Hearts on fire; Feet on the Move

This is the theme that Pope Francis has chosen for this year's World Mission Day, and it is drawn from the encounter that Cleopas and his companion had on their way to and at Emmaus on the first Easter evening. (*See Luke 24:13-35*) "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?" (*Verse 32*)

These two described the experience of 'hearts on fire'. We may be lulled into thinking that this was a one-off experience; something specific to the evening of the first Easter Day. We need to read this in the context of the early Church, in which it was written and to whom it was first addressed.

The word 'Mass' had not yet come into usage in the Christian community; the phrase that was used to describe what we now call Mass was 'The Breaking of Bread', drawn from the instruction given by Jesus at the Last Supper: "Do this in memory of me". So we listen again to the words in Luke's Gospel: "He was known to them in the breaking of the bread." (*Verse 35*) It would be a mistake to limit this experience simply to the evening meal at Emmaus, and the Church has understood that at every 'Breaking of Bread', Jesus is made known to us; that Jesus is really and truly present in the Eucharist. St Paul is even stronger in how he puts it: "For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgement on himself". (*I Corinthians 11:29*)

The presence of Jesus in the 'Breaking of Bread' is not limited to his presence in the Eucharistic Bread, the Blessed Sacrament, and just as on that first Easter Day, before the action of taking bread and blessing it, breaking it and sharing it, done by Jesus at Emmaus, they had listened to him explaining the Scriptures on their journey. So we too, before the bread is brought to the Altar, hear the Scriptures read and hear an explanation of what they mean to us. Do our hearts burn within us as we hear the words of Scripture? Those who proclaim the Word of God have a duty to do it in such a way that they can be heard and understood, as does the preacher, but the burning is kindled by something else.

Jesus had already said: "I came to cast fire on the earth, and would that it were already kindled!" (*Luke 12:49*) The lasting source of the fire was to come at Pentecost when "tongues as of fire appeared to them and rested on each one of them." (*Acts 2:3*) The Apostles, then went out to boldly proclaim the Good News to peoples of every language and nation in Jerusalem.

It is the Holy Spirit in our hearts that makes them burn — not a medical heartburn but a spiritual one. We often sing at Pentecost:

"O Comforter, draw near, within my heart appear and kindle it, thy holy flame bestowing"

From "Come down, O Love Divine"

"Hearts on Fire" is a description of a person filled with the Holy Spirit, which should mean 'all faithful Christians'. The sad truth is that for all of us, we can go through a time of luke-warmness. If that is so, we should heed the words of the Apocalypse: "I know your works: you are neither cold nor hot. Would that you were either cold or hot! So, because you are lukewarm, and neither hot nor cold, I will spit you out of my mouth." (Revelation 3:15-16) Advice is given: "I counsel you to buy from me gold refined by fire, so that you may be rich, and white garments so that you may clothe yourself and the shame of your nakedness may not be seen, and salve to anoint your eyes, so that you may see." (Revelation 3:18)

The gold refined by fire refers to words in the prophesy of Malachi: "he will purify the sons of Levi and refine them like gold and silver" (*Malachi 3:3*), and the white garment speaks of the Baptismal Robe given to all the newly-Baptised; their Wedding Garment as they share in the Marriage Feast of the Lamb. The eye-salve refers to Tobit whose sight was restored by Raphael. (*Tobit 11:7-15*)

All of this is encouraging us to seek a renewal of faith, and to have the Holy Spirit burning more strongly in our hearts and lives. It is the Holy Spirit that spurs us on to action.

Before a steam engine can get to work, the fire must be lit, but action is not immediate. The water in the boiler must come up to temperature before the wheels can start to turn. So too for us. The Holy Spirit may begin as a small flame, but it has to warm us up into action. For Cleopas and his companion, this was immediate, so too for the Apostles at Pentecost, but for us, it can be a slower process.

"Feet on the Move" speaks to us of those missionaries for have made great journeys to proclaim the Gospel, and the work of 'Missio', for whom we pray and who we support financially today is the Church's main agency for evangelisation in foreign countries. But the call to mission is not just to places overseas, it is to the whole world, and so the call is not just to support foreign missions financially and by prayer; it is also a call to be engaged in the mission of the Church at home.

These are not competing claims on our time, our prayers or our money, they are complimentary. Behind it is the Church's call for all Christians to be Missionary Disciples. If we have a truly missionary heart, we will not be satisfied with just supporting foreign missions and having no regard for evangelisation in our own locality, and equally, if we are enthusiastic evangelists, we will also have a concern for those who are evangelising in other places.

None of us can ignore the call of Jesus to "Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation." (Mark 16:15)

May the Holy Spirit burn brightly in the heart of each one of us that our hearts may be on fire and that we be active in the proclamation of the Gospel here, and supportive of the proclamation of the Gospel through the work of 'Missio'.

Origins and Structure of the Mass (Coming back soon)

The course on the Mass will resume on 8th November. This course does not using video presentation, but allows plenty of opportunity for questions. The sessions start at 7.30 pm in the Sacristy. The six remaining sessions look at specific aspects in detail.

One reason some children complain that 'Mass is boring' is that they don't really understand what is going on. If parents cannot explain why things are done or why specific words are spoken, it will not be a surprise if their children find the whole experience boring.

The sessions that have already happened have looked at the history of how the shape of the Mass developed out of the Jewish Synagogue worship of the 1st century and the pattern set by Jesus at the Last Supper, deriving from the Passover Meal. The remaining sessions are examining our present day experience of Mass as we celebrate today in what we call the 'Latin Rite', or the 'Roman Rite'.

