Bible Society

Not long after Fr Andrew came to St Gregory's, to his great surprise, he was asked to join the local committee of the Bible Society. This was an honour, and reflected two significant changes over the previous decades.

First, although the official teaching of the Catholic Church has always valued the Bible, since Vatican II the reality of this is more and more evident at the parish level.

Secondly, when the Bible Society was founded (as the British and Foreign Bible Society) it was consciously a Protestant organisation, but in this ecumenical age, it has significantly changed, and has many Catholic members of staff. In the coming “Year of the Word”, the Bible Society is providing the majority of the funding.

Over the past years, at St Gregory's, the money from refreshments after Mass from after the CAFOD harvest collection until the beginning of Advent has been given to the Bible Society; it is the funding for the annual Bible Society Carol Service. This takes place at Christchurch on Wellingborough Road, usually on the second Monday of December, and at which the choir of Northampton School for Girls sing under the excellent direction provided by the Northampton Music and Performing Arts Trust, and students from St Gregory's Catholic Primary School read the Scriptures.

The Founding of the Bible Society

In 1800 a 15-year-old Welsh girl named Mary Jones trekked 26 long miles through the rugged terrain of north Wales to buy a Welsh Bible. Mary was so determined to have a Bible of her own, in her own language, that she saved up for six long years before her walk to Bala.

With the help of Revd Thomas Charles of Bala, who arranged lodgings for Mary and sold her three Bibles for the price of one, Mary Jones' determination was rewarded. Her story – and her unswerving desire to get hold of God's written word – soon became the talk of the churches in the area.

Inspired by Mary's story, and by the recent arrival of reduced-price Bibles for Welsh speakers, Revd Joseph Hughes asked a daring question to other church leaders: ‘If for Wales, why not for the kingdom? And if for the kingdom, why not for the world?’

That question, posed at a meeting of the Religious Tract Society on 7 December 1802, would reverberate across Wales and, ultimately, the

world. It was the moment that set in motion the founding of what is now the Bible Society.

Captured by the vision of God's word being available for all people of the kingdom and wider world, William Wilberforce with a number of friends decided to do what they do best – they decided to act. They made this vision part of their campaign to ‘make goodness fashionable’ – in the hope of inspiring people to fall in love with the Bible and a Biblically-inspired lifestyle.



On 7 March 1804, at a meeting of around 300 at the London Tavern in Bishopsgate, Wilberforce and the campaigning groups he was a part of formed the British and Foreign Bible Society. At this moment, they could only begin to imagine what this society would achieve in the coming years.

Since that day over 200 years ago, the British and Foreign Bible Society has become Bible Society – a charity committed to offering the Bible to the world.

It has won the admiration of royalty, from Edward VII through to our current monarch, Elizabeth II. The work has survived, even thrived, through the unfolding events of two World Wars. They persevered to find openings in Communist Russia and the Cultural Revolution of China. They established local Bible Societies in 146 countries of the world, to undertake the same work in their locations.

Today, they stand on the shoulders of these giants of the past – Mary Jones, Revd Joseph Hughes, William Wilberforce and others – committed to faithfully living out their belief that the Bible should be made available for every man, woman and child in the world.

As well as funding the “Year of the Word”, the Bible Society supports the work of the Catholic Church in many mission areas by providing Bibles in local languages. It is interesting that most of William Wilberforce's children became Catholics, influenced by St John Henry Newman – one of his descendants is a priest in the diocese of Plymouth!

SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION

Baptism Preparation: The next Baptism Preparation Session will be on Monday 2nd December, 7pm, in the Sacristy.

This is a complicated prayer: first we need to recognise that in the second line the prayer speaks of God's gift to us; this is to say, Jesus Christ who "emptied himself, taking the form of a slave" (*Philippians 2:7*).

Therefore the "right and praiseworthy service" that we offer is to be seen in humility and obedience to God.

Almighty and merciful God,
by whose gift your faithful offer you
right and praiseworthy service,
grant, we pray,
that we may hasten without stumbling
to receive the things you have promised.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,
who lives and reigns with you
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

We pray that we may hasten "without stumbling", and the original Latin has the word "offensione", which could mean either our own sin or obstacles placed in our way. The root of the word "promise" is "promittere", which also means "to send before" Jesus is the one who was sent before to undergo death and reveal the resurrection, and we run after him "with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus" (*Hebrews 12:2*)

Scripture Readings 3rd November 2019, 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

The Book of Wisdom has been describing ways in which Wisdom guided the patriarchs and took special care of Israel during their Exodus wanderings in the desert. God's mercy extends to all creation, even men's sins. The logic is impeccable: "you love all that exists", "for had you hated anything, you would not have formed it." Offenders are encouraged to trust in God by gentle reminders of their sins.

The psalm praises God's sovereign majesty and loving providence.

For the next three weeks we have readings from Paul's second letter to the Thessalonians. After his opening greeting, Paul thanks God for the strength of the Thessalonians' faith, which he boasts about to other churches, and promises that those persecuting them will be punished. The Thessalonians are always in Paul's prayers, and should not be misled by false information about the second coming. Much has to happen before the end time.

In the Gospel Luke graphically describes the rich tax collector, Zacchaeus. Curious to see Jesus, Zacchaeus immediately follows Jesus and promises to give half his wealth to the poor. A contrast to the rich official who could not detach himself from his material possessions to follow Jesus. Though excluded from the Jewish community by his occupation, Zacchaeus receives salvation as a true son of Abraham.

The Year of the Word



During the last week there has been training offered to all who proclaim the Scriptures to us during Mass.

The first part of the training was to do with preparation. By printing the names of the readers both for the current week and the following week, it is hoped that those who exercise this important ministry will not forget and will give time to preparation of their reading. This must begin by understanding what the message of the passage of Scripture is, because the task of the proclaimer is first of all to communicate that meaning.

The second part of preparation is to work out how to read each sentence; which words or syllables to emphasise and which are less important; where to pause and, if necessary, where to take a breath.

In proclaiming, clarity of speech is clearly vital. It is the consonants that make the words understandable, and clear enunciation of these is also essential. It is very important not to go too fast and also to be conscious of *proclaiming* not just reading; that is to say, speaking loud enough.
