The Return from Exile: First task

It has seemed very much like an exile from the church in the last three months, but now, step by step, we have begun to return. There are striking parallels with the return from exile in Babylon of the Jewish people.

In the book of Daniel we read of the fall of the Babylonian Empire to that of the Medes and Persians (*Daniel chapter 5*). Nebuchadnezzar, who had deported the exiles from Jerusalem died in 562 BC, after which the Babylonian Empire began to crumble (as was predicted in the interpretation of the dream (*Daniel 2:24-45*)). Nebuchadnezzar was succeeded by Evil-Merodach (*see 2 Kings 25:27*), and then a further succession of rulers until Belshazzar, and finally in 539, Cyrus of Persia invades and takes control of Babylon.



The ‘Cyrus Cylinder’, now in the British Museum records his conquest of Babylon and how he allowed all who were held in exile there to return to their homelands and financed the rebuilding of their cities, including the exiles from Jerusalem, as recorded in the book of Ezra (*inaccurately quoted in Ezra 1:2-4*).

The return to Jerusalem was not accomplished immediately, and appears to have been in three waves. The first began in 537. Led by Sheshbazzar, they followed the same route that Abraham had taken centuries earlier on his way to the promised land, and this journey would have been made with that in mind. They also were carrying the Temple treasures that Nebuchadnezzar had plundered and had been returned by Cyrus — there is a relief sculpture of this in Persepolis in modern Iran. This would have recalled the return from Egypt after their years of slavery there, when they had plundered the wealth of the Egyptians.

Their first task was the rebuilding of the Temple, and re-establishing of worship. This is the message of the prophet Haggai.

This was not accomplished without difficulty, although the people were willing and generous. “As soon as they came to the house of the Lord in Jerusalem, some of the heads of families made free-will offerings for the house of God, to erect it on its site” (*Ezra 2:68*)

In relation to our return to the church, many people have shown great generosity. Many have made financial gifts over and above their regular giving to the Church. Many have given up a great deal of time to help with stewarding while the restrictions continue, and many have come to pray, which is, after all, what the church is for.

The difficulties that the returnees had was to do with their relationship with the Samaritans. We know, from the Gospels that this was strained in the time of Jesus, and the origins of this go back to the era of the return from exile.

Samaria was the capital of the northern kingdom when it split from Judah after the death of Solomon. The prophets of the Northern Kingdom; Elijah, Elisha, Amos and Hosea tell us of the behavior of the kings and people of the North, and how they offended God. They warn that this will lead to disaster, as indeed it does when Assyria invades Israel, and thereafter there is a sort of amalgamation of pagan worship with a watered down remembrance of the worship of the true God. These people became the Samaritans.

When the Babylonian exiles returned, the Samaritans offered to help them in rebuilding the Temple. (*Ezra 4:1-2*) However this offer was rejected, and thereafter there was conflict between the Jews and the Samaritans.

We need to learn from this. In the Gospels, we find that Jesus himself had a better relationship with Samaritans; indeed one of his best-known parables has a Samaritan as the hero. At the end of his ministry, Jesus specifically lists Samaria as a place to be evangelized (*Acts 1:8*). We read the Old Testament in the light of the New.

Worship comes first. We have returned to our church, first for private prayer, and now for the offering of Mass. We did not need to rebuild the physical structure of the church, but we remember that St Peter tells us that we are “living stones” (*1 Peter 2:4-10*), and it is as a worshipping community that we need to be rebuilt.

In a physical building, the bricks and stones cannot be ‘socially distanced’; they must be in close proximity, and bound together with mortar. We are bound together in the love of God, and ‘social distancing’ is un-natural for us. There is an uneasy pause at Mass after the greeting: “The peace of the Lord be with you always”; we know that something should follow this, and we miss greeting one another at this point. We can learn what is the true value and significance of the Rite of Peace and grow together in love.

We remember too that there are many who are shielding or vulnerable and unable to be at Mass; the camera recording the Mass is for their benefit. May we all be rebuilt into God’s living temple.

Fairtrade: Nestlé have decided to stop using fairtrade chocolate in their KitKat chocolate bars. This has come as a great disappointment to up to 27,000 farmers in Côte d'Ivoire, Fiji and Malawi. Scripture Readings 12th July 2020, 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Second Isaiah, writing around 550 BC, concludes his "Book of Comfort" to the Jewish exiles in Babylon with an invitation to a joyful banquet. After renewing His covenant of peace, God has reminded Israel that "my thoughts are not your thoughts": God's words come down gently to bring forth divine fruits, like the rain which enables the earth to yield its fruits.

The psalm give God praise and thanks for his power over all the earth and the rains which produce abundant crops.

Paul continues this theme of God's plan slowly moving towards its climax: creation is unable to attain its purpose without help, and it was made this way by God. Paul gives us a brilliantly clear vision of God's plan: with the coming of Christ creation is now groaning in the birth pangs of being set free.

It is worth listening carefully to Matthew's explanation of the parable of the sower. And especially to Jesus' very difficult statements that he talks to the crowds in parables because "they listen without hearing or understanding". He says "They have shut their eyes, for fear they should see, ... and be converted". The coming of Jesus brings both judgement and mercy. But some will not receive God's words, unless their minds are open and cease making their own image of God.
