# Our Common Home

This weekend we are having a Creation Celebration of our Common Home, our earth that God gave us. Below are two different quotes—one from Scripture and one from Laudato Si’ –Pope Francis’ letter on the environment:

“God saw all that he had made, and it was very good” Genesis 1:31

“The earth, our home, is beginning to look more and more like an immense pile of filth.” Pope Francis,

In Genesis, we are shown the wonders of God’s creation, that nothing was created without a purpose. Unfortunately, as Pope Francis tells us in Laudato Si’, we have plundered and damaged the earth unthinkingly. We have forgotten that creation is God’s gift to us to treat with respect.

We have a **Climate Emergency** - unless we act now to change our behaviour our children and grandchildren will not be able to save the planet. We were told by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) last year that **to keep the rise in global temperature below 1.5C this century**, emissions of carbon dioxide would have to be cut by 45% by 2030.

Today we are told by Hans Joachim Schellnhuber, founder of the Potsdam Climate institute that, “While the world can’t be healed within the next few years it may be fatally wounded by negligence until 2020.”

Prince Charles at a recent Commonwealth reception said that the next 18 months would decide our ability to keep climate change to survivable levels.

The recent heatwave set a record of 38°C in Cambridge last week. This week we have had flash flooding causing collapse of a bridge in Yorkshire and a dam in Derbyshire. However, we notice global warming changing our weather, what is happening here is magnified in Africa and other parts of the world.

The local people in the Rift Valley in Kenya, nomadic tribes with their animals who subsist on the land, have moved south due to desertification of the land and are encroaching on other settled communities causing civil unrest. The Masai tribe have problems - their cattle have died. The Arctic ice is melting causing problems for both the human and animal population. If current climate trends

continue, by 2030 demand for water will have increased by 30%. Shrinking glaciers will reduce flow in crucial rivers; for example, the Ganges, Yellow, Indus, and Mekong rivers all depend on the Himalayas. Rising sea level will make fresh water salty while floods will contaminate clean water.

We do however have some good news. The Africans are building a Green Wall across the continent from Senegal to Sudan. Twenty countries are involved in bringing life back to degraded landscapes in building this structure 4,750 miles long and 9 miles wide. It is more than just growing trees and plants The Green Wall is transforming lives of the local people by giving them food, employment and protecting them against famine and drought. A wall to keep famine and drought out is so much better than a wall to keep out the people who are suffering from famine and drought. When complete, 100 million hectares of land will be restored from desertification, and the trees will absorb 250 million tons of carbon dioxide from the air.

Our faith is one of hope and calls us to action. It calls us to refresh our relationships with God, creation and one another. We can also find hope in the fact we are making progress. The UK Government passed the Climate Change Act 2008 which commits us to cut emissions. In 2015, world leaders signed the Paris Agreement a global Climate treaty. On the other hand, the Amazon Rain Forest is being destroyed at an alarming rate.

Individuals are changing their lives by eating no or less meat, switching to clean energy suppliers, recycling, and using less plastic. For example - Daily Bread on the Bedford Road will refill liquid soap, washing up liquid, shampoo, conditioner, toilet cleaner and floor cleaner from their containers to your own bottles.

We can begin that change today. Please sign a petition to the Prime Minister. In it, we are asking the UK government to move further, faster on climate action. We know that to avoid the worst effects of climate change we need to reach zero emissions as soon as possible. This means making sure that the emissions we put in to the atmosphere are no greater than the ones we remove. The UK should put an end to their contribution to Climate Change.



In all things God works with us as his co-workers, and so the first petition, that God will "draw near to" his servants, is equally a recognition that we must be close to him. We do not expect God to solve the climate crisis without us doing anything more than praying. Rather, we pray that God will inspire us and many others to take this issue seriously.

## Scripture Readings 4th August 2019, 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

Qoheleth the Preacher struggles with the contradictions of life and the vanity of created things which give no lasting satisfaction. Good people suffer, sinners enjoy life and prosper. With no idea of life after death, the Preacher's only solution is to trust that God will make it right eventually.

The Psalm contrasts the shortness of our lives with God's eternity, seeing suffering and death as punishment for sin. But also prays that God will grant some happiness before death.

This final extract from Colossians hints at Paul's very detailed moral teaching. The Christian's life is now "hidden with Christ", but when Christ is revealed "you too will be revealed in all your glory". Paul then spells out how we should live our lives focussed on Christ. So that we will grow in knowledge and maturity

towards the images of our creator that God intended us to be. We must put away sins of both sex and speech, which damage individuals and the Christian community.

Luke's Gospel answers the Preacher's problem in the first reading: good actions in this life are rewarded after death, and evil will be punished. The rich man's approach was sensible in capitalist terms, and not immoral. But Luke insists that we must help the poor while we can!

Psalm Response: **O Lord, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.**

(Eccles 1:2,2:21-23, Ps 89(90):3-17, Col 3:1-5,9-11, Lk 12:13-21)

St John tells us that three of the apostles came from the city of Bethsaida (Peter, Andrew and Philip) (*John 1:44*). We know that Bethsaida was on the shores of the Sea of Galilee but its exact location has been debated by experts for many years.

Recent archaeology has made a significant discovery. During the summer a mosaic floor and carved stones have been discovered, and the building has been identified as the church which was described by Bishop Willibald in the year 725 as having been built over the house of Peter and Andrew.

This discovery confirms that the location of Bethsaida is the current El-Araj. It provides yet more evidence of the accuracy of the Gospels. There are some who dismiss the whole of the Bible as fiction; even denying that Jesus ever existed, but here we have modern archaeology supporting the evidence of the Gospels.

By knowing the Scriptures better we can be more able to explain to sceptics and dis-believers that our faith is not a fantasy, but that modern science agrees with what we read in the Bible



# A Competition — with a prize

A "walk in the park" is an expression meaning something simple to do, and we are so blessed with having Abington Park on our doorstep!

The competition is to identify as many trees as you can in Abington Park (both sides of the road). Take a digital photograph of trees in the park and correctly identify them; the winner will be the person who identifies the greatest number of different species (and sub-species) of tree in the park. The prize will be modest (£20); the purpose of the competition is to encourage a greater understanding of the variety of trees, and to appreciate their vital contribution to the wellbeing of our planet.

The entries will be judged by experts from the Northamptonshire Natural History Society, and their judgement will be final.

There are many on-line resources which will help to identify trees, and actually many of those in the park have plaques which are a bit of a give-away!
