# **Christian Materialism**

There has always been a tension in Christianity between life in the Spirit and our human existence. Like so many tensions in life, the answer has to be found in the 'both-and' rather than the 'either-or'.

Our faith proclaims that God is the creator of all that is "visible and invisible". God looked on all that he had created "and it was very good". (*Genesis 1:31*) When sin entered the world, it was mankind who fell, not the rest of creation.

The phrase "the world, the flesh and the devil" has entered our understanding as being opponents to the spiritual life, and this is true, not because, in the case of the world and the flesh, they are intrinsically evil, but because if we raise them to a higher place than God in our desires, we have become evil.

St Thomas recognises them as sources of temptation, and in this he is following the Bible. When Jesus was in the wilderness he was tempted to demonstrate his power by throwing himself off the Temple and so to win admiration in the world; to make bread out of stones to relieve his own hunger - a temptation of the flesh, and to worship the devil himself. These do not make the world of the flesh evil, but indicates that both can be sources of temptation and can be abused.

The summit of Christian materialism is to be found in the Incarnation: "The Word became flesh". (*John 1:14*) God did not just create the flesh; he actually inhabits the flesh. But he went further than that: "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me and I in them". (*John 6:56*)

Some have sought to water down this teaching, as Jesus was asked to do at the time, but rather than do this, he let people go (*see John 6:66-69*). The Eucharist is not just spiritual; the Spirit gives life to the flesh. (*see Genesis 2:7*)

So the Eucharistic Prayers of the Church all contain what is called the 'epiclesis'; the invocation of the Holy Spirit to consecrate the bread and wine so that they may become the Body and Blood of Christ This is a very important moment in the Mass, and is indicated by a particular gesture by the celebrant — hands are stretched over the gifts of bread and wine. This gesture is specific to the calling down of the Spirit— it is central to the rite of Confirmation when the Bishop calls down the Spirit on those who are being Confirmed; it is to be found in the blessing of Baptismal water at the Easter Vigil; in the laying on of hands in the Sacrament of the Sick and in the rites of ordination.

There have been heresies which have seen the world and the flesh as in themselves intrinsically evil. One of the most prolific was that known as Albigensianism which flourished in the 12<sup>th</sup> century in southern France, and was a re-appearance of the Manichaean heresy of earlier times and there have been tendencies in this direction in later centuries.

Today's feast of the Body and Blood of Christ is a clear affirmation of God's love for his creation, and as we honour Jesus in his material presence in the Blessed Sacrament, so too we honour God in the entirety of creation; in the value of the created environment and the infinite value of human life from conception to its natural death.

The Catholic convert, Eve Tushnet has expressed it thus:

"I definitely feel that [the Church] is the place where I need to be because of the Eucharist. That's what initially made me sure I would need to become Catholic: Its vividness, its visceral quality, the fact that God would do this really emphasizes the importance of our bodies and the importance of the physical world. And also it's very lurid and scandalous to people today, just as it first scandalized people when Jesus told them what he was going to do. And I think there's something in that kind of shocking, fleshly, and even materially violent aspect of the Eucharist that responds to the world as we find it, which is shocking, and violent, and lurid. I feel like any religion that made it easier to understand or abstract away from that violence would be hard to believe."

## Scripture Readings 19th June 2022, Corpus Christi, Year C

In Eucharistic Prayer I – the Roman canon – we hear these words just after the Consecration: "the bread and wine offered by your priest Melchizedek". Melchizedek, the Canaanite priest-king of Jerusalem, offered food and drink to Abram and his 318 retainers as they returned from victory, blessing Abram in the name of the one God they both believed in. Abram accepted Melchizedek's blessing and gave him a tithe. Their shared meal confirmed them both as God's people.

When David captured Jerusalem he took over this priest-kingship. Hence today's Psalm praising David, appointed by God as a "priest for ever of the order of Melchizedek", while also asserting the dignity of the Messiah as both king and royal priest.

The author of Hebrews saw Melchizedek's priesthood as superior to the Levitical priesthood and saw Jesus, descendent of David, with his gift of bread and wine to his disciples, as succeeding to this ancient priesthood.

Paul had told the Corinthians to stop misbehaving during the Eucharist. He then gave this earliest description we have of its institution during the last meal Christ shared with his disciples before Calvary.

Melchizedek's offering of food to Abram is echoed in the feeding of the 5,000 in the Gospel, anticipating Christ giving himself to us as heavenly food in the Eucharist.

Psalm Response: You are a priest for ever, a priest like Melchizedek of old.

(Genesis 14:18-20; Psalm 109(110):1-4; 1 Cor 11:23-26; Luke 9:11-17)

## **Forty Hours Prayer**

From the earliest time the Blessed Sacrament has been kept in a safe place so that the sick can receive Holy Communion, and this 'safe place' became a special place of prayer. When it became legal in the Roman Empire to be a Christian and permanent places of worship could be built, prayer before the Blessed Sacrament became an established part of Christian devotion.

The idea of forty hours continuous prayer was first popularised in Milan in the sixteenth century. This was part of the great revival in the Church at the end of the mediaeval period, when within the Church there were many reforming initiatives to put right the abuses that had crept into the Church. By 1550 both St Philip Neri and St Ignatius Loyola had adopted this devotion for the Oratorians and the Jesuits, and Pope Clement VIII instituted a system so that there would be 40 Hours in every church in Rome so that "at every hour of the day and night, the whole year round the incense of prayer shall ascend without intermission before the face of the Lord." (*Graves et diuturnae; November 25, 1592*) In recent times there has been a re-awakening of this devotion, and for some years now, this parish has made use of this time of prayer; primarily with the intention of supporting our efforts in evangelisation.

