Come Home for Christmas

'I rejoiced when they said to me: "Let us go to the house of the Lord" (Psalm 121:1)

There are two parts to the word "Christmas"; "Christ" and "Mass". Without both Christ <u>and</u> Mass, Christmas is incomplete, and without either, it is meaningless. That is why the secular authorities prefer to talk of "the festive season", or worse, "Winterval", or "Crimbo"; a word with no real meaning at all.

While it is important to recognise that many will be celebrating Diwali and others Hanukkah at this time of the year, the Christian heritage represents the bulk of the British population, even though most sadly neglect any sort of Christian observance.

Ignorance or misunderstanding of Christian faith is now endemic in this country. A recent conversation exemplifies this.

"You a Catholic?"

"Yes"

"Is that — like — Christian?"

"Yes. The Catholic Church is the Church founded by Jesus Christ"


"What about Methodist. Is that Christian?"

"Yes, but not quite the same as the Catholic Church. But we all worship Jesus."

The conversation continued in the same vein with the other party clearly lacking any knowledge of Christianity, or indeed of any other religion at all.

He is not to blame for this; our state education system has allowed the teaching of RE to be regarded as unimportant, and the Religious Education Council for England and Wales, a body representing all the major world religions speaks of a "chronic shortage of RE teachers in schools". Part of the reason they offer for this is that the support given to training RE teachers is significantly less that that given to many other subjects. From a low base, the number starting training as specialist RE teachers dropped to less than half of the number required in the current year, 2023-24.

Thankfully, our Catholic schools are not in such a bad way, and those who have been through one of our own schools should have a good grounding in at least the basis of our faith, and though even the best of teachers may sometimes not succeed with every student!



It would be wrong to blame teachers or schools for failures to teach the basic truths of our Faith, because that duty, responsibility and joy belongs to parents first of all.

It is also the responsibility of the entire community to help and asupport our children and young people when there is so much peer-pressure to abandon the Faith, particularly on teenagers.

A recent study suggested that priests and clergy are the 13th most likely group to be replaced by AI. This is on the basis that AI can produce as good or better sermons that most clergy! That is a magnificent misunderstanding of the primary function of the priest! The survey went on to suggest that the decline in churchgoing was because most people belived in science, not religion. That reveals another magnificent misunderstanding. However, it is sadly a widely-held misunderstanding, and one which the Church has not yet properly addressed.

It is a lasting truth that a life without God is a life with something vital missing. Many people realise that there is a gap in their life without realising what that gap is or where it can be filled.

"How are they to hear without someone to tell them" (*Romans 10:14*). We are

accustomed to wishing people a "Happy Christmas". What greater happiness can there be than to recognise Christ and share in his Mass?

Copies of this leaflet are being handed out at Mass today, allowing you to give one to a friend or neighbour, and invite them to come with you to the "house of the Lord" to celebrate Christ's Mass; sharing in the real meaning of the name of the feast.

Please don't just drop them through a letter-box. Give one to a person with whom you can actually fulfil that offer to go with them. Talk to them about the invitation, and if they express worries, talk to them about their concerns. If they are unfamiliar with the celebration of Mass, sit with them and help them follow what is happening.

Pray for them before you give the invitation, and pray that this may be an experience of rejoicing; when you say to someone: "Let <u>us</u> go to the house of the Lord"

Heating Update

Although the boilers are only 18 years old, it appears that they are obsolete, and spare parts no longer available. In addition, the regulations about the flues and exhaust fumes have changed and there are problems regarding the diameter of the water connection pipes so it is not possible simply to fit a new boiler in the place of the old. The heating engineers are researching the best way to proceed, and are hopeful that the new boiler can be fitted by Christmas.

In the meanwhile, we are not completely without heat, and weekday Masses will be either in the Sacristy or the Hall. On Sundays, please can people be careful to keep the outside doors closed as much as possible to keep the heat in and the cold out.

.A number of people have made kind offers to help pay for the new boiler; these are most appreciated. At present we do not know the cost, but both specific donations and/or increased weekly giving will be gratefully received!

10th December 2023, 2nd Sunday of Advent Year B

Isaiah celebrates with fulsome praise their God who has enabled the Israelites to return from exile in Babylon. God has cleared the way for their return, just as He led his people during the Exodus from Egypt. Then God was visible in a small area as a pillar of cloud or fire. Now God's work should be shouted throughout the whole world.

In the Psalm a prophet, after the return from exile, first listens to hear what the Lord has to say, and then reports the joyful happiness revealed to him.

The second letter of Peter, written probably towards the end of the first century, addressed doubts about when Christ would return in majesty. God patiently guides mankind to the promised land of his kingdom, giving everyone plenty of time to turn to him. But the Day of the Lord **will** come, and it will come to all creation, and when we least expect it.

Mark's gospel omits any mention of Jesus' early life. It starts with

Jesus' coming proclaimed by Isaiah and the Baptist. God was revealed to the Jews during the Exodus and in their return from exile. Now He is revealed to the whole world through his Christ, Jesus, confirmed as God's son at his baptism.

A letter from Bishop David for the 2nd Sunday of Advent 2023



In this second week of Advent, we will reflect for a moment on the theme of peace. Of course, when we look around our world today, during these Advent weeks, we see so much need for peace. We see peace needed in the wars that are taking place in the Ukraine and in the Holy Land. We see the need for peace in our communities, we recognise the need for peace within our families and perhaps we recognise too, the need for peace within ourselves as individuals.

As always, I would like to share with you a few words from the Advent scriptures. These are the words of the Prophet Isaiah used by the evangelist Luke to talk about the ministry of John, the son of Zechariah, the one who would be known as the Baptist.

"A voice cries in the wilderness. 'Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight'. Every valley will be filled in, every mountain and hill will be made low, winding ways will be straightened and rough roads made smooth and all mankind will see the salvation of God".

This is the peace that the Lord speaks of in his Word, it is a peace which begins when we are open and receptive to the Word of God,

to the power of God, His Kingdom at work in our lives, and it involves some hard works. The prophet puts it in those beautiful and familiar terms, about hills being laid low and about valleys being filled in.

Sometimes when I'm driving and see workmen on the motorway, it reminds me how challenging it is to keep that road straight that we use so often to get around the place. Then I look inside myself and I recognise that peace comes at a cost. Peace was won for us by our Lord's death on the cross and when we receive the grace of that cross into our lives, then we are at peace with almighty God.

So let's pray for peace in our world and let us recognise that the journey towards worldwide peace, comes with that step of peace within ourselves. When we respond to the invitation of God to become peacemakers, not least, and first of all, within ourselves.

Pope Francis teaching us about prayer

From the moment of creation, God blesses all creatures that he has made (*Genesis 1:22 and 28*). To bless is to 'speak goodness' (*benedicere*) and mankind can equally bless (speak goodness) for others. When we pray for someone, we 'speak goodness' for that person. This is in stark contrast to 'speaking ill' of others, which is forbidden by God. If we have nothing good to say of someone, it is better to say nothing at all! But it is even better that we should pray for those of whom we have nothing good to say.

It is God who is the source of all blessing, and by blessing he has taught us to bless. God's blessing springs from his love, and our love for others drives us to bless them in our prayer. Because it comes from love, it is not only when there is a specific need, such as illness that prompts us to offer this prayer of blessing; it is a daily prayer.

"The prayer of blessing is man's response to God's gifts: because God blesses, the human heart can in return bless the One who is the source of every blessing" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church §2626*).
