A Really Big "Thank-you"

This last week has been really busy in the parish, and it has been wonderful to see so many people contributing in so many different ways. Listing everyone and everything is dangerous because it is so easy to leave someone out. Many of the tasks that have been undertaken are "behind the scenes" but no less important for that. Bishop Peter commented on how clean and tidy the church was — and no only the church itself but also the sacristy and foyer and the hall. The silver was polished, floor cleaned, flowers arranged: everything was prepared and this involved many people.

The Bishop had lunch with the "Alpha" team: the food was excellent, and Bishop Peter expressed himself happy with his visitation of the parish. On Monday we celebrated the Feast of St Gregory, and again so many people to thank. As was the case on Sunday, the music was excellent; not only was the Feast celebrated beautifully in church, but there was also a magnificent feast afterwards. Our guests from other parishes were well entertained, and there was an enthusiastic team of washers-up at the end. Very many thanks to all who provided food for the feast.

On Tuesday morning the regular congregation were surprised to find that they were joined by about 200 staff members of the St Thomas of Canterbury Catholic Academy Trust; teachers, teaching assistants, other staff members, governors and directors. This was the beginning of their start of term training day, and Thomas Becket Secondary School in particular were celebrating excellent results in the exams which had been published over the summer. The Catholic primary schools also had good SATS results, and our schools are looking forward to continued improvement.

Tuesday also saw the beginning of the Bible study courses; Ephesians in the morning and the Bible Timeline in the evening. Anyone who missed the first Timeline course has only missed the introduction. During the Readers' course last year many people expressed an interest in this course and asked for it to be run in the evening. It is not too late to start this week! Similarly anyone wanting to study Acts or Matthew at Sacred Heart (Acts on Tuesday mornings, Matthew on Wednesday evenings) can still join.

At 7.00 on Thursday morning we began our Forty Hours Adoration; all day and through the night there were a good number of people in prayer. Adoration continued until 11.00 pm on Friday evening, and ended with Mass. Again, thanks to everyone who has given time to spend with The Lord in prayer. We pray in union with all those at the "Adoremus" congress in Liverpool this week-end. We also pray for God's blessing on the "Alpha" course which starts on Monday. It's not too late to sign up for this — see Maria Heath.

On Saturday Paul and Clare Sefton celebrated their diamond wedding, and their thanksgiving Mass was well-attended. Congratulations to them: "Ad Multos Annos"

This has been an unusually busy week in the parish, and thanks are due to so many people who have worked together and worked hard to make the events a success. The more people who engage in the work of the parish, the more we can grow as a community of faith and fulfil the plan that God has for us and for the Church in this place.

A Real Indian Meal!

Two weeks ago we had a collection for relief of the flooding in Kerala, and this money has been sent through CAFOD to help displaced families. However our local Kerala community are wanting to do something further to help their own communities in India, and have arranged a curry lunch on Sunday $23^{\rm rd}$ September, following on after the 11.00 Mass.

Home-cooked food is not the same as that which is served in most of the Indian restaurants in the town — here is a chance to taste the real thing! (It is said that most so-called "Indian" restaurants are actually run by Bangladeshi's!)

As well as helping the desperate needs of those who have been victims of the flooding, we are invited to share in a delicious meal and get to know our fellow-parishioners better.

Over a million people have had to leave their homes and many thousands of home have been damaged or destroyed. Over 6,000 miles of roads have been damaged or washed away. There have been the worst floods for nearly a century; Kerala received 41% more rain than is usual in the monsoon season. The effects of climate change are at their most devastating in the developing world, while there remain those with their heads buried in the sand in the allegedly developed world who deny that this is happening.

Scripture Readings 9th September 2018, 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

First Isaiah preached in Jerusalem before the exile in 587 BC. In God's presence in the Temple, Isaiah became aware that the great sin is pride: we think we can "do it my way". The nation's disasters were their own fault. They must trust in God, especially in face of the constant threats from Assyria. After dire descriptions of the calamities to come, Isaiah paints this encouraging eschatological picture of the kingdom in the end time.

The psalm praises and thanks God for his generosity and kindness, especially to those who put their trust in him.

James continues his theme that faith must be shown in what we do. His mentioning "synagogue" reminds us how Jewish was the Christian community this "brother of the Lord" was writing for. He insists that faith in Jesus is not compatible with treating people

differently depending how we see them. We are in no position to judge the worth of others.

In Mark's Gospel we see God's kingdom breaking into creation, as Jesus heals first the Syro-phoenician woman's daughter and then a deaf-mute. Isaiah's prophecy is being fulfilled. Naturally the disciples cannot help spreading this good news far and wide. But Jesus cautions them not to do so yet, because his work will not be understood until after the Crucifixion.

Psalm Response: My soul, give praise to the Lord.

This prayer goes back at least to the seventh century, and was used in Eastertide. In its original form, it prayed that those "reborn in Christ", and linked the Baptismal rebirth with the words heard at the Baptism of Jesus: "You are my son, the beloved" (Mark 1:11).

O God, by whom we are redeemed and receive adoption look graciously upon your beloved sons and daughters that those who believe in Christ may receive true freedom and an everlasting inheritance.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reign with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The present missal has placed the prayer for today, and changed "reborn" to believe"."

However, both redemption and adoption are related to Baptism. "Gid sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, in irder to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as children. (*Galatians 4:4-5*)

British Social Attitudes Survey

Last week a new survey has been published, and the media have drawn attention to a general continuing decline among those who identify themselves as belonging to ay religion or faith-group. We may take some comfort in that the numbers who self-identify as Roman Catholic has in fact remained fairly stable.

However this only covers those who self-identify with any particular religion or none. The survey also points out the discrepancy between those who call themselves Catholic and those who actually practice their faith. Only 42% of those who call themselves Catholic actually practice their faith. [For the purposes of this survey, practicing means attending Mass at least once a month.]

There is an interesting paragraph quoting Roger Harding, Head of Public Attitudes at the National Centre for Social Research: "We now from the British Sicial Attitudes Survey that people's attitudes arw becoming more socially liberal on issues like samesex relationships and abortion. With growing numbers belonging to no religion, faith leaders will no doubt be considering how to better connect to a changing society".

This statement seems to indicate a particular attitude; that the Church should adapt its teaching to suit current social attitudes. This is what Pope Benedict XVI spoke of as "relativism". This is absolutely not the understanding of the Catholic Church — our teaching is given to us by God and is not adaptable following public opinion. The publisher's notice in Roy Hattersley's book, "The Catholics" says: "Catholicism survives because it dies not compromise. It is a characteristic that excites admiration I eve a hardened atheist."

The point about a leader is that he/she leads. The person who follows public opinion is not a leader but a follower!
