Noah and Climate Change

Soon after the year 2000 the name Noah entered the top 100 of boys' names, and has risen rapidly to nearly the most popular name in the United Kingdom. This is replicated in the United States of America.

At the same time, while annual average rainfall has not significantly changed, there has been a dramatic increase in flood events. There has been a steady trend towards drier summers and wetter winters, and when it does rain, there is greater rainfall.

Has the change in popularity of Noah as a name any connection with the change in the weather? Do parents have some instinctive feeling that the world has a need for someone to deal with a flood?

When scientists first stared warning us of climate change, it was generally spoken in terms of 'global warming', and for those in temperate zones such as ours, this was not altogether unwelcome!

While for those in most areas the change in rainfall was a matter of inconvenience, but in 1998 the flooding in Northampton was so severe that 2 people died, 150 had to go to hospital and 2,500 homes were flooded. More recently, there have been floods at Billing Aquadrome. Other areas of the United Kingdom have been far more adversely affected than this.

Agriculture in this country is under threat, as a recent report states: "• Changing rainfall patterns, increased evaporative demand

and reduced availability of water for irrigation all threaten agricultural production, particularly in areas where water supplies are already under pressure. Drier soil conditions will reduce growth of crops, pasture and trees. Damaging periods of summer drought are likely to become more frequent, especially in the south. Extended or repeated periods of drought may cause tree deaths, especially of young trees.

• Increased flooding, including that caused by sea-level rise, may lead to substantial losses in crop production in lowlying agricultural areas and may contribute to compaction, waterlogging and erosion of soil. Wetter autumns and winters will threaten agricultural production by adversely affecting the timing of land-management operations."

Research and Innovation for our Dynamic Environment (RIDE) Forum.

The 26th United Nations Climate Change Conference will take place in Glasgow from 1st to 12th November this year, and we pray for a strong initiative to control carbon emissions and other greenhouse gasses, and other ways of protecting our planet.

Climate change is having a far more drastic effect in tropical and in Polar Regions than in our part of the globe. However, reversing the present changes in climate will take many years, and must take place, but more immediately, there is a need to conserve the water that falls and prevent flooding when too much falls.

Hydrology has evolved as a science to try and understand the complex water systems of the Earth, to study and predict how water will behave under different circumstances as it moves through the land phase of the water cycle.

Water is one of the most important natural resources and although plentiful, is not always in the right place at the right time or of the right quality. An overall aim of hydrologists is to apply scientific knowledge and mathematical principles to mitigate water-related problems in society and environmental protection. This may mean working out the best use of water supplies for cities or for irrigation, controlling river flooding or soil erosion, protecting or cleaning up pollution, planning long-term water storage reservoirs, flood risk assessment and flood/drought warning.

Maybe some of our young people are being called by God to become hydrologists — that is a true vocation, and a calling to help those who are victims of persistent droughts or regular flooding would be a blessing.

Training in hydrology takes many years; we can do something this year, indeed, this week. CAFOD have a challenge for us to do 10,000 steps every day through Lent and get sponsorship. However, for many of us in lockdown, that would be difficult, but we can make a weekly (or even daily) sacrifice to support the CAFOD Lent project to help villages that have no water supply. You can send money directly to CAFOD, or though the parish using a CAFOD envelope. Those who are shielding and would like an envelope delivered to them, please email the request to Fr Andrew. We can all be a Noah, bringing safety to victims of climate change.

Masses and Covid security in Lockdown: It is of the greatest importance that the church is a place of safety from the COVID virus, & while clergy & stewards do all they can to have systems in place, there is a responsibility on everyone to adhere to government regulations & maintain the safety of everyone as well as themselves in church. While 'bubbles' & households may sit together, there should be at least 1 metre distance separating those not in the same 'bubble' or household & must wear masks. We are still allowed to come to Mass; this is in part because churches are safe places. It is up to us to keep the church safe.

<u>COVID-19 Precautions</u>: We are in lockdown, & as responsible members of our community, we obey the Government Regulations in solidarity with so many others on whom are being imposed restrictions which impact severely on their lives & livelihoods. Now that we can return to Mass, we must continue to try to suppress the spread of the virus & support those who remain vulnerable.

Face masks: Wearing face masks is compulsory in churches & you should wear one if you can. Stewards are not responsible for policing this, but may remind you that this is the law.

<u>Track and Trace:</u> The government have now released their app to support track & trace & we have a QR code which can be scanned to record your presence at church. This is not obligatory, but should help in the important task of controlling the spread of the virus. As responsible members of society, we should comply with this request.

Pro-Life issues: The Government is being pressured to make temporary approval of DIY abortions (both pills taken at home) permanent. They have launched consultations for England and Wales to see whether people are in favour of this. For the sake of the unborn and their mothers, please therefore respond to the Government consultations. Scripture Readings 21st February 2021, 1st Sunday of Lent, Year B

Genesis describes how, after the Great Flood, God established the first covenant with humanity, promising not to destroy all living creatures again. Every rainbow reminds us of God's care for all creation.

The Psalm asks for God's guidance and pardon, before meditating on God's goodness towards the just.

Peter applies the Genesis story to Jesus. We should not "repay evil for evil or abuse for abuse" but repay hurt with a blessing. If God wills that we suffer, then it is better to suffer for doing good than for doing evil. God's promise to Noah is fulfilled in Christ, who "in the body was put to death, in the spirit was raised to life". Just as Noah was saved by water, so we are washed in the water of baptism and

make "a promise to God from a good conscience" rising into a new life in Christ.

In Mark's gospel Jesus' baptism is followed immediately by this very brief description of his temptation in the desert. Angels guided the Israelites during the Exodus. Now angels look after Jesus as he rejects Satan and remains obedient to God, announcing the Good News to begin his human ministry.

Psalm Response: Your ways, Lord, are faithfulness and love for those who keep your covenant.

(Gen 9: 8-15; Psalm 24(25):4-9; 1 Peter 3: 18-22; Mark 1: 12-15)

Why Alpha

Healing the World

As the eyes of the world will be on Britain this year, it is vital that we all come together to raise our voices and ensure that our government listens.



Wherever you are, you have a role to play in helping to address these issues:

- Tackling the climate crisis by urging world leaders to use this
 year's climate talks to agree ambitious goals that address the
 scale of the climate emergency and ensure that those
 countries least responsible do not end up paying the highest
 price.
- Ending unjust debts by pushing for full debt cancellation for low and middle-income countries. This will free up vital resources so that they can tackle the health and economic impacts of the pandemic.
- Holding business accountable for practices throughout their supply chains to ensure that communities are protected from human rights abuses and environmental destruction carried out by multinational businesses

We will have ways for everyone to join the CAFOD campaign throughout the year including our petition to the Prime Minister ahead of COP26, lobbying our MPs to get the most out of the G7, organising parish campaign activities and mobilising for the climate talks in Glasgow
