The Return: Look to the Book

Last week we started examining the return of the exiles to Jerusalem, as told in the books of Ezra and Nehemiah, as well as the prophets of the time; Haggai, Zecheriah and Malachi. The reason for looking at this part of the Old Testament is that we can learn from this about our own return to Mass in church.

There were three phases of the return from exile, the first was in 537 or 538 BC, and had the task of the rebuilding of the Temple. We know that it is the community itself that is the Church, and our task is not so much the rebuilding of the physical structure of the church; rather it is about rebuilding the community of faith that has been affected by lockdown and social isolation.

This is vitally important task, and this will be explored in the coming weeks, but for this week, our theme is the second return. This was not a single migration, but took place over a period of around 75 years. Chapter 8 of the book of Nehemiah tells of how the people assembled to hear the words of the Book of the Law were read to them. "Ezra had set his heart to study the Law of the Lord, and to do it, and to teach the statutes and ordinances in Israel" (*Ezra 7:10*).

For Ezra and the returning exiles, the Book of the Law was the first five books of the Old Testament. For us, the Book is the entire Bible. The first task is the rebuilding of the community; the second is to deepen our love and knowledge of the Word of God.

The chronology of the books of Ezra and Nehemiah seem to be somewhat unclear, and that may help our understanding of how these tasks, together with that which we will examine next week relate to each other. They are not necessarily sequential; one after the other; rather they go on side-by side at the same time. Indeed, the opportunity of the lockdown (our exile) has given us a wonderful opportunity (dare one say, even a God-given opportunity) to have to time for reading and studying the Scriptures.

There is a need for care here: Jesus speaks to the Jewish scribes: "You study the Scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that testify on my behalf. Yet you refuse to come to me to have life." (John 5:39-40)

The Scriptures have to be studied in the light of faith; they are not simply documents of literature. The written word of God points to the living Word of God, the Word that was made flesh and lived among us; Jesus Himself.

That is why we read that there were Levites to give the interpretation of the words that Ezra read (*Nehemiah 8:8*). It is not just the reading of the word that matters, it is understanding the word, and realizing what God is actually saying to us at this moment that matters. That was the case for the hearers in the days of Ezra, when the people

realized that they had done wrong and resolved to put it right. (*Ezra 10:1-5*)

We have been blessed to have had access to the 'Bible Timeline' courses, and as soon as we are able to meet together again without 'social distancing', we will be resuming these courses.

The foundation of these is the basic Bible Timeline course, which over 23 sessions takes us through the history of salvation, from Genesis through to the life of the Church as told in the Acts of the Apostles. As we read the narrative books we are able to place the books of the prophets and other books of the Old Testament in context, and in the New Testament to recognize the people to whom St Paul wrote his letters.

For those who have not engaged in adult Scripture study before, this is an excellent place to start. It does not assume any prior knowledge, and the small-group conversations help us to gain understanding, while the video presentations give a lucid explanation, all supported by reference to the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

After the Timeline course, there is a detailed course on St Matthew's Gospel, which examines the Jewish roots of our faith, and then a course on the Acts of the Apostles. Each of these last about 6 months, and it is not recommended that anyone does more than one a year, so these 'foundation courses' would take three years.

Having done the foundation courses, there are a number of short courses, and new ones are being added each year. We have just ordered the latest one, on the Letter to the Hebrews.

There is a course on the Psalms, on the letter of James, on the letter to the Ephesians and on the Book of Revelation (Apocalypse). In addition to that there is one on the Mass and on Our Lady, both based on Bible Study, and one on the life of the Early Church.

We have no idea when restriction will be lifted; the most recent government statement said it would continue "for the foreseeable future". [People will differ in their opinion of the capacity of the government to foresee.] We still hope that we can re-start courses in the autumn, but it may not be until next year; no dates can be given yet.

However, it is not too soon to be making a resolution to take part in a course when they do restart. In particular, all those who are readers at Mass would benefit from them. In the years when we have been running them, the vast majority of those who have participated have said how much they have benefitted; most have come back to do more courses. It is not just the benefit; the building of new community friendships have been an additional benefit, helping to rebuild the temple of the Church.

