
"Water means a lot. It means life."

Fabiano, Uganda

Before they had a water supply, 14-year-old Fabiano was forced to walk for hours to gather water so his family could drink, cook and wash. In order to arrive at school on time, Fabiano had to walk five kilometres for water before sunrise – despite the dangers of traveling in the dark.

Thankfully, CAFOD built a solar-powered water pump in Fabiano's village. Now he and his family can access clean, safe water to drink, cook and wash with. Fabiano also no longer has to walk for hours in the dark. This means he feels refreshed and able to focus in school every day. When he is home, he can easily water his vegetables. There's now plenty to eat and extras to sell.

Once the pump had been installed in Fabiano's village, he said: "We had water available right near our homes. We were so jubilant about it and happy about it coming here. We knew life would change."

We are one of a number of places in the neighbourhood which are offering a place which is heated and providing food and welcome; between them all there is welcome throughout the week.

Each house that is heated is not only using up the energy supply which is not unlimited, and if the weather turns colder again (which is likely)

there is a risk of power cuts, but also is generating greenhouse gasses which contribute to our carbon footprint, and add to climate change. Taking advantage of the 'warm welcome' not only saves money; it also helps save the planet!

There are children's toys, and we now have a Wi-Fi provision for any who are working 'from home', and continuous provision of tea, coffee and soft drinks. Please do make use of this facility.

Scripture Readings 25th December 2022, Nativity of the Lord, Year A

Around 720 BC Judah was threatened by many enemies. Isaiah advised the kings to stand firm, because the Lord would give a sign: "the maiden shall be with child". The birth of a helpless baby gives hope for the future. But this future must be founded on justice and integrity. Early Christians adopted these words as a marvellous way to celebrate the birth of Jesus.

All three psalms invite all creation to praise God as king and judge, for he alone is God and he will make all things right.

Written over 60 years after Jesus' birth, Paul summarises the gospel to Titus: a compassionate God chose to offer us the free gift of being "at one" with him. But God's revelation of salvation in Christ demands we transform our lives and "give up everything that does not lead to God". The reading from Hebrews tells us that God has spoken to us through his son, who is "the perfect copy of his nature".

Luke places the birth of the Christ firmly in time and space. Jesus was a man born miraculously to a virgin in Bethlehem in Judea. The

peace and quiet of the undercroft, where animals gave warmth, must have been a welcome relief for Mary, after the noise and bustle of the inn. The simplicity of Jesus' birth is important: God comes as a vulnerable baby to draw us into a relationship with him. The royal birth announcement was sent not to royalty, but to poor shepherds, outcasts excluded from Temple worship by their occupation. Joseph, of the house of David, named Jesus as his son. Jesus lived in history, growing up in Nazareth in Galilee.

By the time John's gospel was written, Christians had come to realise that Jesus had existed as the Word of God before time began. So John's prologue seeks to describe the complexity of the creator becoming part of his own creation.

Next Sunday is next year!

According to the Collins Dictionary, the 'word of the year' is 'permacrisis', which "sums up quite succinctly how truly awful 2022 has been for so many people". (Alex Beecroft)

However, the two words 'permanent' and 'crisis' are in a sense contradictory. A crisis is not merely a disaster of some sort, it is also a moment of opportunity. It originates from a medical term in Greek, indicating a turning point in an illness; a change which indicates either recovery or death. Clearly this cannot be a permanent condition. To widen the understanding of 'crisis', it is a moment of opportunity; rather as we read:

"See, I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and destruction. If you obey the commandments of the Lord your God that I command you today, by loving the Lord your God, by walking in his ways, and by keeping his commandments and his statutes and his rules, then you shall live and multiply, and the Lord your God will bless you in the land that you are entering to take possession of it. But if your heart turns away, and you will not hear, but are drawn away to worship other gods and serve them, I declare to you today, that you shall surely perish." (*Deuteronomy 30: 15-18*)

We live in an inter-dependant society, and the life and life-choices of others has its impact on us, and vice-versa.

If the present time is indeed a moment of crisis, it is important that the choices that are made are the right ones. The last census showed that over a third of the population claimed to have 'no religion'. That is to accept a very narrow definition of 'religion'. If we understand 'religion' as the worship of a god, and understand the meaning of god as being a person's highest priority, the religion of many is personal wealth, or others fame or popularity. For some it is the success of their football team, for others the success of their political party. All these are 'other gods', and are the road to destruction and death.

We do know that the right road is the way of the true God. Pope Francis' theme for World Peace Day on January 15th is "No one can be saved alone. Combatting Covid-19 together, embarking together on paths of peace". The point of 'no one can be saved alone' is that we are not simply seeking heaven alone, but in company of our friends, family and ultimately, with all humanity. The choice offered in the passage from Deuteronomy was not just addressed to each person individually; it was addressed to the entire people of Israel.

We are called not just to make the right choice for ourselves, but to help others to make the right choice; the choice for God. This is how the crisis will become the turning point from chaos and confusion to life, prosperity and salvation. It is a call to evangelisation.
