The Post-lockdown Church

Last week we looked at the way in which we would be able to continue the important Bible study courses through the autumn using Zoom; since then we have been warned that we are looking at six months of increased restrictions as the virus continues to take its toll on our life.

Last Monday Bishop David introduced a series of talks entitled "The Post-lockdown Church", although he himself wondered how possible it is to consider Church after the pandemic when we are still in the midst of it. It is impossible to know what things will be like after it ends. There are the pessimists who speak of the Church "haemorrhaging" members, while others are speaking of people finding deeper spirituality; more people tuning in to on-line Masses and other religious websites. Only time will tell; it is reasonable to assume that there will be both gains and losses. The Bishop mentioned a new book by the Biblical scholar Tom Wright, "God and the Pandemic", and pointed to a YouTube video of him talking about it. He warns against perceiving the pandemic as a punishment from God or a call to repent, but invites us to consider the response of the early Church to the famine reported in Acts 11:27-30, there the Church asked "who is most at risk, what needs to be done to help and who can we send". He sees the pandemic as a call to action. However, the action must be based on a prayerful discernment of the will of God, and not jumping to this or that. (The YouTube video is worth a look: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=F7IToM-hFEo)

Bishop David suggests a three-phase reflection on the situation: attending, imagining and serving.

Attending

This is looking at all the evidence of what is happening. That can be difficult when we ourselves can only see what is close to us or what is reported, and the media are masters of only reporting what they want us to see and failing to report what does not support the conclusions they would want us to draw. We need to enter into dialogue with those around us and find out their experience so that, as a parish, we can recognise our own local situation. The Bishop points to a number of factors: the experience (new for some families) of being the 'Domestic Church', experiencing Mass on line with the household gathered around a computer rather than an Altar and family prayers. Many have found a deepening of their prayer life or their depth of faith through internet sites; engaging in Bible study or prayer meetings. Many have engaged in charitable works, supporting neighbours who have been shielding, supporting food banks, making "the mystery of Christ the Servant King a reality within our communities", as the Bishop says.

He also points out "the quiet, the calm roads, the cleaner air in the skies, the sound of the birdsong" and having time and space to enter into contemplation of creation and our own life.

Imagining

We frequently here the phrase: "New Normal", and none of us knows what this might be, and there is a real possibility that the new normal will be indistinguishable from the old normal, which will show that we have learned nothing from the experience. If we have seen a more caring society during lock-down, a more grateful society, can we not imagine that this care and gratitude might be part of the 'new normal'. Why should we not continue to experience the good things that were in lockdown when the pandemic ends?

Why can we not continue to use the on-line resources to help us to pray better, to help our understanding of the Faith, to increase our knowledge of the Bible? The benefits of Mass live-streamed or recorded and available through the internet have helped us during lockdown, but for the housebound, in effect lockdown will continue. Should this become part of our regular parish life?

Bishop David quotes Fr James Mallon: "someone once said, the Church is like an addict, she will only be open to change when the pain of remaining as she is would be greater than the pain of change." Can we imagine a way of being Church which is faithful to the Holy Spirit, faithful to the Magisterium, faithful to the Gospel and which is appropriate to the age in which we live. Pope Francis has observed that "we are not living in an era of change but a change of era" (*Reported in the National Catholic Reporter, November 10th 2015*)

Serving

In all three of these phases, Bishop David used the present participle; words that end in '-ing'. He makes the point that they are an ongoing process which is never complete. The very act of serving keeps us 'Gospel-rooted' He points us to the parable of the sheep and goats in Matthew 25:31-46. The sheep, who had served other people were not aware that in so doing they were serving Christ. Their motive was simply to serve others. We know of so many 'sheep-acts' that have taken place during the months of lockdown.

Pope Francis has spoken of the Church as a 'field-hospital' and a servant-Church is very much his vision. Tom Wright speaks of this too. The sovereignty of God is shown in service, not in crushing power. If we are to be true missionary disciples, this will be realised in acts of service. Bishop David speaks of growing new fruit, and the post-lockdown Church must be a servant Church.

New Instructions for places of worship.

"From Monday 14 September, you must not meet with people from other households socially in groups of more than 6. This will apply indoors and outdoors, including in private homes. This change will simplify and clarify the rules on social gatherings, so they are easier to understand and easier for the police to enforce. There will be a limited number of exemptions. COVID-19 Secure venues, such as places of worship. restaurants & hospitality venues, can still host larger numbers in total but groups of up to 6 must not mix or form larger groups. This rule will not apply to individual households or support bubbles of more than 6 who will still be able to gather together. Education & work settings are unaffected, & organised team sports will still be able to proceed, as will weddings & funerals up to 30. From Monday, this limit will be enforceable in law." (From the Cabinet Office, HM Government, 9th September 2020).

