The Bread of Life

There have been many expressions of appreciation of our time of Eucharistic Adoration from 19th to 20th July. Many people contributed to the organisation and to all of them our thanks are due.

Many prayers have been offered, much thanksgiving and we have had this wonderful opportunity for being close to Jesus.

From this week for the next five weeks our Sunday Mass Gospel is from St John's Gospel, chapter 6, which begins with the feeding of the 5,000 and continues with the long

discourse on the Bread of Life, which is spread over three weeks.

Most of our Sunday Mass Gospel readings in the second year of the three-year cycle are from St Mark, but his Gospel is much the shortest of the four. St John, on the other hand does not get a year to himself, but is read in Lent and Eastertide. However, it is not read sequentially as the other Gospels are. Sadly, this makes it more difficult to get an overall picture of the message of St John.

Most commentators see St John's Gospel as having two main sections with a prologue and a conclusion. The prologue is familiar form being the Gospel that is read at the Mass of the Day on Christmas Day, beginning "In the beginning was the Word", and echoing the opening of the Book of Genesis: "In the beginning, God". St John goes on the say that "the Word was with God and the Word was God", while Genesis goes on to describe the creative work of God as "God said . . ." God spoke the Word — the Word was with God.

The conclusion is in two parts, and it is general understood that the original end was where John tells the reason for him writing "so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name". (John 20:31) Chapter 21 appears to be a final post-script, but which contains the important story of the commissioning of Peter to 'feed my lambs', 'tend my sheep' and 'feed my sheep'. (John 21:15-19) This is how the Church is given pastoral responsibility, and particularly, how the successor of Peter has his pastoral office.



The two main sections are often described as the 'Book of Signs' and the 'Book of Glory'. The division comes at the beginning of Chapter 13. Early in the Book of Signs (at the first of the signs) Jesus says that his 'hour' has not yet come. (*John 2:4*), but at the beginning of Chapter 13, John tells us that "Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart out of this world to the Father". (*John 13:1*)

The Book of Glory is the entire Passion narrative, beginning with the Last Supper and taking us up to the Resurrection.

The Book of Signs tells of seven miraculous events: Changing water

into wine (2:1-11), curing the official's son (4:46-54), curing the paralysed man at Bethesda (5:1-15), feeding the 5,000 (6:1-15), walking on the water (6:16-21), curing a blind man (9:1-7) and raising Lazarus (11:17-44).

Typically, after a sign there is an affirmation of faith, and there are a number of 'discourses' (teaching narratives) which relate to the sign. One such is that which we will be hearing over the next few weeks. The feeding of the 5,000 leads on to the discourse on the Bread of Life

From the changing of water into wine comes the teaching on Baptism ('you must be born again') and the woman at the well in Samaria. The two healing signs lead on to a discourse on the authority of Jesus. The walking on the water is an interlude, but speaks more about the authority of Jesus. The curing of the blind man is linked to conflict with the Jewish authorities and distinction between those who are wilfully blind through unbelief and those who, through their belief are able to see.

The final sign is a clear pre-echo of the resurrection of Jesus, and therefore ends the 'Book of Signs' pointing on to the final victory of Christ at the end of the 'Book of Glory'.

The entire 'Book of Signs' is a long read, and it is inevitable that to read it at Sunday Mass, it is necessary to split it up into smaller sections. However it is worth making the time to read in one sitting if you can.

Scripture Readings 21st July 2024, 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

Six books, Joshua, Judges, 1 and 2 Samuel, and 1 and 2 Kings, tell Israel's story from the death of Moses until the fall of Jerusalem in 586 BC and the exile to Babylon. While individuals strived for political control, prophets criticised the worshipping of other gods.

Elijah had given his mantle to Elisha, who has been establishing his authority with several miracles for both Jews and Gentiles. As well as the feeding miracle we hear about today, Elisha also restored the Shunammite's son back to life and cured Naaman's leprosy.

The Psalm praises God's lordship over all creatures and his generous responses to all our requests.

After emotionally praying that the Ephesians may be strengthened by Christ dwelling in their hearts, Paul now urges them to follow Christ in the way they live. Although this is the year of Mark, his gospel is short, so for five weeks we now read from chapter six of John's gospel. John has no institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper. Instead Jesus washes the disciples' feet, and his teaching on the Eucharist is given earlier, after the feeding miracle described today. We will see the range of reactions his teaching prompted, with some ceasing to follow him.

The Sanctity of Life

God, the loving creator gave the gift of life; microbial, plant and animal, and in a special way to humanity, with a corresponding duty for the care of all creation. Very early on in human existence that responsibility was abused when Cain killed his brother. Since then, humanity has found new ways of killing and new excuses for trying to justify what God has forbidden and evade our responsibility.

On Friday of last week a bill to allow 'assisted dying' was introduced into the House of Lords — this is being written and printed before any debate takes place — but much of the clamour for this comes from the scare stories which arise from poor (or even bad) end-of-life care or from before the provision of palliative care in hospices. It is a scandal that Cynthia Spencer Hospice has to raise funds in order that people in the last days of their life should have dignity and care which out of love for our neighbour is our human responsibility. The scandal is made worse if we seek to evade that responsibility by killing the patient. There is a clear moral argument as to why this is wrong. There are also practical arguments. The proposed legislation would allow assisted suicide for people within 6 months of natural death due to a terminal illness, but the measuring of life expectancy, even in such illness is not an exact science. Many people surprise doctors by surviving much longer than predicted, and others who die much sooner. Then there is the worry of possible coercion, and the desire 'not to be a burden' which is a common concern to the elderly.

This bill does not satisfy the ardent supporters of euthanasia, who would like to see complete freedom to end the life of anyone judged to be in 'unbearable pain'. This is something waiting 'in the wings'. There are many pressure-groups seeking to change the law in other areas of life that are equally an evasion of our human responsibility; removing all time-limits on abortion, for example.

With a new Parliament, and an enormous number of new members of the House of Commons, it is certain that there will be attempts to introduce private members bills to change the law in ways which conflict with the traditional teaching of the Church, and we cannot expect those who have no belief in God to be swayed by biblical or theological arguments. That is another reason why the mission of the Church is so important! (See the Alpha notice above)

Just as prayer is a vital underpinning for mission, so it is for the protection of life. The national pilgrimage to Walsingham in reparation and prayer for the sanctity of life which will be led by Bishop David on 3rd August is one way in which we can be active in our responsibility for the stewardship of God's creation. It is not only our environment that is in need of protection, and it is not only plant and animal life that is under threat by human rapacious greed, it is the very gift of human life itself.

It is not only the unborn whose life is at risk; the disabled, the sick, the elderly — caring, not killing is our responsibility.
