Forward Planning

We are frequently advised to plan for the future; to build up our pension fund, to make a will or to care for our health. The Gospel also advises us to plan for the future; not so much financially as spiritually.

The month of November is the month of the Holy Souls, and as we pray for those who have gone before us, we also remember that we are sure to follow them.

While we may hope that this may not be soon, just as in sorting out a pension, it is never too early to start!

The Feast of All Saints provides us with a good basis for this. Throughout the year the Church offers us a whole array of Saints whose holiness has been recognized and have been officially canonised. This does not mean that the Church agrees with everything that they did or said. There are some who, before their conversion led ‘colourful’ lives, and some who, even in their Christian life, made choices that we now think of as wrong. For example, for many centuries slavery was seen as acceptable and during that time even saints conformed to the ideas of their age.

We find among the Saints a great variety of expressions of holiness; both man and women, rich and poor, clever and not, young and old; in fact, different in every way except in that they all did their best to live close to God. The characteristic common to all the saints was a life of holiness, of virtue.

Our “forward planning” must be, then, to grow in virtue. The Catechism of the Catholic Church has a long section on virtue, and begins with this:

Whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. (*Philippians 4:8*)

A virtue is a habitual and firm disposition to do the good. It allows the person not only to perform good acts, but to give the best of himself. The virtuous person tends toward the good with all his sensory and spiritual powers; he pursues the good and chooses it in concrete actions.

The goal of a virtuous life is to become like God. (*St. Gregory of Nyssa, De beatitudinibus,*) (CCC §1803)

The passage quoted from Philippians reminds us that holiness lies not simply in avoiding sin. That is not what the saints are particularly known for; it was in the exercise of virtue.

Virtue is a habitual and firm disposition to do good.

The human virtues are stable dispositions of the intellect and the will that govern our acts, order our passions, and guide our conduct in accordance with reason and faith. They can be grouped around the four cardinal virtues: prudence, justice, fortitude, and temperance.

Prudence disposes the practical reason to discern, in every circumstance, our true good and to choose the right means for achieving it.

Justice consists in the firm and constant will to give God and neighbour their due.

Fortitude ensures firmness in difficulties and constancy in the pursuit of the good.

Temperance moderates the attraction of the pleasures of the senses and provides balance in the use of created goods.

The moral virtues grow through education, deliberate acts, and perseverance in struggle. Divine grace purifies and elevates them.

The theological virtues dispose Christians to live in a relationship with the Holy Trinity. They have God for their origin, their motive, and their object - God known by faith, God hoped in and loved for his own sake.

There are three theological virtues: faith, hope, and charity. They inform all the moral virtues and give life to them.

By **faith**, we believe in God and believe all that he has revealed to us and that Holy Church proposes for our belief.

By **hope** we desire, and with steadfast trust await from God, eternal life and the graces to merit it.

By **charity**, we love God above all things and our neighbour as ourselves for love of God. Charity, the form of all the virtues, "binds everything together in perfect harmony" (*Col 3:14*).

The seven gifts of the Holy Spirit bestowed upon Christians are **wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord**. (CCC §1833 – 1845)

SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION

Baptism Preparation: The next Baptism Preparation Session will be on Monday 2nd December, 7pm, in the Sacristy.

First Holy Communion — 2020 The preparation has now started, and no more registrations can be accepted. All families should have the full programme; the next preparation day is on November 23rd, and this is a longer session, beginning at 10.00 am and is at St Gregory's school, Grange Road. This is the preparing for the First Reconciliation, and it is essential that children attend this session. It is also essential that children attend Mass each week.

Confirmation Preparation: Those interested in Confirmation in 2020 are invited to join the Youth Alpha programme. This isn't a compulsory part of the preparation, but it's an excellent & enjoyable prelude. Young people in Year 7 & above wishing to be Confirmed, should collect & complete a registration form from the hall after Mass. Forms will be available from 6th October. Please then attend one of the registration sessions after Masses on Sunday 10th or 17th November. (8am at St Anselm's, 9.15am at Our Lady's, 10.30am Sacred Heart and 9am and 11am at St Gregory's). Classes begin in January 2020 & will generally be held on Saturday afternoons leading to Confirmation in July. Our prayer links to the thoughts on the front page of this newsletter: we are reminded of the text: "And now faith, hope and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthians 13:13)

They are known as the "Theological Virtues", of this the Catechism of the Catholic Church says:

Almighty ever-living God, increase our faith, hope and charity, and make us love what you command, so that we may merit what you promise.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

"The theological virtues are the foundation of Christian moral activity; they animate it and give it its special character. They inform and give life to all the moral virtues. They are infused by God into the souls of the faithful to make them capable of acting as his children and of meriting eternal life. They are the pledge of the presence and action of the Holy Spirit in the faculties of the human being. There are three theological virtues: faith, hope, and charity." (CCC 1813)

Scripture Readings 27th October 2019, 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

Sirach was a Jerusalem sage writing about 180 BC. His wise maxims are much used by the Church. God does not approve "the gifts of the godless, nor for their many sacrifices does he forgive their sins". God is just, "he hears the cry of the oppressed". God's justice will be seen, he will wreak "vengeance upon the proud".

The psalm urges us to praise the Lord, especially for his rescue of us. We should therefore keep his commandments.

Paul tells Timothy to expect a time to come "when people will not tolerate sound doctrine" "and will stop listening to the truth". In every age Christians have experienced this happening. Paul is facing death alone. But God has not deserted him, enabling him to speak out at his trial, sending the gospel message to yet more Gentiles, even at this late hour.

In Luke's gospel Jesus continues his teachings on prayer. After last week's parable about the persistent widow comes this strong condemnation of insincere prayer. We should not imagine that the Pharisee was bad: he is a good man, conscientiously observing his religion. Yet Jesus says the tax collector went home justified "rather than" the Pharisee. Not "more than"! Why? Because the tax collector was humble enough to admit his need of God and of his mercy.

Psalm Response: **This poor man called; the Lord heard him.**

(Sir/Eccle'us 35:12-14,16-19 Ps 33(34) 2 Tim 4:6-8,16-18 Lk 18:9-14)

Actions to Live Simply :

Training in Proclamation



St Gregory's is a very difficult church acoustically in that the echo which makes music such a pleasure also makes it very difficult to hear the spoken word.

Even the most experienced find proclamation of the Scriptures technically difficult here. Over the years many experts have been called in to advise over sound systems, and all agree that having many small loudspeakers such as we have is the best solution. However, even with the best system in the world, St Gregory's is difficult! That is why we all need help to be better.

There will be sessions for this on Monday and Tuesday evenings of this week, starting at 7.00 pm. Ideally all who proclaim the Scriptures should come at least to one of the sessions, which are planned to end no later than 9.00 pm. Both new and experienced proclaimers are asked to attend —we can all learn from each other.

Bishop Peter has said that he expects all who proclaim the Scriptures to have had training in this time of preparation for the "Year of the Word" which will begin in December.



An important message for any who sometimes attend Mass at the Cathedral:

The Cathedral will no longer send envelopes from other Parishes back, so if you occasionally attend Sunday Mass there, please do not put St. Gregory's Envelopes into the collection, but save them until you are next here, or consider setting up a standing order (see Fr. Andrew)
