Our Vision of the parish in 2033

Last week there was a big conference in Harrogate, entitled the "Catholic Parish Summit", attended by Bishops, Priests, Deacons and many from many walks of life and many places.

Among the Bishops were Archbishops Zbignevs Stankevics from Riga in Latvia and Mark O'Toole from Cardiff and Menevia, Bishops Kestutis Kevalas from Lithuania, Maksimijan Matjaz from Slovenia, Jan Liesen from Holland, John Keenan from Scotland and our own Bishop David. There were delegates from South Africa, Australia and New Zealand, USA and Canada as well as many from this island. Altogether there were over 800 registered

delegates, and the common factor was a desire to see the Church grow. Our diocese was not only represented by our bishop, but by a good number of people from many parishes, including the Cathedral and St Gregory's.

In nine years we will be celebrating the 2,000th anniversary of the Resurrection and when the Church was given the commission to proclaim the Good News to the ends of the earth. (*Acts 1:8*) The increased secularisation of Europe and the (so-called) developed world gives the impression that we are not doing very well in this commission, although globally, the Church is indeed growing. However, in Western Europe over the last many decades, growth has been limited and we have been blessed by the arrival of people from other countries where the faith has been stronger.

The conference offered us a vision of how we could bring that growth which the Church is seeing in the (so called) developing world to this country, so that we could reach a point by 2033 where the Church can be on a firm trajectory of growth here. This is clearly not a 'quick fix' programme, and is not achieved by one simple action, and yet, at the heart, it does require a simple action on the part of many people. That decision is to become a missionary disciple.

There are many disciples who have listened to Jesus, and enjoy listening to him, but have not yet responded to his call to action: "Go out into the world and proclaim the Good News". (*Mark 16:15*) The task is to encourage those who love



Jesus, to listen to him, who are fed by him to take the next step.

That can seem a frightening prospect, but at the conference we heard the stories of many who had embraced that fear and 'put out into the deep'. (*Luke 5:4*) We heard from many whose faith had been awakened, and also many who had first come to faith through someone else who had 'put out into the deep'.

We were reminded that the secular world is not actually making people happier. One way in which this is being clearly seen is the rise in issues of mental health, particularly among the young. This is not just an effect of lockdown, it is much more deep-rooted than that. Jesus has the answer to so many of today's problems that lie at the cause of people's unhappiness and discontent.

We heard many stories of young people who had not so much 'rejected' Christianity as had not the slightest understanding of what Christianity is; such is the poverty of religious education in many secular schools.

St Gregory's embarked on this journey back in the autumn of 2017 and six-and-a half years later it is time to take stock and set the course for the coming years. We have a small team who are actively engaged in the work of evangelisation; some on the 'front-line', others in active support, and vitally, some in daily prayer. To achieve the 2033 goal, backed by Pope Francis, we need to vastly enlarge this team. We are all being challenged!

Sunday 16th June: 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

Ezekiel has many chapters about Israel's failure to keep faith in God, culminating in the Babylonian exile. But God keeps his promises: He will restore his people to Israel. A remnant will survive and return to Zion, to build a renewed and perfect creation.

The Psalm extolls the Lord's just deeds: "the just" are so steadfast they appear rooted, flourishing "in the courts of our God", while "evildoers shall be scattered".

Paul has described some of his difficulties, accepting that "while we live we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake". He encourages the Corinthians to have confidence in the Lord: whatever problems we face in our earthly lives, we look forward to making "our home with the Lord". Then our reward will be affected by our behaviour in this world.

In Mark's gospel Jesus describes the kingdom of God in parables. All around us are examples of transformation, seeds becoming unimaginable plants. We have got used to thinking of the kingdom of God as "somewhere else" - in "heaven" rather than on earth. But Jesus' parables do not suggest this, and in the Lord's Prayer we ask every day that God's kingdom come "on earth, as it is in heaven". Do we mean it? What are we doing about it?

Psalm Response: It is good to give you thanks, O Lord.

(Ezekiel 17: 22-24; Psalm 91(92); 2 Cor 5: 6-10; Mark 4: 26-34)

Ignatius Spencer and a Third Spring

On Sunday afternoon, 7th July at 3.00 pm as part of the Becket Festival, there will be a lecture on the life of the Venerable Ignatius Spencer, who was one of the heroes of the 'Second Spring'.

St John Henry Newman described the re-birth of the Catholic Church in England as a 'Second Spring' in his homily at Mass at Oscott College on July 13th 1852. For 300 years Catholics had been persecuted, many had been tortured and put to death for their faith, and all had suffered discrimination and disadvantage. Most of this formally ended in 1829, although there still remain on the statute book some discrimination, even now.

In 1852, with Catholic dioceses re-established in England, Newman foresaw the 'coming in of a Second Spring', the first having begun with the mission of St Augustine, sent by our Patron, St Gregory, and come into a glorious summer when the Church established hospitals, schools, support for the hungry and homeless through the monasteries and all sanctified by prayer and worship.

This summer was tragically followed by the winter brought in by Henry VIII, so desperate to have a son that he sold this heritage for the hope of a dynasty. It is a further tragic irony that it was a daughter of his who gave her name to the Elizabethan Age, while his sickly and weak son died at the age of 16.

Throughout this winter, there were faithful Catholics who maintained the faith in secret. There were houses with 'Priest-holes' where priests were able to hide if necessary and the children of Catholic families were sent abroad for their education. But in the 19th century the frost began to thaw, new Catholic churches were built, secret Catholics could come out into the open, and Catholic immigrants were able to come; particularly from Ireland. Missions were held, and there were many converts; most famously among them was John Henry Newman, later Cardinal Newman and now Saint John Henry Newman.

George Spencer was also a convert, 15 years before Newman. He had been brought up at Althorp, the great-great-great-great uncle of the Prince of Wales, but abandoned his wealth and heritage to become a Passionist priest, taking the name of Ignatius. He made it possible for Blessed Dominic Barberi to come to England, and they established a mission at Stone in Staffordshire to convert this land.

Through the second half of the 20th century we have endured another winter, but there are early signs of a new spring; a 'Third Spring'. May we ask the prayers of the Venerable Ignatius Spencer, who has a great connection to Northampton, that this not be in any way a 'false spring', but may lead to a new and glorious summer on our land. We seek a miracle to proceed the cause of the beatification of Ignatius Spencer. May the fruition of our mission be such a miracle!

Everyone is invited to come to the lecture at the Cathedral — in the St Thomas Centre, given by Fr Gerard Skinner who wrote a biography of Ignatius Spencer: 3.00 pm on Sunday 7th July.
