The Rite of Mass

Dear friends,

HAPPY CHRISTMASTIDE!

Today we have arrived at the last liturgical day of the Christmas season. I hope the Mass you participated in for **The Solemnity of the Epiphany** caused you to come away with hearts that were rejoicing; just as the Wise Men rejoiced when they encountered the Christ Child in the family home of Our Lady and St Joseph.

Together we have arrived at this celebration of the Baptism of the Lord. First, we acknowledge that the Baptism of the adult Jesus and the preaching of the challenging prophet St John are far less attractive than the arrival of a Baby and the visit of angels, shepherds and the Magi! Secondly, we must ponder why Jesus is being baptised by St John. When people went to St John they did so in acknowledgment of their sins; for the washing of Jewish baptism symbolised the leaving behind of such sin. However, Jesus had no sins to repent of, hence why St John objects to Jesus' request that He be Baptised. Therefore, as Pope Benedict XVI said, it was our sins that Jesus Christ took with Him into the waters. Consequently, **Jesus “liquifies” sin by being plunged into the waters of the River Jordan.** So yes, Jesus took upon Himself our sins, and those of the whole world, first in His Baptism and then in His passion and death on the Cross of Calvary.

Therefore, in His Baptism Jesus is anticipating His passion and death. **Likewise, our own Holy Baptism was a sharing in the death and resurrection of the Lord.** In the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, we died with Christ and we will rise with Him into eternity, that is, if we carry our cross and follow Him every day. So yes, Baptism for the Lord Himself, and for each of us, leads to the Holy Cross and to the triumph of the Garden of the Resurrection! Easter, of course, being the next great season of joy which awaits us.

'Fire' Update: We are currently waiting to hear from the loss adjuster as regards the quotation for substantial repair works to the foyer, sacristy, hall and toilets. We have sent to several companies a full list of works that the insurer is willing to financially cover. We have had a reasonable quote for the removal of the fire damaged items and therefore the diocesan Property Department is going to proceed with this work ASAP; however, this does not include cleaning, making good or decoration. Once removal of the fire damaged items is completed the water supply can be turned on. However, restoring electricity to the building will take considerably longer; a quote for this work has been received and has been sent to the loss adjuster for review. It will be necessary to purchase some equipment over the coming weeks (for which we need to keep all receipts) and the cost of which can be included in the insurance claim. We are very thankful to the small team of volunteers who have given the Church a preliminary clean. Any repository stock unaffected by the fire will be available for sale when we reopen.


Sprinkle your front door with Holy Water saying:
