The Word of God

"The Church has always venerated the Scriptures as she venerates the Lord's Body. She never ceases to present to the faithful the bread of life, taken from the one table of God's Word and Christ's Body.' (Catechism of the Catholic

Church §103)


This is indeed the truth, manifested by the fact that the Fathers of the Church the great theologians of the early years of the Christian Faith - were constantly quoting the Scriptures; manifested by the first translation of the Bible into the language of the people by St Jerome; manifested by the fact that so many of the Saints down the ages read the Bible, and many are recorded as having memorised large parts of it; manifested by translations into English and many other languages which were approved by the Church.

Sadly, in spite of all this evidence, some opponents of the Church have laid the accusation against the

Catholic Church that we do not value or respect the Bible.

What is even sadder is that some Catholics have believed this too! However, we only need to read the Catechism of the Catholic Church to realise that this is wrong.

Many history books (even recent ones) maintain that The Catholic Church condemned translations of the Bible into English. This is also a false claim. St Aldhelm is thought to have been responsible for a translation of the psalms into English in the 7th century, and St Bede translated the Gospel of John in the eighth. The Lindisfarne Gospels are a translation from the 10th century and during the 11th century much of the Old Testament was translated into English; none of them prohibited by the Church.



It is, of course, true that there were translations which the Church did condemn, but it needs to be understood that these were not simply translations of the text of the Bible, but with comments and footnotes which were offering interpretations of the text which were contrary to Catholic teaching. It was on account of these comments and notes that they were condemned.

The 'Douai-Rheims' Catholic translation was, in fact completed by 1582, nearly 30 years before the King James

Today we have many translations into English, but there is still a distinction between 'Catholic editions' and other Bibles. The reason for this goes back to the work of St Jerome in the 5th century which was originally made from the Greek translation of the Hebrew Bible. This contained books which were not included in the Hebrew versions known in the 16th century, although some have been found among the dead sea scrolls in Hebrew, suggesting that they were not

Greek compostitions.

It is for a similar reason that Catholic Bibles number the psalms differently; we tend to use the Greek numbering rather than the Hebrew, although the text is the same.

In recent times successive Popes have encouraged us to love and study the Bible, such as Leo XIII, St Pius X, Benedict XV, Pius XI, Pius XII, Paul VI, John Paul II, Benedict XVI and Francis. It is not a post-Vatican II idea!

Many who have taken part in the Bible Timeline courses speak of how this has deepened their faith and understanding. This Sunday we are all invited to make a determined resolution to grow in our love and understanding of the Scriptures..

Scripture Readings 23rd January 2022, 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

In 538 BC King Cyrus of Persia helped the Israelites to return to Jerusalem from exile in Babylon. There Ezra and Nehemiah shared the tasks of re-establishing the Jewish state and religion. Nehemiah rebuilt the city's walls and administration. In today's reading we hear about Ezra's formal reading of the Jewish Law, and the people's joyous celebration of God's gift of the Law.

The Psalm praises God's moral law – and asks forgiveness for our transgressions.

In Paul's letter to the Corinthians he compares a community to the human body. Every Christian becomes part of Christ's body by baptism. So all gifts come from the spirit; all gifts are necessary; all contribute to the good of the whole community. All Christians are equally valuable and wanted by God.

Our reading of Luke's Gospel over the ordinary Sundays of Year C now resumes, to be interrupted only for Eastertide. First we are

reminded of Luke's reason for writing a gospel: he is carefully putting into an orderly sequence what he has heard from eyewitnesses, so that his hearers may "realise the certainty of the teachings" they have received. Today's reading then continues from the beginning of Jesus' ministry in Galilee, including his self-proclamation in his home town. Next week we hear his neighbours' reactions.

An Invitation to all who volunteer in the Parish

The parish could not function without the help of many, many volunteers who help in a vast number of different ways. Some are very obvious and can be seen; but others are 'behind the scenes' and less visible. We have been going through a tough time in many different ways, and this is a way of saying 'thank you'. On Friday March 18th there will be a dinner in the hall, to which all volunteers for the parish are invited. There is no charge – this is

not a fund-raising occasion, no raffle, no collection plate, just an occasion for the parish to say thank you to all who give so generously. The only condition is that you RSVP to this invitation by email to Helen at helentme00@hotmail.com so that we know the numbers and can cater adequately. It will be a proper meal (don't eat first), but being a Friday, will not involve meat.

Working Together to bring the Word of God to the Northampton Diocese

As well as the local costs that we meet, we also pool some of our costs with other parishes where it makes sense to do so. These costs include the recruitment and training of new and existing priests, the welfare of sick and retired priests, the cost of the Bishop and his office, Safeguarding, Health and Safety, Financial Management, Legal Matters, Human Resources etc. These shared functions are essential to allow a charity to operate safely and legally.

For many years this has remained at a constant 23% of the income from the normal Sunday collections and donations. This is one of the lowest of any diocese in England and Wales. Over the diocese as a whole, parish collection incomes have remained about the same for the ten years before the pandemic, and since COVID-19, the income for the diocese has reduced significantly. However, over this ten-year period the diocesan expenses have increased; care costs of our sick priests have risen steeply and we now have more priests requiring such support but other costs have also increased in areas of compliance such as safeguarding, Health and Safety, and property management. We along with other Dioceses and other charities now have to employ professional staff to manage our operations and their salary costs increase with inflation on an annual basis. In times past priests were used to take on these responsibilities; responsibilities for which, in most cases, they were not trained and had no expertise or qualifications, and cost the diocese little or nothing. Today we need trained and qualified professionals, either by legal requirement or simply to have competent service. However, there is a cost to this.

For many years, the collective contributions paid by parishes has been insufficient to pay for these essential shared costs and we have relied on legacies, property sales and fundraising initiatives such as Together in Faith to support us. Over the last 10 years the diocesan costs have increased through inflation by around 24% but as mentioned earlier the amount donated, has basically stayed the same.

This is not sustainable and as a result it has been agreed by the Diocesan Trustees and the Council of Priests that the charge made to each Parish for the shared services will increase from 23% of our offertory receipts to 40% over the next 4 years. This will be reviewed annually to ensure that it is fully covering the essential shared costs.

This is an enormous increase, and would have been better introduced long ago and gradually. It comes at a difficult time, with the squeeze on household income for everyone, and in particular the increase in gas and electricity bills which will impact on the church as it will on every household.

Here at St Gregory's our income has dropped less than in many other places; we are fortunate in that we were able to open as soon as it was permitted, and so many people transferred their giving to standing orders which greatly benefitted the parish. As a result, we have been running at a small surplus, even through the time of lockdown. St Gregory's is a generous parish, and the need to cover our increased costs here must not impact on our support for our other agencies, for CAFOD, Missio, the Hope Centre, the Life House and Gregory Care supporting the Cathedral Foodstore.

In the next few weeks the parish will be producing a budget for the coming financial year, as every parish in the diocese has been asked to do. We are fortunate in that we have reserves thanks to the money we have been putting aside for a new parish office, and which has had to be put on hold due to the diocesan financial situation

It would be good if we all looked at our own personal and family finances, and if maybe any whose giving has not changed for many years, might consider whether they could give more to enable the diocese and the parish to be more effective in the mission which we share. Only as a financially thriving parish can we effectively be a missionary parish, as we are called to be.
