70 YEARS YOUNG

On Thursday 11th February 1954 Bishop Parker blessed and opened the new church of St Gregory's, which makes today the 70th anniversary of that day.

Like many who have reached that age, there are signs of ageing, but in spite of the passing of the years, the building is in good shape, and thanks are due to many people who, over the years have contributed to the care and maintenance of the church.

The history of the parish, written by Des Keohane records:

The Official Opening of the new church took place on 11th February 1954. It was the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, and was specifically chosen by Father Phillips, as befitting his strong devotion to the Blessed Virgin and his attachment to Lourdes. The ceremony was conducted by Bishop Leo Parker, who was that day celebrating the fifteenth anniversary of his consecration as a bishop. Also present were Dr Joseph Rudderham, Bishop of Clifton, and Dom Christopher Butler, Abbot of Downside. Bishop Rudderham had been Administrator of Northampton Cathedral, before his elevation in 1949, and was familiar with the St. Gregory development. Abbot Butler, later Auxiliary Bishop in Westminster and well-known in his day as a contributor to television discussion programmes, was a Downside friend of Father Phillips. The Mayor and Mayoress of Northampton, Alderman and Mrs W A Pickering, also attended with officers of the Borough Council and local dignitaries, and a large number of parishioners. All processed from the temporary church and filled the new church to capacity. After blessing the church, Bishop Leo Parker celebrated Pontifical High Mass. A Celebratory Lunch followed in the Abington Parochial Rooms. There was much supportive coverage of the opening in the local press.

There will be few still living who were there at the time, and maybe many of those who have moved into the parish more recently will know little about the origins and early years of the parish. There are copies of the history (up to 2009) on sale in the repository.

The architect chosen to design our church was Sebastian Comper, the son of a famous church architect, Sir Ninian Comper, one of whose most famous works is the Anglican church of St Mary in Wellingborough, and also designed the interior of the Holy House in the Anglican Shrine at Walsingham.

The church was designed in the Roman Basilica style, a style harking back to the churches of early Christian times. The main features derive from the basilica or hall of the Roman era, which encompasses a long central chamber with rows of pillars and two or more side aisles, a high roof to the central area with clerestory (high level) windows, and usually a semi-circular apse. In Roman times the apse was where an important personage would be seated, so in Christian churches it was the appropriate site for the altar. Comper believed that a church should always give focus to the altar, and the height and space of the chosen design enabled him to do this. The commissioned photograph, before seating was installed, best illustrates this.



Comper necessarily adapted to the difficult building conditions of the post-war Fifties and the financial restraints which were set.



Stressed concrete beams, rather than steel, were used in the structure. The containing walls are brick and he chose rustic flettons as they weather well, and he strengthened these walls with buttresses containing a concrete

core. The internal pillars and architraves are reconstituted stone. The flat roof carries the potential problems associated with such roofs. and in 1970 the roof was given a copper covering by the specialist firm of Braby's: effective, but not without its critics at the time on grounds of cost. The floor is made of wood blocks. The architect disliked radiators, which he deemed intrusions on the spaciousness that he valued, and because they made dirty marks on the walls. He had installed, therefore, a "plenum" system by which the heat rises from a series of grilles in the floor. Bearing in mind the height of the church, this has not been without problems. (*Extract from Des Keohane's history of the church.*)

The Idea of the Jubilee

The origin of the 'Jubilee' is to be found in the Bible: after 49 years (7 x 7 years) you shall have the trumpet sounded loud to proclaim the Jubilee Year. (see Leviticus 25:8-13) The word 'jubilee' comes from Hebrew name of the rams horn trumpet, 'yobel'.

Jesus refers to the Jubilee as his 'manifesto', quoting Isaiah: "The Spirit of the Lord is on me because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord". (Luke 4:18-19; Isaiah 61:1-2)

The tradition of the Christian Jubilee or 'Holy Year' began in 1300, called by Pope Boniface VIII. From 1470, the Jubilee was been held every 25 years, although there have also been 'extra-ordinary' Holy Years to mark significant anniversaries or occasions, most recently the Year of Mercy in 2015.

Just as the original Jewish Jubilee was a year of forgiveness and liberation, so the Christian Jubilee is a celebration of forgiveness, and the Sacrament of Reconciliation is an important part of this liberation.

The traditional pilgrimage venue was Rome, and each of the four Papal basilicas has a special door which is only opened in Holy Years, as a sign of entering a new phase in life after forgiveness. In 2015, recognising that the cost of getting to Rome was too much for many people, each diocese in the world was asked to have "doors of mercy" so that no one was prevented from participating in the Holy Year.

Sunday 11th February: The 6th Sunday of the Year, Year B

Leviticus, the third book of the Pentateuch, describes rituals used by the priests. Laws and rituals kept Israelites in the state of legal purity to which they were called, as a sign of their union with the Lord. A leper had to live apart in a dishevelled state, warning people to keep away. A cleansing ritual was specified for anyone cured.

This penitential Psalm celebrates the joy of confessing sins and knowing forgiveness. An omitted verse describes the misery of deferring confession.

Paul continues his theme of not placing obstacles which might hinder the spreading of the gospel. The Corinthians should eat whatever is put before them. They should not risk giving offence to their host, even if they suspect some food is ritually unclean by being offered to heathen gods before being sold in the market. But they should not eat food that they are told has been offered to idols – because that would offend their informant's conscience.

Mark's gospel continues with another healing, this time Jesus shows enormous tenderness in insisting that – of course – he wants to heal the leper. And he does so by touching the unclean leper – so becoming unclean himself. Jesus makes very visible how much God wants to heal us.


of our Trinity God and through prayer, enter into a relationship with the Father, His Beloved Son and the Holy Spirit.

It is a prayer born out of the Heart of Christ in His prayer to His Heavenly Father. And that's why we respond to the privilege of sharing this prayer in the liturgy by saying, we dare to say.

Please know that I pray this prayer for you all every day. Let us keep each other in prayer as we pray the Our Father in preparation for the Jubilee Year.