A note of the time and place of the celebration of Mass during the pandemic

Although normality has certainly not returned, Mass will return to its normal times from Monday 27th July; that is to say, at 9.00 every day except Thursdays when it is at 7.00 pm. Recently very few people have been coming to church in the afternoon, so the opening times will change to opening at 8.30 am and closing at 12.00 noon. It is important that we all play our part in preventing the spread of the virus, and social distancing', hand-washing and general hygiene are the best ways we as individuals and as a Church community can do this.

The obligation to attend Sunday and Holy Day Mass remains lifted and those who are shielding and those who feel unwell (whether with 'official' CoVid-19 symptoms or not) should not attend Mass. Those who feel vulnerable (whether officially so or not) should also not attend. The on-line Mass cannot be made available until after it has been celebrated, most days this will be by midday, but not on Thursdays, when Mass is at 7.00 pm, and cannot be uploaded until after about 8.00 pm.

Fairtrade: Nestlé have decided to stop using Fairtrade chocolate in their KitKat chocolate bars. This has come as a great disappointment to up to 27,000 farmers in Côte d'Ivoire, Fiji and Malawi. There is a petition asking Nestlé to reverse this decision: https://www.change.org/p/ulf-mark-schneider-nestle-global-ceo-keep-kitkat-fairtrade (Otherwise, have a break from KitKat.) So far over 27,000 people have signed, and there is an update on the petition website. As a Fairtrade parish, we should all be supporting this.

Scripture Readings 19th July 2020, 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Book of Wisdom was probably written in Alexandria about 50 years before Christ, to encourage the faith of Jews living in a pagan Egypt. It wrestles with the age-old problem that evildoers are not punished in this world. Wisdom insists that God is just and merciful: he will reward the just after death, although this book does not say how. We can see that God moderates his own power with his justice from the way he gave the Canaanites time to repent during the exodus, and we should follow his example by showing mercy to those who hurt us.

The psalm really says it all this week: God is a loving God, a "God of mercy and compassion, slow to anger", "good and forgiving, full of love to all who call." Eventually "all the nations" – ie the Gentiles – will come to adore God.

Paul has been telling the Romans we may have confidence in the future life God has planned for us. God sends the Spirit to help us and to enable us to express our prayers more meaningfully.

The Gospel shows God's mercy in action. Instead of venting punishment on sinners and immediately uprooting them, God patiently gives us time to repent.

Year of the Word

As the 'God Who Speaks' Scripture initiative is extended through 2021 to take into account the cancellation of many non-digital events planned for this year, BBC Radio 4's Sunday Worship programme comes from Yorkshire and focuses on a special Bible-focused service "A Word for All Seasons".

2020 is the 'Year of the Word' in the Catholic Church in England and Wales – to celebrate, share and live out faith through deeper Scriptural engagement.

Dioceses across our two countries have engaged in different projects as part of this initiative and <u>BBC Radio 4's Sunday Worship</u>, scheduled for 8:10am on 19 July, comes from the <u>Diocese of Leeds</u> where priests and parishioners have been exploring the 'Word Unlocked'.

Fr Michael Hall will lead 'A Word for All Seasons' to reflect on how the 'God who Speaks' meets us in the changing

circumstances of our lives – especially significant at a time when many Christians will have been turning to the Bible for comfort through the coronavirus pandemic.

Fr Michael is parish priest of two churches St Joseph's and St Patrick's in Brighouse and Elland respectively.

The service will include Scripture passages that have particular emphasis on the importance of the Word of God and hymns and motets previously recorded in Leeds Cathedral by the Leeds Diocesan Choirs.

The homily will be given by the Diocese of Leeds' newest priest, the soon-to-be "Father" Henry Longbottom who will be ordained in Leeds Cathedral just two days before the Sunday Worship Programme.

The God Who Speaks initiative is a partnership between <u>Bible Society</u> and the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales
