The Witness of the Martyrs

Pope Francis is continuing his talks on evangelisation; last week we read of the imagery used by St Paul of having on our feet the enthusiasm for spreading the Gospel of peace. (*Ephesians 6:15*)

Today, following the general audience teaching that Pope Francis gave on 19^{th} April, we are considering the witness given by the martyrs. Today we understand the word 'martyr' to refer to someone who gave their life for the Gospel, but the meaning of the word 'martyr' comes from the Greek $\mu\alpha\rho\tau\nu\rho\sigma s$ (*martyros*) which means 'witness'. The scholar Origen wrote in the third century:

"Now everyone who bears witness to the truth, whether he support it by words or deeds, or in whatever way, may properly be called a witness (martyr); but it has come to be the custom of the brotherhood, since they are struck with admiration of those who have contended to the death for truth and valour, to keep the name of martyr more properly for those who have borne witness to the mystery of godliness by shedding their blood for it." (*In Johannem, II, 210*)

We see that the meaning of the word had changed by the time that Origen was writing. Pope Francis quotes a sermon by St Augustine preached on the feast of St Lawrence:

"He performed the office of deacon; it was there that he administered the sacred chalice of Christ's blood; there that he shed his own blood for the name of Christ. The blessed apostle John clearly explained the mystery of the Lord's Supper when he said, 'Just as Christ laid down his life for us, so we too ought to lay down our lives for the brethren' (*I John* 3:16). Saint Lawrence understood this, my brethren, and he did it; and he undoubtedly prepared things similar to what he received at that table. He loved Christ in his life, he imitated him in his death" (*Sermons* 34, 14; pl 38, 1395-1397)

The point that Pope Francis emphasises is in the last sentence; that a martyr loves Christ in life and imitates him in death. We are not all called to martyrdom in the final sense, but we are all called to love Christ in our life.

We think of the early centuries of the Church as an age of martyrs; the vast majority of the Apostles and the large number of martyrs who died under the persecution of the Roman Empire, many of whom are celebrated in the calendar of the Church, although for many of them, we know little other than their names, such as St George whom we celebrated last week.

We also think of the age of the martyrs of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries in this land; the 40 canonised martyrs along with Saint John Fisher and St Thomas More. There were also martyrs among the missionaries to the 'New World' of the Americas and the Far East. However, Pope Francis reminds us that martyrs are more numerous in our age than they were in the first centuries.

Pope Francis gives us an example of modern martyrdom in Yemen:

"A land that, for many years, has been wounded by a terrible, forgotten war, which has caused many deaths and still causes many people to suffer today, especially children. In this very land there have been shining witnesses of faith, such as that of the Missionary Sisters of Charity, who gave their lives there. They are still present today in Yemen, where they offer assistance to elderly people who are sick and to people with disabilities. Some of them have suffered martyrdom, but the others continue; they risk their lives, but they keep on going. These sisters welcome everyone, of any religion, because charity and fraternity have no boundaries. In July 1998, while they were returning home after Mass, Sister Aletta, Sister Zelia and Sister Michael were killed by a fanatic because they were Christian. More recently, in March 2016, shortly after the beginning of the still ongoing conflict, Sister Anselm, Sister Marguerite, Sister Reginette and Sister Judith were killed together with some laypeople who helped them in their charity work among the least. They are the martyrs of our time. Among these laypeople killed, as well as Christians there were some Muslim faithful who worked with the religious sisters. It moves us to see how the witness of blood can unite people of different religions. One should never kill in the name of God, because for him we are all brothers and sisters. But together one can give one's life for others."

The lower of the two lamps that are to the right of the Tabernacle in the church is for Yemen: the basket in which the lamp sits is from that troubled country. It is easy to forget long-running wars that are not being reported in the media, overwhelmed by more recent conflicts such as that in Sudan and Ukraine. The upper lamp is for the Holy Land, also in constant need of our prayers.

Among other recent martyrdoms, there have been many in Nigeria and in other parts of the world, and their witness should encourage us who face so much less of a risk to our life in our following of Christ.

"Although martyrdom is asked of only a few, "nevertheless all must be prepared to confess Christ before men. They must be prepared to make this profession of faith even in the midst of persecutions, which will never be lacking to the Church, in following the way of the cross" (*Vatican II*, *Dogmatic Constitution Lumen Gentium*, §42).

May the holy Martyrs pray for us that we may be faithful witnesses to Christ in whatever way he may call us, whatever our vocation may be.

Parish Finances — It's that time of year again! The new planned giving envelopes for the coming year are now available. Many people have transferred to giving by standing order; this is very helpful for the parish, and many thanks for this. For those who are using envelopes, please collect yours from the table in front of the confessionals.

Prayer for our Country: We are invited to use the three days leading up to the coronation of King Charles III as a special time of prayer. While it is recognised that not everyone is a supporter of the monarchy, and many do not see themselves as British, the reality is that we live in this country, and in many respects the country is in desperate need of prayer. We have a cost-of-living crisis, our health service is in a mess, there is industrial unrest in much of the state-run services, and our immigration service is overwhelmed. Three days of prayer for our country must be a good idea. This will be from Wednesday May 3rd to Friday May 5th, and will conclude with a Mass, at St Gregory's at 7.00 pm.

Eucharistic Minister's Training: The ministry of giving the Blessed Sacrament to the faithful is important, and is a ministry of service. It is not a reward for the exceptionally holy. We all acknowledge that we are not worthy to receive Christ in the Eucharist, and the receiving is the greater honour than the giving. As we return to the normal practice of offering Holy Communion from the Chalice, we will need to recruit new Eucharistic Ministers, and for this there will need to be training in the practicalities of this ministry. Deacon Michael is compiling a list for this, and there is a Diocesan training course which will be run here starting in a few weeks, to be completed by Corpus Christi.

Scripture Readings 30th April 2023, 4th Sunday of Easter Year A

Last Sunday we heard the middle section of Peter's speech at Pentecost, saying the Resurrection shows Jesus was the Holy One expected by King David. Today the consequences: many of his hearers accept this and are told they must repent and be baptised. "Repent" in the sense of radically changing their life and directing it towards God. Even though Jesus does not appear to baptise during his lifetime, baptism is immediately the mark of membership of the new Christian community, at which they receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The psalm celebrates God's loving care for his people, like a shepherd guarding and guiding his flock, who are looking forward to his generous end-time feast.

Peter's letter continues: God's approval comes not from justifiable punishment but from suffering patiently even when we have done right. Christ patiently bore for us unjustified insults and hurts without retaliating, trusting completely in his Father. We must imitate the Lord our shepherd in every way, placing all our trust in him. He will "give us comfort" and "repose".

In the Gospel John also sees Jesus as the Good Shepherd. He knows each one of us and leads us. We follow him because we know his voice. He is also the gate, through which we can enter and find safety.

Psalm Response: The Lord is my shepherd: there is nothing I shall want.

(Acts 2:14,36-41; Psalm 22(23); 1 Peter 2:20-25; John 10:1-10)
