Our burglar has been back: To call him “our” may be a little presumptuous, although he seem to think that anything in the church is his, so maybe it is appropriate! This time he appears not to have stolen anything of value, but has done serious damage to the side door-frame. We now have a much more secure office safe which is bolted to the wall.

The reference to “a firm foundation” brings to mind the passage in the Sermon on the Mount to the house built on the rock, as opposed to that built on sand. (Matthew 7:24-27)

The context of this passage is about those who, having heard the words of Jesus, act upon them (whose house is built on rock) and those who, having heard those words, fails to act on them.

We can therefore link the principle of using “the good things that

O God, protector of those who hope in you, without who nothing has a firm foundation, nothing is holy, bestow in abundance your mercy upon us and grant that, with you as our ruler and guide, we may use the good things that pass in such a way as to hold fast even now to those things that ever endure.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

pass” with acting on the words of Jesus. As we think of climate change, we can see that the way in which we use the fruits of the earth is of fundamental importance to the practice of our faith.

If we fail in our stewardship of the earth, we are living in a house built on sand; a house that will ultimately fall. If we fail in our stewardship of the earth, we will have no home at all!

In holding fast to those things that ever endure, we remember that Jesus said his words would “never pass away” (Matthew 24:35)

Scripture Readings 28th July 2019, 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

After promising Abraham a son next year, God hesitates before revealing his plans for Sodom and Gomorrah. Abraham urges God to be just to the threatened towns, where his nephew Lot lives. Later Lot defends his angelic guests from the depraved demands of the men of Sodom, and escapes before Sodom is destroyed.

The psalm expresses heartfelt thanks to the Lord for his justice and love, confident in his continual help.

Paul urges the Colossians, whom he has never visited, to be confident in their understanding of “God’s mystery”, Christ. As Gentiles they were seen as sinners, outside the Jewish Law. But now the Law is overridden, so, “buried in Christ”, they should follow only Christ. For Paul, the list of our debts, owed to God for failing to carry out our duties under the covenant, is graphically nailed to the Cross and so destroyed.

Luke's version of the Our Father is shorter and more abrupt than Matthew's. Both versions look to the end days, especially "Do not put us to the test". "Daily bread" may refer to the Eucharist. Or it may mean "tomorrow's bread" – the heavenly banquet, like the double portion of manna collected in the desert before the Sabbath. God promises to respond to all our requests, as he did to Abraham.

Our local contribution to the “Year of the Word” is the courses that we are running helping people to understand the Bible better. Successive Popes have encouraged all Catholics to have a better understanding of the Bible, and in recent years we have been blessed with many new resources to help us. The monthly “Bible Alive” is a great publication, and the video courses that we run have helped many to have a clearer understanding of the words that are read from the Bible at every Mass.

The “Bible Timeline” course is the place to start. This is where an overview of the entire Bible can be gained. It takes you through God’s plan of salvation from the very beginning right up the the work of the Church as told in the Acts of the Apostles.

Do not be frightened by the idea of a “course”. It is not over-demanding, and although it offers the opportunity to do “homework”, you can simply come; watch the video and join in the conversation. There are always some for whom the pressure of time and other commitments makes anything more than the time of the course impossible.

This course will be run at Sacred Heart on Tuesday mornings at 10.00, starting on September . Sadly, this is not possible for everyone, but there will be further opportunities. There are others courses running here, in Wellingborough and in Rushden; more information to follow.



Our Common Home

Pope Francis reminds us that our earth was here before us and it has been given to us freely, not to exploit, but to care for. We need to reimagine our common home - a precious gift given to us by God. Not just for ourselves, but for the world’s poorest people and for those generations still to come. By coming together for a Creation Celebration, we can give thanks for the gift of God’s creation – a gift we are invited to enjoy together.

Ten years ago, the UK Government took a global lead and passed the pioneering Climate Change Act, committing us to reduce carbon emissions by 80 per cent by 2050. But we’ve come a long way since then and recent research by climate scientists has stressed that this is no longer enough. We need to go further, faster. Unless we make dramatic changes, the damage caused by climate change will be irreversible.

We now have a new Prime Minister and a new government; it is not (at the time of writing) clear who in government will be responsible for overseeing the national policy (if anyone). However, there is a

petition to the Prime Minister (<https://e-activist.com/page/44225/petition/1>).

There was a Department of Energy and Climate Change, but Theresa May abolished it in July 2016, giving the responsibility to the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS). What the new Prime Minister will do is not yet known.

Climate change affects our homes, our health, our heritage and our beautiful landscapes. Our community centres where we meet, our sports fields where we play and our places of pilgrimage where we reflect and pray. Climate change ruins the work we do to fight poverty and to live better lives.

We will be celebrating God’s wonderful creation in a special way at both Masses on Sunday 4th August. This is a great opportunity to come together to act on the biggest issue of our time – climate change. We are all part of God’s creation and we are called to care for, protect and restore our common home, the earth.
