The Season of Creation

The Season of Creation is an annual celebration uniting Christians in prayer and action for the protection of our common home. The idea of celebrating 1 September as a day of prayer for creation began at the wish of the Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios in 1989, and was endorsed by Pope Francis in 2015. The season runs from September 1 to October 4, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi.

During this season we are encouraged to pray and engage in community events in order to deepen our relationship with our God, our neighbour and the earth we share, being ever more attentive to the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor.

We are coming to the end of this year's celebration, but we cannot allow our care for the environment be limited to just one month of the year, and the resolutions we have made in this month need to continue through the coming eleven.

The reality is that each one of us can only have a small effect on the global picture, although if enough of the world's population engage in better ecological practices, major change can be accomplished. There are some issues that require government action, and cannot be fully achieved without international cooperation, which is why the COP meetings are so important. At a domestic level, the greatly increased energy bills are a powerful incentive to us to consume less and insulate better.

Last week the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds has described the new government's proposals as "an unprecedented attack on nature and the laws that protect it". This relates to the scrapping or amending of many environmental protections relating to the creation of 'investment zones' with a 'liberalised planning process', which although claiming to address some issues, will not allow the planning system to stand in the way of investment and development. (*HM Government guidance*)

The prospect of returning to fracking (which was halted after a minor earthquake was caused by it in Blackpool) and increasing use of fossil fuels are also causing alarm, as has the appointment of a climate-change sceptic to be the minister in charge of energy in the government.

We are rightly worried about our own environment and climate, but climate change is a global issue, and the hurricane in Florida, the flooding in Pakistan, following a summer of heat waves, wild fires, drought and famine remind us that we are a small part in a much larger weather system which will need international cooperation to have any significant impact. However, if each nation waits for international agreement before it is willing to act, there is a danger (some would say a certainty) that the crisis will overtake us first.

"If we learn how to listen, we can hear in the voice of creation a kind of dissonance. On the one hand, we can hear a sweet song in praise of our beloved Creator; on the other, an anguished plea, lamenting our mistreatment of this our common home".

Pope Francis, message for October 4th 2022

Songs of creation fill Pope Francis' message. He encourages the church to echo Saint Francis, the patron saint of animals and the environment, who sang, "Praise be to you, my Lord, for all your creatures."

Incorporating the words of a psalm into his reflection, the pope urges, "Let us join the psalmist in singing, 'Let everything that breathes praise the Lord!"

"Tragically," the pope writes, "that sweet song is accompanied by a cry of anguish. Or rather: a chorus of cries of anguish."

He lists areas of concern: plants and animals facing extinction, the suffering of the poor and marginalized, the groups most vulnerable to the consequences of climate change, the pain of indigenous peoples worldwide, who are witnessing the devastation of their ancestral lands for economic gain.

Pope Francis points out that young people all over the world are crying out in protest.

He exhorts readers to "pray and urge nations" to "reach agreement on four key principles."

- 1. "to construct a clear ethical basis for the changes needed to save biodiversity."
- "to combat the loss of biodiversity, to support conservation and cooperation, and to satisfy people's needs in a sustainable way."
- "to promote global solidarity in light of the fact that biodiversity is a global common good demanding a shared commitment."
- 4. "to give priority to people in situations of vulnerability, including those most affected by the loss of biodiversity, such as indigenous peoples, the elderly and the young."

"Mindful of the exhortation of Saint Paul to rejoice with those who rejoice and to weep with those who weep (cf. Rom 12:15), let us weep with the anguished plea of creation. Let us hear that plea and respond to it with deeds, so that we and future generations can continue to rejoice in creation's sweet song of life and hope."

Scripture Readings 2nd October 2022, 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

Habbakuk appears to have prophesied while Judah was being threatened by Babylon, who destroyed Jerusalem in 586 BC. Habbakuk expresses the ever-present frustration of mankind that evil people always seem to triumph. Since God is good and just, why doesn't He intervene to help those who worship Him? Instead of punishing his erring people by a nation even more wicked? God's answer here is that "the upright man will live by his faithfulness". So Habbakuk agrees to "quietly wait" for the invaders to be punished.

The Psalm invites us to praise and worship the Lord daily, for he is our king and shepherd. We must not lose faith in God, as did the Israelites in their desert journey.

In the first of four readings from Paul's second letter to Timothy, he is urged to "bear the hardships" relying on God's power, using and

developing his skills to testify to the good news. You should "guard the rich truth that has been entrusted to you" the truth that Jesus, "has abolished death".

In Luke's Gospel Jesus continues to teach on his way to Jerusalem. We must have confidence in God's plan, carrying out the tasks God has given us. We must not expect God to put this world to rights in our lifetime.

The Prophet Habakkuk

The reading that we have today is the only bit of the prophesy of Habakkuk that is read in the liturgical calendar. It is, in fact particularly relevant at this time, although the exact date if its writing is uncertain. The prophet is crying to God in the face of violent oppression: "Plundering and violence confront me" (1:3) "Law loses its grip and justice never emerges, since the wicked outwits the upright and so justice comes out perverted" (1:4). The answer comes in the final statement of today's first reading: "anyone whohe heart is not upright will succumb:but the upright shall live through faithfulness" (2:4)

St Paul quotes that final statement twice, in Romans (1:17) and Galatians (3:11), and it is also qoted by the author of the letter to the Hebrews (10:38).

He prophesies against those who plunder other nations (2:8), who bring shame on their house by overthowing many people (2:10).

Although the time when God's retribution will come, "if it comes slowly, wait, for come it will." (2:3) We daily pray for an end to the present war in Ukraine, and for all who are suffering there.

Fan into a flame the gift

Last week this article spoke of those who come on Alpha as a means of re-kindling their faith, to 'fan into a flame the gift that God gave them"; indeed, many who are now on the Alpha team are there for that very reason. Maybe they saw it as a sort of extended retreat, lasting eleven weeks but only for two hours each week.

Whether for that reason or for any other, so many people have found it a blessing to them. In the box on the right you can see the titles of each of the sessions. They are all important and basic questions of the Catholic Faith that we all need to be able to answer. Many of the presenters in the course are Catholics, including a two who are now Cardinals! Although Alpha is not of Catholic origin, it is widely endorsed by the Catholic Church.

All are welcome; the meal is free although we do accept donations, and there are no strings attached. While it is too late to join this course, there will be another in the spring.— please think about coming.

First Holy Communion Preparation
