research gives us an insight into what our future earth may look like. But all projections depend on the actions that we take today. We must take action urgently. We are aware of the common but differentiated responsibilities, with greater attention given to “the needs of the poor, the weak and the vulnerable, in a debate often dominated by more powerful interests.”

(*Laudato Si*, §31, 170) We must face this challenge with confidence in the knowledge that the worst effects this ecological crisis can still be avoided. “Nobody can go off into battle unless he is fully convinced of victory beforehand. If we start without confidence, we have already lost half of the battle and we bury our talents.” (*Evangelii Gaudium* §85)

Central to this challenge will be the development of a Christian spirituality of ecology, and a call to a new lifestyle, beginning in personal and family life. The crisis we face is a summons to a profound interior conversion, whereby the effects of our relationship with Jesus Christ become evident in our relationship with the world around us. (*Laudato Si*, §217)

As disciples, we are invited to be part of the redeeming mission of Christ, and to approach our task with joy and gratitude. “Rather than a problem to be solved, the world is a joyful mystery to be contemplated with gladness and praise.” (*Laudato Si*, §12) Whilst capable of the worst, human beings are also able to start again and choose what is good so as to more fully participate in the drama of salvation history, leading all creatures back to their creator. “...all creatures are moving forward with us and through us towards a common point of arrival, which is God, in that transcendent fullness where the risen Christ embraces and illumines all things.” (*Laudato Si*, §83)

A Way Forward...

We look to avoid the worst consequences of this ecological crisis by engaging now and over the next decade on this ‘long path to renewal.’

As Bishops, we will review the ‘Call of Creation’ to reflect on our present situation and to promote good practice for diocese, parishes, schools, families and individuals. We need a more considered relationship with our God, our neighbour and the earth through the way we manage our resources as a Church.

We, the Bishops of England and Wales commit ourselves and invite our people to engage in this urgent challenge, so that together we show leadership by our actions.

Let us pray for wisdom and courage for the path ahead.”

There are jokes about asking ten members of organisations their opinion and getting eleven answers!

Those who take that joke seriously may find the idea that all faithful Christians are united in a single purpose difficult to recognise.

At its highest level, our common purpose is to love God's command and to desire what he promises.

What there is disagreement about is exactly what God actually *does* command. All too often, people are willing to follow their own ideas about this.

O God, who cause the minds of the faithful to unite in a single purpose, grant your people to love what you command and to desire what you promise, that, amid the uncertainties of this world, our hearts may be fixed on that place where true gladness will be found.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

We are foolish if we think we know better than God; have a better understanding than what Jesus teaches us; are wiser than the teaching of the Gospels.

There are so many uncertainties in this world, but the Christian Gospel gives us the authoritative teaching of God. So many who have previously chosen to follow their own route have later come to realise that God's way is the best way.

We pray that our hearts, and therefore our decisions may be aligned to the ways of God.

Scripture Readings 25th August 2019, 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

After lamenting the disasters God has sent on the Israelites because of their sins, third Isaiah sees hope in God's renewal of his covenant promise and in the "new heavens and the new earth" which God is creating. Jerusalem will prosper and all nations will be invited to God's holy mountain Jerusalem. God's glory will be seen by all, and all nations will worship him.

This shortest of all the psalms calls on all mankind to praise the Lord for his kindness to us and for his faithfulness to his promises.

Hebrews quotes from the Book of Proverbs that a son should expect to be disciplined by his Father. So we should not be discouraged when God disciplines us: rather we should rejoice that God shows in this way that we are his beloved sons. We must

persevere, enduring our sufferings, turning away from sin and accepting the works God calls us to do.

Chapter 13 of Luke's gospel emphasises the need to repent, to change our mind-set about God. After Jesus healed a crippled woman on the Sabbath, the synagogue ruler was outraged to be told his understanding of the Sabbath was hypocrisy. But we also have great difficulty in accepting God's ways. Today's reading insists that entering the kingdom is difficult.

Palm Response: **Go out to the whole world and proclaim the Good News.**

A Thank-you Letter from CAFOD

Thank you to all parishioners at St Gregory the Great for your generous support for CAFOD that year and for your latest donation of £233.04 which we received on 22nd July.

Your gift will support people like Lemukola from Uganda, whose wife became ill with Hepatitis E after drinking river water.

Thanks to donations from CAFOD supporters like you, our partner organisation Caritas Moroto were able to repair a broken borehole in Lemukola's village. They also trained local mechanics how to fix the pump should it break down again, so no-one in Lemukola's village has to drink dirty water.

Lemukola says: "When the borehole was mended, life changed. Now we can get water whenever we want and the spread of

diseases has stopped. We can bathe, cook, water the animals and wash clothes whenever we want. It feels good to have safe water so near."

Thanks to your compassion, people like Lemukola can now live healthy and happier lives as they no longer have to worry about access to water.

October — Mission Month

Many parents will be thinking about the preparation of their children for First Holy Communion or for Confirmation. It is good to remember that prayer which was said at the Baptism of your child, that you will be: "the first teachers of their child in the ways of faith. May they also be the best of teachers, bearing witness to the faith by what they say and do, in Christ our Lord"

Our First Holy Communion preparation this year will involve parents (or, at least, one parent!) in the process more than ever before.



Many parents feel that this may be too difficult a task. Many think that they do not know enough themselves to teach their children, or just feel overawed by the prospect. There is an excellent little book available to help, recommended by Pope Francis himself.

YOUCAT for Kids is an introduction to the Catholic faith for children, filled with bright colours and drawings, and easy-to-understand answers to tough questions, like: "Why do I exist?" and "Why do some people not believe in God?" The authors of *YOUCAT for Kids* tested the answers with groups of children to make sure they understood what was being explained. There are copies at the repository — do have a look.

St John tells us that three of the apostles came from the city of Bethsaida (Peter, Andrew and Philip) (*John 1:44*). We know that Bethsaida was on the shores of the Sea of Galilee but its exact location has been debated by experts for many years.



Recent archaeology has made a significant discovery. During the summer a mosaic floor and carved stones have been discovered, and the building has been identified as the church which was described by Bishop Willibald in the year 725 as having been built over the house of Peter and Andrew.

This discovery confirms that the location of Bethsaida is the current El-Araj. It provides yet more evidence of the accuracy of the Gospels. There are some who dismiss the whole of the Bible as fiction; even denying that Jesus ever existed, but here we have modern archaeology supporting the evidence of the Gospels.

By knowing the Scriptures better we can be more able to explain to sceptics and dis-believers that our faith is not a fantasy, but that modern science agrees with what we read in the Bible
