The Apostle to India

Gregory of Tours wrote of his encounter with a Greek monk in the year 594 AD. He was told that in southern India he had met Christians who told him of how St Thomas had come to that land, had met a martyr's death there and that his burial place was held in honour. King Alfred read this account, and determined to check that it was true, and sent Sighelm, bishop of Sherborne to India in 883 with an offering for the shrine. He returned with “many brilliant exotic gems and aromatic juices, with which that country abounds” (*William of Malmesbury*).

He reported the story that St Thomas had arrived in AD 52, having travelled from Palastine to the Red Sea, and then by boat to Kodungallur (formerly Craganore) and founded seven churches in that part of Kerala, converting the local Brahmins. He then travelled east towards Chennai but found the Brahmins there less receptive to his message, and he was martyred there. However, those who were converted buried him and built a church over his grave.

For many centuries in Europe this story was regarded as merely legend, but in the 20th century archaeology and research into ancient literature has changed this. One of the documents referred to a “Rajah Gondophares” who ruled that part of India in the middle of the 1st century. Until the late 19th century he was an unknown king and believed to be part of a myth, but when a hoard on coins bearing his inscription was uncovered by archaeologists, the rest of the “legend” began to be taken more seriously.

In the 1930s it was discovered that there was a Roman trading station called Muzaris which scholars think is very close to Kodungallur, just where the “legend” says that St Thomas landed.

Strabo, a 1st century geographer records that around 200 trading vessels were travelling to south India each year. St Thomas would have had no difficulty in getting there in the 1st century, although after the collapse of the Roman Empire, the journey became much more difficult and there was limited connection between Europe and India until Vasco da Gama discovered the sea route in 1498.



This led to the Portuguese colonisation of large parts of India. The Christianity they brought with them was the late-mediaeval development that has taken place throughout Europe, and when they met the much more primitive Christianity of Kerala, they sought to suppress it and impose the then Latin liturgy and European culture.

Sadly this led to major disagreement, and it was not until the 19th century that this was formally resolved. Today, the Syro-Malabar and Syro-Malankara liturgies remind us of the early flowering of the Church in Syria — “it

was in Antioch that disciples were first called ‘Christians’” (*Acts 11:26*). The different elements of the liturgy in the Churches that owe their origin to the eastwards development of the Church in Syria represent a cultural difference from that of western Europe.

At 4.00 this-afternoon the Syro-Malabar community will be celebrating the feast of St Thomas with a procession and Mass, followed by refreshments, and everyone is welcome. It is always a colourful celebration, and a chance to join in with fellow-Catholics whose origin goes back much further than the Christianisation of England or Ireland; before Gregory was Pope in Rome, before Patrick went to Ireland, the Church established by Thomas was flourishing in India.

The key scripture passage behind this prayer is Philippians 2:5-11, in which we read that Christ “humbled himself” (*verse 8*). The word which is translated as “abasement” is “*humilitate*”. The English translations also miss a beautiful assonance between “*eripuisti*” (fallen) and “*erexisti*” (raised up).

Although the Philippians passage continues beyond this to speak of Christ being “raised up”, in the prayer we speak of the “fallen

O God,
 who in the abasement of your Son
 have raised up a fallen world,
 fill your faithful with holy joy,
 for on those you have rescued from slavery to sin
 you bestow eternal gladness.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son
 who lives and reigns with you
 in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
 one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

world” as having been “raised up”.

The final purpose of the prayer is that we may have “holy joy” and share in eternal gladness

Thus the prayer covers the entire stretch of time; past when, through the life of humility, sacrificial death and glorious resurrection, the fallen world has been raised up; the present when we pray that we may experience “holy joy”; and the future when we pray that we may enjoy eternal gladness.

Scripture Readings 7th July 2019, 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

Third Isaiah wrote this beautiful imagery of a compassionate God to encourage the Jews returning from exile in Babylon to rebuild the Temple. The Lord sends his peace to Jerusalem through which he will give peace and nourishment to those who recognise the new creation coming with Jesus' resurrection.

The psalm praises God's power as revealed throughout history but especially during the Exodus.

This fond farewell concludes our readings from Paul's letter to the Galatians. Human distinctions and marks on our flesh like circumcision no longer signify. We have become a new Spirit-filled creation, the "Israel of God" – God's chosen family to carry God's message to the world. The new Mass translation, “and with your spirit”, picks up Paul's final phrase. God's grace is to be deep and personal, affecting our whole lives.

In the reading from Luke's gospel last week, Jesus “set himself to travel to Jerusalem”. For the rest of Ordinary Time, the “ordinally numbered weeks”, all our gospel readings are from his journey, as Jesus consciously focussed on his coming suffering in Jerusalem. Today we hear of Jesus sending 70 disciples on mission ahead of him, like the 70 elders chosen by Moses to lead the Exodus. But Jesus' disciples are offering Israel a last chance to change her mind about Jesus.

Psalm response: **Cry out with joy to God, all the earth.**

(Is 66:10-14; Ps 65(66):1-20; Gal 6:14-18; Lk 10:1-12,17-20)

I address all the faithful in the words of Saint John in his first letter: “We proclaim to you the eternal life which was with the Father and which was made manifest to us – that which we have seen and heard with us; and our fellowship is with him who has seen and heard we proclaim also to you, so that you may have fellowship with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ” (*1 Jn 1:2-3*).

The Apostle speaks to us of *hearing, seeing, touching and looking upon* (cf. *1 Jn 1:1*) the word of life, since life itself was made manifest in Christ. Called to communion with God and among ourselves, we must proclaim this gift. This imperative to proclaim is a witness to the immense beauty of encountering the word of God in the communion of the Church. For this reason I encourage all the faithful to renew their personal and communal encounter with Christ, the word of life made visible, and to become his heralds, so that the

gift of divine life – communion – can spread ever more fully throughout the world.

Indeed, sharing in the life of God, a Trinity of love, is *complete joy* (cf. *1 Jn 1:4*). And it is the Church's gift and unescapable duty to communicate that joy, born of an encounter with the person of Christ, the Word of God in our midst. In a world which often feels that God is superfluous or extraneous, we confess with Peter that he alone has “the words of eternal life” (*John 6:68*).

There is no greater priority than this: to enable the people of our time once more to encounter God, the God who speaks to us and shares his love so that we might have life in abundance (cf. *John 10:10*).

Alpha in the Autumn

It was moving recently to hear one of our parishioners speaking of how his faith had been enlivened by attending “Alpha”. Pope Francis tells us that evangelisation is addressed to three groups of people.

In reverse order, the third group he speaks of are those who have never heard or have never responded to the loving message of God revealed in Christ Jesus.

The second group are those who call themselves ‘Catholic’, but seldom or never attend Mass and have no meaningful relationship with the Church.

However the first group are those who attend Mass but would benefit from a ‘faith lift’; those who are in church every or most weeks, but whose relationship with God is not as strong as it once was.

The present “Alpha” course is nearing its end, and the dates have been fixed for the next, which will be in the autumn, starting on 17th September and running in Tuesday evenings until 3rd December. Many people have spoken of how this has re-vitalised their faith; please think about joining if you haven't already!