The period of 40 hours is linked to the time when the friends of Jesus were separated from his body — this time when his body

was laid in the tomb on Good Friday afternoon to the time when Mary Magdalene saw his risen body on Easter morning. Those first 40 hours was a time of uncertainty, but for some, a time of trust, for others a time of doubt. It was a time of waiting for God, and at the end of those 40 hours he surprised them with his great miracle of power in the resurrection.

For us it is a time in which we pray for a great miracle in the conversion of souls; first that we ourselves may be fully converted to a complete obedience to his will; that our parish may become fully oriented towards mission and evangelisation. Some may be uncertain about this, others may doubt. Yet Jesus, who promised us the Holy Spirit to lead us to all truth, has commanded us to 'proclaim the Good News', and the Spirit is speaking through successive Popes and through our Bishop, encouraging us all to become 'missionary disciples'.

It is important that there are at least two people present throughout the 40 hours, and there is a list to sign up to commit to a time. However, even if you have not signed up to a particular time slot, the church will be open — please come. If you are able to commit to a particular time, please sign on the list. May this be a time of blessing for our parish.

## Volunteers needed — please help

Recently the Diocesan Surveyor inspected the church for any major repairs that may be needed. Fortunately there was nothing really serious, but he has asked that two bits of maintenance be carried out this year. Neither are difficult, and both can be undertaken by volunteer labour. Both are painting jobs; one of them is already spoken for, but the other will require a team of helpers

The task is repainting the North aisle, where the wall has become discoloured due to water penetration when the roof gutter had become blocked. This was last done in 2011, and only took a week with a team of about a dozen people. Much fun was had in the process!

We cannot schedule when this is to be done until we know that there will be people to help. We will need painters, including people willing to work up the scaffold tower, but also labourers at ground level, and, of course, tea and coffee-makers. We also need more people to join the rota for refreshments after the Sunday Masses, especially after 11.00. The hope is to have sufficient people so that it will come round not more frequently than one week in five. Please see one of the people with badges on to find out more!

## **DID YOU KNOW?**

Everyone is surely aware that the country; indeed most of the world is facing a financial crisis. At the domestic level, this is acutely felt by every household. Of course, it is also felt by the Church.

One of the characteristics of the Church is that we are committed to giving to other needy causes, and every year it is our aim that we will give away at least 10% of the total money that we are given.

St Gregory's parish is recognised as a significant giver to both CAFOD and to Missio. CAFOD is the Catholic Church's chief initiative for providing aid and development for overseas countries. We have been supporting the international and multi-agency project which is seeking to ensure that every person has access to clean and safe drinking water, as well as the particular aid projects that are the focus of the Lent and Harvest collections. CAFOD is part of the international agency called 'Caritas', which is one of the biggest aid agencies in the world.

Missio is the Catholic Church's international missionary organisation. While it is primarily concerned with the proclamation of the Gospel, it is also inevitably concerned for the material wellbeing of the communities in which it works, and partners with Caritas wherever there is need.

We are not only concerned with overseas aid; we support local aid organisations. It was a parishioner of St Gregory's, Val Hanson who was instrumental in starting what is now the Hope Centre, and from the beginning, St Gregory's has been a weekly and generous supporter of their work in feeding the homeless in Northampton.

Our regular gifts of food are much appreciated, together with the financial help that is given.

More recently the Cathedral Foodstore has been established. This began as a means of supporting needy families during the pandemic; initially for families with children in the Catholic schools of our town, but now extended. St Gregory's made a commitment to provide toiletries, a frequently forgotten domestic necessity.

This is undertaken by Gregory Care, who also support those who live in the parish and are in material need, not simply by giving money, but by helping individuals and families to manage financially.

When we started to provide refreshments after the 9.00 Sunday Mass and on Wednesdays, it was decided that <u>ALL</u> the takings should be allocated to charitable concerns, with the exception of through the summer when we would use the money to buy the tea and coffee and other necessities and stock up.

Now that we are offering refreshments after the 11.00 Mass every Sunday, we hope that this form of giving will grow. Following popular request, we are only serving ground coffee, and are committed to fair trade. When you come in for refreshments, please remember the good causes that we are supporting.

## How Alpha Works — and Why

Alpha works because it uses the same methods that Jesus himself used. It uses personal contacts. Jesus said to Andrew: "Come and see" (John 1:39), and it is the same invitation that we make. Like Jesus, who so often in the Gospels is seen at a meal with others, Alpha is set in the context of a meal. It is not Mass, but could be seen as looking forward to when everyone at Alpha can share in the Eucharistic meal — what theologians call an 'allegory' of the Mass. St Paul speaks of 'children in the faith' not being ready for solid food (I Corinthians 3:1-2), and Alpha is like coming to see Jesus in the person of some of his disciples. Having 'come and seen', people are free to make their own decision. Thankfully, many decide to get to know Jesus better. Alpha is also ideal for the Church community as it uses so many different talents and skills, and does not force people out of their 'comfort zones'. It needs the talents of the cooking team; the team who prepare the room, the table hosts and table leaders. It needs the skill of the technicians, and of musicians. Above all, it needs the support of prayer, and it needs people to invite others to 'come and see'.

Recently, Revolution Zero have opened a community food larder (social supermarket) in the former UCR Church, The Headlands. Their aim is to make food accessible to everyone & reduce the amount of food going to landfill. 15 items of choice for £5.
