Mystagogia — Going Deeper

The Catholic Church does sometimes (even frequently) use words that are not in daily use; this itself is sometimes a cause of controversy! The word “Mystagogia” literally means, “Leading into the Mysteries”. It is understood as the process of “a person’s entering into the mystery of the Lord’s presence”. The word “Mysteries” is one of the words that was used to describe the Mass in the early centuries of the Church — we still see in in the third Eucharistic Prayer: “. . . at whose command we celebrate these mysteries.” St Cyril of Jerusalem begins his first talk given after Easter: “I have long been wishing, O true-born and dearly-beloved children of the Church, to discourse to you concerning these spiritual and heavenly mysteries; but since I well know that seeing is far more persuasive than hearing, I waited for the present season.” It is not that those who were Baptised at Easter had no idea about what receiving Communion means, rather it is that once having received Communion there is a whole new experience to be made sense of.

This is not simply aimed at those who have been recently Baptised or received into the Church, it is for all the Baptised, and importantly for those for whom their faith may have become more habitual and less exciting!

Pope Benedict XVI wrote about this in his encyclical “*Sacramentum Caritatis*” speaks about this important part of Christian teaching. Addressing the Bishops and Priests, he make the point that: “the best catechesis on the Eucharist is the Eucharist itself, celebrated well.” (§64). In this document Pope Benedict lays out three essential elements:

- 1 Our celebration of Mass must always be understood in the light of salvation history. The “Bible Timeline” course beautifully shows how the Old Testament is fulfilled in the New, and in particular, how the sacrificial death of Jesus on the Cross fulfils all the Old Testament sacrifices, especially the Passover. We reference this explicitly at every Mass as we refer to Jesus as the “Lamb of God”. To fully join in “active participation” at the Mass we need to have an understanding of the way in which the Old Testament is made alive in the life of Jesus, and therefore in the celebration of Mass, and therefore in the life of all Christians today.
- 2 It is important to understand the meaning of the symbols and signs in the Mass. For example, the hand gestures of the priest convey specific meanings; the times of sitting, standing and kneeling have a significance. The design and architecture of a church should convey a sense of the mystery. The steps on which the altar stands speak to us of Mount Calvary, the construction of the Altar speaks both of the Table of the meal

(with its legs) and of the altar of sacrifice (being made of stone). The placing of the Tabernacle in the apse is placing Jesus at the place where to emperor would have sat in an ancient Basilica. The “Biblical Walk through the Mass” course that we sometimes run helps us to understand better some of these signs and symbols.

- 3 The third element is best expressed in Pope Benedict’s own words: It “must be concerned with bringing out the *significance of the rites for the Christian life* in all its dimensions – work and responsibility, thoughts and emotions, activity and repose. Part of the mystagogical process is to demonstrate how the mysteries celebrated in the rite are linked to the missionary responsibility of the faithful. The mature fruit of mystagogy is an awareness that one’s life is being progressively transformed by the holy mysteries being celebrated. The aim of all Christian education, moreover, is to train the believer in an adult faith that can make him a “new creation”, capable of bearing witness in his surroundings to the Christian hope that inspires him.”

Pope Benedict says that this must involve the whole people of God. We are used to the idea of taking Lent seriously; we may well make a greater effort to be at Mass more frequently, to pray more regularly, to read the Bible more, to be more generous in many ways. This is, of course, good, but perhaps we can take Eastertide more seriously too. This is a season for rejoicing, and above all, we rejoice in the Resurrection of Christ, but we also rejoice in our faith.

The season of mystagogy ends with Pentecost, but that is far from the end of the journey, and through the ‘green’ season of the Church we read the teaching and work of Jesus in the Gospels. But for all of us, the process of entering into the mystery of the Lord’s presence is a life-long journey of discovery, excitement and joy.

welcome thought. It might remind some of the opening words of the old Mass rite: “Ad Deum, qui laetificat juventutem meam” — to God, who brings joy to my youth. (*Psalm 43[42]:4*)

There is a literary couplet: renewed and restored. These are God’s actions towards us, and lead us to rejoice, to exult. May our exultation continue until our own resurrection.

