The Passion of Evangelising

We are now in the season of Lent, and Pope Francis is continuing his teaching on evangelisation at his weekly audiences. He had a two-week break thanks to his visit to Africa, but the series has resumed on 15th February, when he spoke about the 'First Apostolate'.

"After having seen in Jesus the model and the teacher of proclamation, we turn today to the first disciples, to what the disciples did. The Gospel says that Jesus "appointed twelve, to be with Him, and to be sent out to preach" (*Mark 3:14*); two things: to be with him and to send them to preach. There is one aspect that seems contradictory: He called them to be with him and to go and preach. One would say: either one or the other, either stay or go. But no: for Jesus there is no going without staying and there is no staying without going. It is not easy to understand this, but that's the way it is. Let us try to understand a little bit what is the sense in which Jesus says these things."

What appears to be a paradox is actually quite simple. Jesus draws us to himself, and through the Holy Spirit, lives within us, so that when we go out we are not alone, but he is with us. But we need to support our relationship with him by regular Mass attendance, frequent Communion, private prayer and time before the Blessed Sacrament in adoration. Pope Francis expresses it thus:

"It begins from the encounter with the Lord. Witnessing him, in fact, means radiating him; but, if we do not receive his light, we will be extinguished; if we do not spend time with him, we will bear ourselves instead of him — I am bringing myself and not him — and it will all be in vain. So only those who remain with him can bring the Gospel of Jesus. Anyone who does not remain with him cannot bear the Gospel. He will bring ideas, but not the Gospel."

There is another side to this which is that the remaining with Jesus actually requires that we go out with him.

"Following Christ is not an inward-looking fact: without proclamation, without service, without mission, the relationship with Jesus does not grow. We note that in the Gospel the Lord sends the disciples before having completed their preparation: shortly after having called them, he is already sending them! This means that the experience of mission is part of Christian formation."

We are pointed to chapter 10 of St Matthew's Gospel, which we will be reading in the Sunday Gospels in late June and early July. This, Pope Francis describes as being like the 'constitution of the proclamation', and he recommends that we read the whole chapter in one sitting, not just as we will hear it read at Sunday Mass later in the year, and that we read it now and not wait until we hear it at Sunday Mass. Three points from this chapter are addressed: why proclaim, what to proclaim and how to proclaim.

WHY

"You received without payment, give without payment." (Matthew 10:8)

Because we have received freely from God, so we should give freely. "The proclamation does not begin from us, but from the beauty of what we have received for free, without merit: meeting Jesus, knowing him, discovering that we are loved and saved. It is such a great gift that we cannot keep it to ourselves, we feel the need to spread it. . . . In other words: we have a gift, so we are called to make a gift of ourselves; we have received a gift and our vocation is to make a gift of ourselves to others; there is in us the joy of being children of God, it must be shared with our brothers and sisters who do not yet know it! This is the reason for the proclamation. Going forth and bringing the joy of what we have received."

WHAT

"The Kingdom of heaven has come near" (*Matthew 10:7*). This is not the same as saying that 'the end of the world is nigh', it is saying that God is close to us, and Pope Francis illustrates this in three ways: closeness, mercy and tenderness. God is not remote or distant. As we have seen, he is, through the Holy Spirit, dwelling in our heart. And, unlike the parody of the preacher, he is not constantly telling us off, he is there to welcome the sinner. As he has welcomed us and forgiven us, we proclaim his welcome and forgiveness.

HOW

"See, I am sending you out like sheep in the midst of wolves."

(Matthew 10:16) Jesus does not tell us to become wolves ourselves; it is by our simple holiness, by our willingness to be lambs that we will succeed. Pope Francis quotes: "As long as we are lambs, we will conquer, and even if we are surrounded by many wolves, we will overcome them. But if we become wolves — 'Ah, how clever, look, I feel good about myself' — we will be defeated, because we will be deprived of the shepherd's help. He does not shepherd wolves, but lambs" (St John Chrysostom, Homily 33 on the Gospel of Matthew)." Being 'lamblike' must be total; body, mind and spirit; it is not by arguing or clever speeches, sermons or homilies without the life to back up the words. However, what is important is testimony; being able to tell our own story of our experience of the love of God.

Pope Francis also makes the point that Jesus does not tell his disciples what <u>to</u> take on our mission, but what <u>not</u> to take! He expresses it thus: "Jesus says not to lean on material certainties, but to go into the world without worldliness. That is to say, I am going into the world, not with the style of the world, not with the world's values, not with worldliness — for the Church falling into worldliness is the worst thing that can happen."

In this chapter of Matthew we will find the key to proclamation: to <u>show</u> Jesus rather than to <u>talk about</u> Jesus. "Go forth, meek and good as lambs, without worldliness, and going together" (*Pope Francis 15/2/23*)

Scripture Readings 26th February 2023, 1st Sunday of Lent, Year A

From Genesis we have the second and probably older description of the creation of humanity. This expresses the truth that God made us as "living beings". By eating the forbidden fruit, man does "become like God", able to make choices, but without the wisdom needed to choose well. Perhaps like a child's growing self-awareness. The mischievous serpent later came to be interpreted as Satan.

This penitential psalm begs pardon for our sins, asking to be restored to grace and purity, and promising to make God's mercy known to others.

Paul has been arguing to the Romans that righteousness comes only through faith. Human beings are unable to become righteous by following the Law given to Moses, which identifies – but does not help to avoid – sin. God offers righteousness as gift, through Jesus' obedience to his Father.

In Matthew's gospel the devil introduces each temptation with the words: "If you are the Son of God", exploring what can it mean for Jesus to be "Son of God"? Is he a miracle-worker, able to satisfy all desires without effort? Is it about showy displays of power or trying to make God do what we want, in return for belief in him? Jesus dismisses Satan, showing his real power. Jesus will rule over all creation, but only through the Cross.
