First Holy Communion Preparation

One of the themes of this day derives from the last line of a famous poem by Lawrence Binyon: "We will remember them". We do remember in prayer, in love and gratitude for those who have died in warfare. With no slight upon them, those words should equally apply to all those for whom prayers are asked. Today, as well as those who have died in warfare, we are asked to remember those who are beginning their journey towards their first Holy Communion.

This is a journey that they do not make alone, and first among those who travel with them are their parents, and maybe their siblings. Near the beginning of the Bible we find the words: "It is not good that the man should be alone". (*Genesis 2:18*) Jesus called together a group of people; disciples, apostles; people who soon became a community of faith, and later, inspired with the Holy Spirit, became what we now call the Church.

Those who are preparing for their first Holy Communion are not just members of their domestic household, they are members of the Church, and we are all called to remember them in prayer and to support them in any way we can.

In times past it was common to have a notice-board with photographs and names of all those preparing for First Holy Communion; one of the consequences of the Church taking safeguarding and child protection more seriously has been the ending of this. Its purpose was to encourage prayer. Even without this reminder, we will remember them.

The scheme we use is entitled "Growing Up Catholic", and it is not just to do with Sacramental preparation but with the entire process of bringing up children as Catholic. As in every aspect of bringing

up children, the first responsibility lies with the parents. The Church must be there to support the parents, but cannot replace the parents.

There was a time when Catholic schools and parishes took on the responsibility and deprived parents of the joy of walking this journey together with their children. We have realised that in doing this we were wrong, but we do need to provide parents with the support they need.

There are sessions for parents and their child together, and together they work through the programme. Over the past few years as we have been using this programme, most of the feed-back has been that parents appreciate this 'quality time' with their child. It cannot be an imposition to ask a parent to spend time with their child, although in the present age there always seems to there is so much that needs to be done! A wise grandmother gave this advice to a new mother: "Your child will never remember if its pyjamas were not ironed, but will remember if you didn't spend time together". The hours parents are able to spend with their children are so precious, and it is good that the Church is now helping this rather than taking children away from their parents

One of the ways in which the congregation supports the families of those on this journey is through simple human friendship. We invite everyone at Sunday Mass to come through to the hall afterwards, and this is a way of bonding friendships in the community of faith. If yours is a family on this journey, please share in the refreshments offered. If there is a family on this journey sat next to you in church, invite them to come through with you.

But, above all, keep them in your prayers. But be warned! Prayer leads us to action.

We will remember them

The date of November 11th, Armistice Day, goes back to the ending of the First World War, 104 years ago. No one living now will remember that, and there are no living veterans of that war. There are few left who fought in the Second World War

Nearly all who have seen action in war would prefer that the world could live in peace, but the sad reality is that evil is loose in the world, and the playground bully at school can grow older into the national leader who carries on in the same way. He may grow older, but does not grow up—he remains the playground bully, but his playground is no longer the school but another country.

While hating the practice of war, the Church recognises that nations have a right to defend themselves against illegal and immoral aggression.



The war in Ukraine is evidence of the failure of international diplomacy, and as we pray for a speedy and just end to the present conflict, we should also be praying that the United Nations will find a way preventing future wars. Aggressor nations and bullying leaders must learn that just claims can be resolved peacefully. Surely anyone with half a brain can see that the waste of national resources on arms and ammunition adds to the hunger and deprivation of the poorest in their own countries, never mind the rest of the world, not to mention the loss of life and the attendant grief and suffering.

Many of us will have ancestors who died in the wars of the last century, and we will not forget them. Neither will we forget those who are dying in the present conflicts; in the main, those who are forced to risk their lives for the sake of the ambition of others.

Scripture Readings 13th November 2022, 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

Writing anonymously about 460 BC, after the Jews returned from their Babylonian exile to rebuild the Temple, Malachi criticises the people's religious indifference, priestly abuses, intermarriage with pagans and divorce: "Where is the God of justice?" But he promises the day of the Lord is coming, preceded by a messenger to prepare the way, seen by Christians as John the Baptist. When that day comes evil-doers will be burnt up, while those who fear the Lord will be energised and healed, gambolling with joy, treading on ashes of evil-doers.

The psalm urges all creation to praise the Lord for His victorious salvation.

The Thessalonians had heard a forged letter saying the Lord's second coming was very close. Some had stopped working for a living and were "interfering in everyone else's" work. Paul says they are "busybodies", stirring up trouble! They should be

shunned until they pull their weight in the community, as Paul did when he was with them.

In the Gospel Jesus foresees the destruction of the Temple, and the disasters, persecutions and false prophets that must precede the second coming. But we must not worry about these future problems, nor try to guess the day of the Lord's second coming. We should concentrate on the day-to-day following of Jesus, placing all our trust in Him.