'Latin' does not refer to the language but to the tradition based on the Roman Church. However the Catholic Church across the world has many 'rites', many of which vary from that of the Roman Church, even though they belong to the Catholic Church. We are happy that the Syro-Malabar Rite is celebrated here, as also is the Ukranian Rite. These are two of the many other rites of the Catholic Church, and help form the richness and diversity of Christ's universal Church.

22nd October 2023, 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

During the Exodus, after escaping from Egypt across the Red Sea, the Israelites' frequently grumbled about God, who responded by giving them water, quail and manna. Then they were challenged by the Amelekites living between Palestine and Sinai. Moses needed a lot of human help to keep his arms up! But his persistence showed complete faith in God. They continued to quarrel and test the Lord, but he showed yet again that he will always look after them.

The Psalmist, full of confidence in the Lord, assures his companion he too may have total confidence in God.

Paul emphasises that Timothy, like Moses, must "be persistent" in proclaiming the word "whether it is convenient or inconvenient". He describes the uses of scripture: "for teaching, for refuting error, for guidance and for teaching people to be holy". For Paul, writing

before the Gospels were written, "scripture" meant what we now call the Old Testament. So we need to persist in trying to understand the Jewish Scriptures.

Just before Jesus enters Jerusalem Luke gives us two parables about prayer. Today we hear how the persistent widow gets justice. Jesus assures us: God will "see justice done to his chosen who cry out to him day and night even when he delays to help them".

Psalm Response: Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth.

(Ex 17:8-13; Ps 120(121); 2 Tim 3:14-4:2; Lk 18:1-8)

Lumen Gentium — The Light of the Nations

Lumen Gentium is a much longer document than either of the two that we have already considered, and relates to the very nature of the Church. Significantly for today, World Mission Sunday, it has much to say about the missionary activity of the Church and the call to evangelisation.

It begins by recognising the foundation of the Church by Jesus himself; the call of the Apostles, the teachings of Jesus, his passion, death and resurrection and the gift of the Holy Spirit. The Bible contains many images of the Church; a sheepfold and a flock, cared for by the Good Shepherd; a vineyard cared for by the heavenly vinedresser; the building which has Christ as the cornerstone, build on the foundation of the apostles, and in which we are called to be living stones.

The Church is also called the "Jerusalem which is above" and our "Mother". At this time of renewed fighting in the Holy Land, this understanding of the Church must inform our prayer for peace in the earthly Jerusalem and its country.

The second chapter goes more deeply into the make-up of the Church; the People of God. While recognising that "anyone who fears God and does what is right has been acceptable to him" it notes that from the story of Noah, from the call of Abraham, from the exodus after slavery in Egypt and throughout the Old Testament, God wished to save people not as "individuals without any bond or link between them, but rather, to make them into a people who might acknowledge him and serve him in holiness".

The call to personal holiness cokes up in detail in chapter 5, and is of vital importance to us and the Church in every age. Chapters 3 and 4 deal with the people of the Church and the nature of the 'hierarchy' of the Church. The process of 'synodality' which is taking place at present is the further working out of how the clergy and lay-people cooperate in fulfilling God's plan. In all of this, it is vital that the voice of the Holy Spirit is heard and obeyed.

Chapter 6 considers how the consecrated life through vows in the various religious orders enriches the Church and supports the increase in holiness of the entire Church.

The seventh chapter is entitled 'The Pilgrim Church' which, through holiness and virtue is journeying towards heaven where the Church in its fullness already exists in the presence of God. In the celebration of Mass we are given a foretaste of heaven, and as pilgrims, both individually and collectively, we must keep the vision of heaven as our ultimate destination. This reflects back to the universal call to holiness of chapter 5.

The final chapter is on Our Lady. Originally it was planned to produce a separate document on the role of Mary, but the Council was determined that Mary cannot be separated from the Church. On the same day as Lumen Gentium was approved by the Council, Pope Paul VI proclaimed 'Mother of the Church' as an official description of Our Lady. As a loving mother, Mary wishes the best for all her children and the ultimate salvation of all people.

Preparation for First Holy Communion — Growing Up Catholic

We have now completed the enrolment process, and the number enrolled is the greatest it has been since we started doing the preparation in the parishes rather than in the schools. Our course for this year is completely full, which is a matter for rejoicing. **Therefore there can be no more enrolments.**

However, it is also a matter for regret since late-comers will have to be asked to wait until next year. As it is, the room will be very crowded, and we have to comply with the health and safety regulations.

If the trend continues, we will need to run two parallel sessions next year, but to be able to do this, we will need many more helpers. Anyone who would like to join the team will be very welcome, there is no need for previous experience or any particular knowledge; all that is needed is a love for Jesus, a love for the Church and a willingness to work with children and their parents. This year all sessions are on Saturday afternoons and are held at Sacred Heart church near the Weston Favell shopping centre, but if next year we

need to run parallel sessions, a decision will need to be made about when and where that would be. All helpers and leaders are required to have DBS clearance

A key part of our preparation is that parents/carers have a vital role in the process. They cannot just drop off their child and go shopping! The Baptism Rite calls parents the 'first teachers of their child in the ways of faith', and the Second Vatican Council restated the traditional teaching of the Church that it is the parents who have the primary responsibility for the Christian education of their children. "The role of parents in education is of such importance that it is almost impossible to provide are adequate substitute" (Vatican II Gravissimum Educationis §3)
