The Joy of the Gospel

Twelve years ago Pope Francis published an 'Apostolic Exhortation' entitled (in Latin) Evangelii Gaudium; usually translated as 'The Joy of the Gospel', just eight months after his election. This has been described as his manifesto in which he set out the major themes of his papacy.

The document begins:

The joy of the gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. Those who accept his offer of salvation are set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. With Christ joy is constantly born anew. In this Exhortation I wish to encourage the Christian faithful to embark upon a new chapter of evangelization marked by this joy, while pointing out new paths for the Church's journey in years to come. (§1)

His message was not new to us at St Gregory's; the idea of mission in the parish was already being preached about although at that time there was no definite strategy. The traditional plan of the Church in England was that with good catechesis (teaching) of our children, they would remain faithful Catholics all their life. In spite of thee being decades of evidence that this plan was not working, we tried a number of different plans of preparation for First Holy Communion and Confirmation in the hope that we would find one which would buck the trend.

However there was a growing understanding that just aiming our efforts at children was not enough, and that we needed to reach out to adults, and in particular, to the parents of the children. Our present scheme of preparation for First Holy Communion is called 'Growing Up Catholic', and involves the parents as well as the children.

This has been a vital part of our strategy, but more was needed, and this was provided by a priest from Canada who wrote a book entitled 'Divine Renovation', which outlined a whole new way of thinking about mission in the parish. Part of this involved running the Alpha programme.

The first Alpha session is entitled 'There must be more than this', and the next paragraph of 'Evangelii Gaudium' has the same theme:

The great danger in today's world, pervaded as it is by consumerism, is the desolation and anguish born of a complacent yet covetous heart, the feverish pursuit of frivolous pleasures, and a blunted conscience. Whenever our interior life becomes caught up in its own interests and concerns, there is no longer room for others, no place for the poor. God's voice is no longer heard, the quiet joy of his love is no longer felt, and the desire to do good fades. This is a very real danger for believers too. Many fall prey to it, and end up resentful, angry and listless. That is no way to live a dignified and fulfilled life; it is not God's will for

us, nor is it the life in the Spirit which has its source in the heart of the risen Christ. (§2)

A world dominated by consumerism has no end-point; it is a 'hamster-wheel' in which the desire for more can never be satisfied. It is also a life in which acquisition becomes the overarching purpose, and the demands of charity and the needs of others are neglected.

This is not a happy world, it is a world of discontent, and from that discontent, a seeking of someone to blame, leading ultimately to mob violence. It is a world in which those who have the power to do so become richer and gain more power, while the powerless become even more deprived. It is a world without joy, but one in which people seek happiness in places which fail to deliver.

Pope Francis makes this direct appeal to all of us to renew our own personal relationship with Jesus, as his encyclical continues:

I invite all Christians, everywhere, at this very moment, to a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting him encounter them; I ask all of you to do this unfailingly each day. No one should think that this invitation is not meant for him or her, since "no one is excluded from the joy brought by the Lord". (*Gaudete in Domino, Paul VI, 9th May 1975*) The Lord does not disappoint those who take this risk; whenever we take a step towards Jesus, we come to realize that he is already there, waiting for us with open arms. Now is the time to say to Jesus: "Lord, I have let myself be deceived; in a thousand ways I have shunned your love, yet here I am once more, to renew my covenant with you. I need you. Save me once again, Lord, take me once more into your redeeming embrace". (§3)

This is the start of the strategy for mission in the local parish. We must not forget the work of mission overseas, and for this we support the work of Mission through the 'Red Box' appeal (*Thank you for your continued generosity*). In our own parish we have just embarked on a new Alpha Course, and it is wonderful to welcome so many participants. When we began this strategy we received a generous donation from the Home Mission department of the Bishops' Conference, and it is for that fund that we have a second collection today in this Sunday. In recognition of the importance of Pope Francis' document, this Sunday has been designated as "Evangelii Gaudium Sunday".

For some people the idea of evangelising fills them with dread. It is rather like looking at the water in a swimming pool and thinking it is very cold, and feeling a reluctance to jump in in spite of the people in the pool encouraging you and telling you it is wonderful. Not until you are in can you realise that it is indeed wonderful. In later paragraphs of his encyclical he speaks of the joy of evangelising.

Scripture Readings: 25th Sunday of the Year, 21st September

Amos was a shepherd from Judah who around 760 BC prophesied doom to the northern kingdom Israel, largely because of its social injustice. Israel under Jeroboam was very prosperous, but when it was overrun by Assyria 40 years later the prophet's warnings were remembered. It was not just the ways the rich cheated the poor – inflating the currency and giving short measure. Worse was their belief that sacrifices and fasting would absolve them from God's blame: sacrifice without justice is meaningless.

The Psalm urges praise for God at all times and in all places for he who is supreme over all stoops down to raise up the poor.

In our modern liturgies we follow all of Paul's advice to Timothy: we lift up our hands in the traditional manner to offer prayers of petition, intercession and thanks, and we pray for secular authorities — "so that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life". We should reject

false gods like riches or possessions. There is only one God, and Christ Jesus, our one High Priest, is the only mediator between us and God.

In the Gospel Jesus also warns us not to be seduced into worshipping money. Jesus says though the steward was "dishonest", his motive was right: to gain friends who would help him later.

The Season of Creation is continuing

St Gregory's is participating in the ecumenical prayer service on Sunday evening 28th September at 6.00 pm, and our contribution will focus on 'Peace and Creation'. Other themes relate to biodiversity and insects, birds, animals and their habitats, water, air and food.

The sheer destructive power of warfare is presented to us daily on the television news; whether from Gaza, Ukraine or elsewhere. The waste of the earth's resources in destroying land, buildings and natural habitats is an ecological crime, and the personal suffering of the human lives is heart-breaking for all those involved, and should be also for the rest of the world. Each casualty of war is another reason to pray for and to work for a just peace. War has no winners, only losers.



"Peace is not merely the absence of war", says the Vatican II document 'Gaudium et Spes', and goes on the say: "Peace results from that order structured into human society by its divine Founder, and actualized by men as they thirst after ever greater justice". ($\S78$)

War is a dis-ordering of God's creation, and is destructive at every imaginable level. It springs from pride, ambition and avarice, it produces death and injury among humans and animals, it causes grief and pain, generates migration and fuels poverty, hatred and injustice.

We are right to focus on the human cost of war and deplore this, but we should not forget the other costs of war; the cost to our ecology and environment and its carbon footprint on our planet.
