Thanks to your incredible support, we were able to reach over 1.3 million people last year. That's an amazing impact and it wouldn't have been possible without you. Here are just three examples of the incredible impact your support has. All of this is made possible through the dedication of our local partners, the strength of hardworking communities and the generosity of supporters like you. Helping people affected by war in Ukraine

Since the full-scale invasion of Ukraine, at least 6.8 million people have fled abroad to escape the conflict and another 3.6 million people remain displaced within the country. Millions of families are in urgent need of food, healthcare, shelter and psychological support.

Our sister Caritas agencies and partner organisations are helping people across Ukraine and the wider region. Your generous contributions to the Ukraine Humanitarian Crisis Appeal have helped over 195,000 vulnerable women, men and children.

You've helped:

- Get food to over 120,000 women, men and children.
- Provide emergency health services to more than 20,000 people.
- Support 15,000 people with emergency shelter, home repairs, and warm clothing and fuel to survive the winter.
- Reach out to more than 11,000 people with mental health and psychosocial support services.

Investing in the ambitious plans of women and girls

In Sierra Leone, your support is helping women and girls plan and invest in their own futures.

In Yeabu's village, our local partners helped a group of women and girls set up a savings and loans group.

"My name is Yeabu. This is my story. I just turned 16 and I have six siblings: four sisters and two annoying brothers! I am in third year of secondary school and I am passionate about education and wish to become a professional nurse and be of service to my community. I presently live with my old grandmother. I asked my parents to let me come stay with her so I will be supporting her with the household chores - and that makes me happy!"

The group was given a starting fund of 5,000 Leones, to invest as they saw fit, and training in how to manage lending and borrowing fairly within the group. Yeabu had an idea for a business, so went to the group for a loan.

"I received 200 Leones and started baking and selling bread. I had mastered the act of bread baking from my grandmother as that was her trade. She, however, stopped the business two years ago due to her poor health and I took the opportunity to revive the business. I am sure my decision to revive the bread baking business makes her proud as I saw the smile on her face when I started a few months ago.

"The business has been good, and I have increased my contribution to the savings and loan group from two to four shares per week, and just last week I bought a science textbook which I have been wanting for the past year. With the mentorship support we are now receiving from our (local female entrepreneur) role model, I am sure of attaining my dream of becoming a passionate nurse and can perhaps set up a well-structured bakery and name it after my grandmother."

Adapting to climate change in Bangladesh

With its many intertwining rivers and wide flood plains, Bangladesh has been ranked seventh in a list of the countries most vulnerable to the climate crisis. This is despite the fact that the country produces just 0.56% of the world's harmful emissions.

On the southern coastal belt, ever more frequent cyclones and tidal surges threaten the lives and livelihoods of thousands of families who rely on farming to feed themselves and make a living.

But with our local partners, we are helping families find new ways to make a living, even in the harshest conditions.

By growing organic on the roofs of houses, on trellises above ground, and on floating vegetable gardens on flooded or waterlogged land, farmers have more space to grow the food they need.

Many families have begun using earthworms to create an organic compost to grow vegetables without the need for expensive and environmentally damaging chemical fertiliser. The compost can even be sold to large-scale farmers for extra income.

And all of these techniques help regenerate and protect the environment, and give families ways to cope with the worst effects of the climate crisis.

In the Patuakhali district alone we have helped to support more than 14,000 people, the majority of whom are women, landless families or people living with disabilities.

St Gregory's sent £3,466.62 to CAFOD in the last financial year.

Scripture Readings: 19th Sunday of the Year, 10th August 2025

The Wisdom of Solomon was the last book of the Old Testament to be written. It was written in Greek, not Hebrew, so only in the Septuagint* and therefore not in the Protestant Bible. The final chapters meditate on the Exodus, contrasting the woes visited on the Egyptians at the first Passover with the gifts given by God to the Israelites.

The Psalm celebrates God's faithfulness, power and wisdom, justifying our confidence in him.

The 2nd readings in August from Hebrews describe faith, which gives assurance to our hopes. Abraham is the prime example of a man of faith: he obeyed God's command to go to a new land; he believed God's promise that he and Sarah would have a child in their old age; and he passed the supreme test of faith when God asked

him to sacrifice his only son, Isaac. God's last minute reprieve for Isaac is seen as a return from the dead.

In Luke's Gospel, following the parable we heard last week about the rich man building a bigger barn, Jesus assures us that we will be given all the resources we need to meet the Lord's demands. He then urges us to have faith and to be prepared.



Christ is a feminine Institute of Pontifical Right under the Jurisdiction of the Holy See. Faithful to our Charism and Spirit we have served the people of God in all parts of Nigeria and others following countries of Africa: Ghana, Kenya, Sierra Leone, Chad, Cameroun, Tanzania, Benin Republic and some countries of Europe: Italy, Germany, United Kingdom, Ireland and in the United States America and Canada.

In keeping with the needs of the Church and the Signs of Times, we have been engaged in different works of charity and compassion especially among the poor and the less privileged of the societies where we live and work. We have developed diverse ways of reaching out to them through: our Health Care Services, Schools especially in remote and rural areas, Pastoral Care in every dimension, Care of the Vulnerable, Scholarship Programmes and Infrastructures.

On the 8th of September 2019, The Philanthropic Development Office of the sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Mother of Christ was opened in Birmingham United Kingdom. Philanthropy is all about serving and giving with joy. It is a system of appreciation of God's love, generosity and gifts to His children on the part of the giver and the receiver. The opening event was begun with the cerebration of the Holy Mass. Within the celebration of the Holy Mass all the governing and advisory board members too their oats of office. Immediately after the Holy Mass was the official blessing and the opening of the Philanthropic Development Office. This was followed by the launching of each of the different advocacies in collaboration with the Spring Rain Global Corporation. Indeed the following advocacies were launched:

- FORMATION AND SCHOLARSHIP
- COMMUNITY HEALTH DEVELOPMENT
- CARE OF THE VULNERABLE, DISABLED, ELDERLY AND HIV/AIDS PATIENTS
- HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT
- PASTORAL CARE IN HEALTH
- PHYSICAL STRUCTURES AND EQUIPMENT UPGRADING.

All of the above and more are effective ways of reaching out to the poor and the less privileged of our societies. It is really a call to service and to reach out to others with joy. As indeed there is great joy in serving, giving and sharing.
