The Marist Mission



Ten years before the birth of Blessed Pauline Jaricot in Lyon, (whose beatification we celebrated on May 22nd this year) Marcellin Champagnat was born just 60 kilometres away in a village near St Etienne. His earliest years were during the turbulent times of the French Revolution, during which the Church had most of its possessions and status removed. In particular, before the Revolution the Church had run all the schools in France. When Napoleon came to power the Church regained some of her freedom, and Marcellin was able to enter the Junior Seminary. He went on to the major seminary in Lyon, where he joined Jean-Marie Vianney in formation for the Priesthood. Together with Jean-Claude Colin and others in the seminary, the idea grew of a missionary society under the patronage of Our Lady, which would focus on teaching children deprived of a Catholic education, since one of the effects of the revolution was the loss to the Church of all its schools.

The history of France in the 19th century is complicated, but the situation of the Church in France at the beginning of the century is strikingly familiar to our own. Very many parishes had no priest, and the majority of priests were over 60 years old. In 1816 when Marcellin was ordained, a third of the parishes had no priest. But Marcellin, Jean-Marie Vianney and Jean-Claude Colin represented a new breed of priest. Before the revolution, the Church was so linked to the establishment that priesthood was seen as a route to status and wealth. This had changed completely. On the eve of the revolution all but five of the French Bishops were drawn from the wealthy sections of society; by the end of the century all but four were from humble origins. This new breed, not just of priest, but of lay Catholics was to change the face of France through the coming century.

Secular priests made a significant impact — the best known is St Jean-Marie Vianney, better known as the Curé d'Ars, but the biggest impact was probably made by the religious orders, both of men and women. In our own Diocese, we know best the Daughters of the Holy Spirit, who were founded in France before the revolution, but had to rebuild their community afterwards. We are familiar with the Society of St Vincent de Paul, founded in Paris in 1833;

The Marist Brothers began as a small school in La Valla, a tiny village in rural France. Today they work throughout the world, and we will hear a little about their work from Br John Mcallister, who is visiting us this weekend. We will have an opportunity to show support for their work in the retiring collection.

The story of the reviving of the Church in France, like that of the 'Second Spring' (in last week's Newsletter) should inspire us that what God has done before can be done again. After the set-back of the French Revolution, the Church rose again; after the set-back of the reformation and the penal years, the Catholic Church in England rose again. After the set-backs of secularism and the self-inflicted wounds of the scandals or recent times, the Church will rise again. It rose before through the love, devotion and dedication of men and women committed to the Gospel and to the message of Jesus Christ.

Scripture Readings 28th August 2022, 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

Part of Wisdom literature, the Book of Sirach, or Ecclesiasticus, was written by Ben Sira about 200 BC. Based on deep experience, it is full of traditional Jewish and worldly wisdom and morals. After describing our duties towards God and our parents, today's reading emphasises the need for humility in face of God's greatness and the wisdom that comes from listening carefully. The omitted verses advise us not to seek what is beyond our power nor tasks beyond what has been assigned to us.

This triumphal Psalm celebrating God's goodness was sung as David danced leading the Ark of the Covenant into Jerusalem.

Our final reading from Hebrews describes the exciting delights of the heavenly city we have now entered, after our baptism. Instead of fearsome Sinai, Zion – the new "Temple Mount" where God resides – is full of angels in tumultuous joyful festival, with

believers and saints made perfect being welcomed by Jesus and our God. What a welcome! But God is still judge: as we have been given the privilege of Jesus as covenant-mediator, we have the responsibility of offering thanksgiving to God

In Luke's gospel we hear about Jesus having dinner with a Pharisee. Two parables illustrate the themes from the first reading of humility and not giving ourselves airs.

In doing so he taught us that we must first die to sin, and then create in our lives on earth a harmony through virtuous deeds, if the grace of our devotion is to reach up to the Lord."

Psalm 67(68):4-7,10-11

In your goodness, O God, you prepared a home for the poor.

The just shall rejoice at the presence of God, they shall exult and dance for joy.

O sing to the Lord, make music to his name; rejoice in the Lord, exult at his presence.

How do you rejoice, exult, even dance for joy (!) — because you can be in the presence of God in so many different ways? Pray for all who share their gifts of music with us enriching our prayer and liturgy

Father of the orphan, defender of the widow, such is God in his holy place.
God gives the lonely a home to live in; he leads the prisoners forth into freedom:

How can we share in God's care for the orphan, the widow, and all who have lost loved ones?

Pray for the lonely, the prisoner and all who feel neglected by others.

You poured down, O God, a generous rain: when your people were starved you gave them new life. It was there that your people found a home, prepared in your goodness, O God, for the poor.

Thank God for the care he takes of us in our daily lives, how he renews us each morning

Thank God that we have homes and roofs over our heads. Pray for the homeless, refugees and asylum seekers.
