# "To always be close to Jesus"

Last week Pope Francis approved the second miracle attributed to the prayers of Blessed Carlo Acutis, opening the way to his canonisation and recognition as a saint.

He was born in London, the only child of wealthy parents who moved to Italy when Carlo was only 4 months old, living in Milan. Following his first Holy Communion, he attended Mass as often as he possibly could, and has been called the "Apostle of the Eucharist". He was in many ways a typical boy of our times; he loved video games and watching films, and admired Italian car design by Ferrari and Maserati.

His family were not practicing Catholics, but his parents employed a Polish babysitter who gave the young Carlo his first knowledge of the Church; of prayer and of the love of Jesus.

Through his faith and devotion Carlo's parents came to faith, and many others were converted or had their faith revived by his influence. He has been called 'God's Influencer'!

His faith was not seen only in his prayer and speech; it was revealed in his actions. He engaged in voluntary work to support the poor and homeless, he was concerned for the environment and the protection of nature.

At school, he was not an outstanding student, but had a passion for computer studies, to the extent that he was thought of as a 'geek'. He created a website for his parish in Milan, and then another for his school to encourage volunteering, for which he won a national competition. However, he is better known for creating a website which catalogued and described every approved Eucharistic miracle. Carlo had a great devotion to the Eucharist, attending Mass as often as possible and spending time in Eucharistic adoration.

It is appropriate that the news of his coming canonisation comes shortly before the celebration of Corpus et Sanguis Christi (The Body and Blood of Christ); the great annual celebration of the Eucharist, and for us, this year as we prepare for our 40 Hours Adoration on 19<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> July.

# Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> June: Corpus et Sanguis Christi, Year B

After rescuing the Israelites from Egypt God gave Moses the Law, including the Ten Commandments. The animal's blood thrown over people and altar symbolises the people's agreement to this covenant.

The Psalm gives thanks to God for answering prayers in time of need. And renews our promise to keep God's laws.

The blood which ratified Israel's covenant with God foreshadowed the people's suffering before they could build their kingdom in the Promised Land. So the Letter to the Hebrews sees Jesus Christ's suffering and bloody sacrifice as marking the new covenant, which enables the new people of God to enter their eternal inheritance. But, as "co-heirs with Christ" we must share in Christ's suffering "so as to share his glory". God's kingdom can be built only through suffering: the Cross is the only way.

Like the apostles, we must also drink the cup Christ has drunk, as well as eating the heavenly food we celebrate today.

Mark's gospel brings us back to the Passover blood of the lamb, with which the exodus began, then forward to the Last Supper, when Jesus' own blood was drunk to initiate the new covenant. But Jesus postpones drinking the fourth, final cup of the meal until just before dying on the Cross. Jesus commanded us to repeat the Eucharistic meal "until he comes".

Psalm response: The cup of salvation I will raise I will call on the Lord's name.

# The Church and the State

The law of the Catholic Church forbids clergy from 'assuming public office whenever it means sharing in the exercise of civil power'. (Canon 285 §3) This clearly rules out bishops, priests or deacons from becoming members of parliament (either Commons or Lords). The Church has generally followed a policy of neutrality in relation to party politics.

St Augustine of Hippo allowed the secular government to control the social order provided that it allowed the Church to carry out evangelistic work and worship. This allowed the Church to criticise the State where there was failure to give the Church its legitimate freedom or to uphold good social order.

The Feudal System of the Middle Ages tied Church and State together, this was not the understanding of the early Church, and for Catholics, was eventually was seen to be inappropriate.

Although clergy are forbidden to hold office which gives civil power, that does not apply to Catholic laity, and British politics has been enriched by many Catholics working within many of the political parties.

There is no political party which is perfect in every way, but Catholic Social Teaching has much to offer all the parties in terms of their specific policies. The Church has a duty to commend policies which uphold our teaching and to criticise those which conflict with it

Equally, while not endorsing any one political party, the Church can commend policies which are in line with Catholic Social Teaching, and to criticise those which are not, whatever party has put forward those policies.