Scripture Readings 5th May 2019, 3rd Sunday of Easter, Year C

After the healings we heard in last week’s reading from the Book of Acts, the Apostles were again arrested, but miraculously freed. They immediately continued teaching in the Temple, and were again brought before the Sanhedrin, where they defended themselves strongly. Omitted from today’s reading is Gamaliel’s urging that they be released because if their activity “comes from God, you will not be able to destroy them”.

The psalm thanks God for rescue from a sudden illness.

In the Book of Revelation John sees God seated on a throne, with praises rippling out through widening circles of heavenly creatures. The one on the throne holds a scroll written on both sides and sealed with seven seals. An angel proclaims “Who is worthy to open the scroll?” But everyone is in despair because

there seems to be no one worthy to break the seals and open the scroll. But then someone says “The lion of the tribe of Judah, the root of David has triumphed”. Instead of a lion, a slain lamb steps forward to receive the scroll.

After the reading last week of the first ending to John’s Gospel, we hear today most of the second ending. With his three repeated questions, Jesus forgives Peter’s three denials, and insists that the essential pre-condition for authority is love.

‘Tis Mary’s Month of May

Each year we celebrate the month of May as Mary’s month, and begin the month by crowning the statue of Our Lady in the garden and offering flowers at her shrine in the church.

We are following a tradition that goes back in England for many centuries, to the days when England was known for its devotion to Our Lady; so much so that it was known as “Mary’s Dowry”.

Today England is a sad place, and in the wake of the report of persecution of Christians worldwide which claims that this persecution “comes close to genocide”, the Foreign Secretary says that ‘political correctness’ has contributed to the failure of governments to address the problem. Throughout the world, the report says, “the overwhelming majority (80%) of persecuted religious believers are Christians”.

We must pray for our persecuted brothers and sisters in the faith, and must not retaliate with animosity to those of other faiths. That is not the way of Christ.

There was a time in the past when Christians were a persecuted minority in the Roman Empire. But it was also a time of growth for the Church, and Christians were known for their love. “See how these Christians love one another”, observed Tertullian at the beginning of the third century. It was this love that drew people to the faith in their hundreds and thousands.

One way in which this love is shown is in devotion to Our Lady who lived in the love of God and of her divine Son, and now lives in the true home of that love in the glory of heaven.

If we are to recover England to the Faith, one way is to recover our historic love for Our Lady; and to help us in this, starting on Monday 13th May at 1.00 pm at Great Billing Institute there is a course entitled “A Biblical Walk with Mary”. It is open to all, and for those who cannot get to daytime events, it will be run again next year in the evening, in preparation for March 25th 2020 when England will be re-consecrated to Our Lady.

Tertullian had a better response to persecution than either violent retaliation or retreating into a ghetto. He was one of a number of writers of what is known as “apologetics”. These are NOT apologies for the Faith in the modern usage of the word. They are strong proclamations of the true faith of the Church, the name coming from the Greek term for a legal defense. Such a proclamation can only come from a secure knowledge of the Faith, and this is why the Church in our generation is so keen to encourage all Christians really to study their faith. The many courses that we run here spring from that encouragement.

There will be a full programme of courses starting again in the autumn; it would be good if many who have not attended any before would join and help their faith and their confidence in their faith to grow. Please keep looking out for the list when it is published.

Care of the environment and Climate Change

Pope Francis met Greta Thunberg, the Swedish climate change campaigner recently and encouraged her in seeking to publicise the importance of the care of the environment, and also met with Michael Moore, an American film maker, encouraging him to make more movies.

CAFOD are running a campaign entitled “Our Common Home”, and in support of this we will be having a day focusing on this. As a parish we give good financial support to CAFOD, but this is support in a new and exciting way. Please watch out for more information.