We are pleased to be able to attend Mass; this is central to our practice of the Faith. Pope Francis is often pointing this out: we live in an inter-connected world, in which we all have a responsibility towards our neighbor, to protect other people from the virus; not just to protect ourselves. Please note the part of the regulations about gatherings 'indoors or outdoors', & be careful after leaving the church & in the car-park.

<u>Track and Trace:</u> The government have now (at last) released their smartphone app to support track and trace, and we have a QR code which can be scanned to record your presence at church. This is not obligatory, but should help in the important task of controlling the spread of the virus. As responsible members of society, we should comply with this request. For the time being we are asked to continue to fill in a paper form, but this may change when the electronic system has bedded in.

A 'Virtual' Pilgrimage of Reparation to Walsingham will take place today, led by Bishop Marcus Stock of Leeds. We are having to adapt to Covid-19 guidelines and so it is a 'Virtual Pilgrimage". Bishop Marcus will be in Walsingham, God willing, but Covid-19 limitations result in the Shrine discouraging visits at weekends. Therefore we are not running any coaches this year. Instead we will be offering an online participation which presents us with an opportunity to reach many more people than in previous years. Holy Communion and face masks: Please note that wearing face masks is compulsory in churches, & you should wear one if you are not exempt. Stewards are not responsible for policing this, but may remind you that this is now the law. However, you clearly cannot have your mouth covered while receiving Holy Communion! The Church's rule is that you consume the Host before you move away from the minister. Please remove your mask before being given the Host. Priest and Deacon wear face-coverings for your protection.

Scripture Readings 27th September 2020, 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

The priest Ezekiel appears to have been among the first Israelites taken to Babylon in captivity in 598 BC. He had strongly urged Israel's leaders to be faithful to God and his covenant, instead of resisting their enemies. But in vain: Israel's further rebellion led to the final destruction of Jerusalem in 586. Ezekiel insists that children are not punished for the sins of their fathers. Each generation and each person must accept responsibility for their own behaviour. Why choose sin and death: "I have no pleasure in the death of anyone, says the Lord God, so turn, and live"

The psalm is a personal prayer for guidance and pardon, while meditating on God's goodness to the just.

Paul urges the Gentile Christians in Philippi to strive for unity, putting their own interests behind those of the Christian community.

The hymn glorifies the way the already existing Christ obediently humbled himself to become man so that "every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord" – the basic definition of a Christian.

In Matthew's gospel Jesus has entered Jerusalem and cleansed the Temple. Now, challenged by the Jewish leaders, Jesus asks which is better – to refuse a command and then do it, or to say 'yes' but disobey? Israel frequently broke their Covenant with God, so sinners will enter God's kingdom before the Jews.

Tip No. 100:

Bible Study Programme resumes.

The foundation course is the "Bible Timeline", and this will run on Wednesday evenings, from 7.00 to 9.00. On Monday at 1.00 pm the course on Hebrews will run, on Tuesday at 10.00 we hope to run the course on the Gospel of Matthew, on Tuesday evening at 7.30 the course on Our Lady will run. We are still exploring the facilities of Zoom, and invite everyone to join.

The 'Bible Timeline' is the place to start. This course will take you through the entire Bible, but concentrating on fourteen books which cover the events leading up to the time of Jesus' earthly life, and then how the Church grew from Pentecost. The books covered are: Genesis, Exodus, Numbers, Joshua, Judges, 1 and 2 Samuel, 1 and 2 Kings, Ezra, Nehemiah, 1 Maccabees, Luke and Acts. These books tell the narrative story of salvation. The other books of the Bible fit into the narrative story and shed more light onto it, but it is these fourteen books that give us a framework so that we can place where the different prophets in the Old Testament or the different letters in the New Testament fit in.

Understanding this framework will greatly enhance understanding in particular of the first readings at Sunday Mass, but even more than

that, will help us to understand the wonderful plan of salvation that God has for the world, and for each one of us. The time of conversation in the study sessions helps us to grow in community, and as we talk about our faith with those who share it, we gain confidence as well as understanding, and so our faith is deepened.

All these will start this week, but the first session is introductory. You will need to download the (free) Zoom app onto your chosen device. Tablets are probably the easiest; smart-phones seem to be less satisfactory, particularly if there are many participants, but lap-top and notebook computers are fine. Desktop computers need to have a webcam attached. This is not difficult, they plug in to a USB socket.

To 'come to' a Zoom Bible Study, please email to Fr Andrew (priest@stgregory.org.uk) for the link. When you have the link, and a few minutes before the start time (or any time during the party), click the link and follow the instructions to join the meeting. Before this, it is a good idea to have made yourself a drink; tea, coffee or whatever takes your fancy and a plate of your favourite nibbles. Sometimes technology can appear frightening, but please give it a go!
