The Sunday of the Word of God, instituted by Pope Francis and to be held every year on the third Sunday of Ordinary Time, reminds us, pastors and faithful alike, of the importance and value of Sacred Scripture for the Christian life, as well as the relationship between the word of God and the liturgy: “As Christians, we are one people, making our pilgrim way through history, sustained by the Lord, present in our midst, who speaks to us and nourishes us. A day devoted to the Bible should not be seen as a yearly event but rather a year-long event, for we urgently need to grow in our knowledge and love of the Scriptures and of the Risen Lord, who continues to speak his word and to break bread in the community of believers. For this reason, we need to develop a closer relationship with Sacred Scripture; otherwise, our hearts will remain cold and our eyes shut, inflicted as we are by so many forms of blindness”.

Bishop David Oakley will preside over a Bible Service to mark this occasion at 3.00 pm on Sunday 24 January 2021 which will be live-streamed from Northampton Cathedral.

The *Logo of the Sunday from the Word of God* is inspired by the gospel passage about the disciples of Emmaus (cf. *Lk 24:13-33*) and highlights the theme of the relationship between the travellers, expressed in looks, gestures and words. Jesus appears as the one who “came near and went with” humanity (*Luke 24:15*), “standing among them” (*John 1:14*). In him “there is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus” (*Galatians 3:28*).

Walking among his own, he reinvigorates their steps, pointing to the horizons of evangelization, depicted in the logo by the star: “He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all

his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice” (*John 10: 3-4*).

His words are one with those contained in the scroll he holds in his hands: “Who is worthy to open the scroll and break its seals” (*Rev 5: 2*). If the two disciples are lost, in the face of the mysteries of history, they are immediately reassured: “Do not weep. See, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered, so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals” (*Apocalypse 5:5*). “Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures” (*Luke 24:27*).

Familiarity with the *Word of God* arises from the relationship, from the search for the face of God in the Sacred pages. Scripture does not offer us concepts, but experiences; it does not immerse us only in a text, but also opens us to the encounter with the Word of life, “useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work” (*2 Timothy 3:16-17*).

In the background there is a great light: there are those who only see one at sunset, evoking *Luke 24:29*; we like to welcome the “rising sun” (*Luke 1:78*) and which, in the Risen One, announces the dawn of a new mission destined for all peoples: “Go into all the world and proclaim the Good News to the whole creation” (*Mark 16:15*).

“The time has come” - the Lord says in the Gospel. Do not wait another moment; do not put off to tomorrow the possibility of encountering God in His Word! “Repent and believe in the Gospel” means change your lifestyle and welcome the good news, the Word sent to us by God the Father. Only in this way can you know the love of God, who in His incarnate Son has revealed to us the true face of the merciful Father. Today the Church throughout the world is celebrating the *Sunday of the Word of God*. We want to open our hearts to the divine presence in the Holy Scriptures, and rediscover the meaning in our time.

On this Sunday of the Word of God those who read at Mass are re-commissioned. This will be both in person and through the videos of the Mass, and will also be done by the Bishop at the Cathedral on Sunday afternoon.

Scripture Readings 24th January 2021, 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

In the short book of Jonah, God sent a great fish to force Jonah back to the mission God had given him, to warn Nineveh that it was to be destroyed. But, after the fish had spewed Jonah back on to dry land, Jonah was still angry that God relented. He had run away to avoid drawing God's mercy on the hated city, believing only Jews were worthy of God's mercy.

After praying for pardon, the Psalm meditates on God's goodness towards the just.

Responding to questions from the Corinthians about married life, Paul gives detailed advice – but against the background of expecting Jesus to return in glory virtually any minute. There may also have been a famine when he was writing. They should not be alarmed by

any current world crisis, even if normal activities are interrupted for a time. But one day the world will end. What will matter then is their faithfulness to the Lord, whatever their social circumstances.

Last week we heard from the Gospel of John about Jesus calling the first disciples. Our year B readings from the Gospel of Mark now resume until Lent, then continuing after Trinity Sunday. Mark describes Jesus beginning his ministry by first proclaiming the Good News, and then also calling the first disciples.

Next Sunday

Next Sunday is designated as "Racial Justice Sunday". Ethnic minorities have suffered disproportionately from the COVID-19 pandemic, demonstrating a systemic problem with racial injustice in our society.

This was dramatically brought home with the brutal killing of George Floyd and the reaction it provoked. As Pope Francis reflects: "*instances of racism continue to shame us, for they show that our supposed social progress is not as real or definitive as we think.*"

Dismantle structures of injustice

These shameful reminders of racism demand meaningful action to confront and dismantle sinful structures of injustice. Our brother Bishops in the USA remind us that: "*all of us are in need of personal, ongoing conversion. Our churches and our civic and social institutions are in need of ongoing reform. If racism is confronted by*

addressing its causes and the injustice it produces, then healing can occur."

Racism is a sin and a violation of human dignity in which we are all complicit. As Catholics we need to acknowledge and confront our own failings, as individuals and as a Church.

Every single one of our parishes, schools and organisations has a responsibility to actively practise anti-racism in all aspects of our mission.

A Time to Act

It is not enough to simply denounce racism. This is a time to act. In the words of the Holy Father: "*This is a moment to dream big, to rethink our priorities — what we value, what we want, what we seek — and to commit to act in our daily life on what we have dreamed of. God asks us to dare to create something new.*"
