## Zeal for your house will consume me

We hear these words in the Gospel today (the Gospel for the celebration of the anniversary of the Consecration of the church, not that for the 22<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of the Year). The words are remembered by the disciples to explain the dramatic action of Jesus in his cleansing of the Temple. (*John 2:17*)

The words originally come from Psalm 69:10 in exactly the form quoted in John. We hear them in the responsorial psalm on the 12<sup>th</sup> Sunday of the Year in Year A of the lectionary (21<sup>st</sup> June next year!)

Among the psalms we find many words of praise for the Temple: "How lovely is your dwelling place, O Lord of Hosts" (84:1), "I rejoiced when they said to me, 'let us go to the House of the Lord" (122:1) as well as the psalm we hear today: "The Holy Place, the abode of the Most High" (46:5).

Yet we also hear of Jesus predicting the destruction of the Temple (*Matthew 24:2*), and in today's Gospel we hear that Jesus was actually speaking of the temple of his body.

While we are familiar with the story of the cleansing of the Temple, one of those which occurs in all four Gospels, what may not be noticed due to the way in which we read the Scriptures at Mass is that St John places the event at a different place from the other three Gospels. Matthew, Mark and Luke place this event immediately after the triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday; in other words, at the beginning of Holy Week. That is probably where most Christians instinctively think of it, and might justify that by saying the three accounts beat the one in John. However, we must not forget that both Matthew and Luke are repeating the account in Mark. John places this event right at the beginning of the ministry of Jesus, immediately after the first sign he gave at Cana when he turned water into wine.

Scholars have written much about this difference between the Gospel accounts, but leaving the scholarship aside, we can ask what can we learn from the words we are hearing today, and their context?

We hear them in the context of the Mass, and while we are celebrating the anniversary of the Consecration of this building, we must always keep in mind that Jesus spoke of the temple of his body, and in the second reading St Paul reminds us that we "are God's Temple".

Following from that, it may be us who are in need of cleansing. Indeed at every Mass we begin with the 'Penitential Act' when we ask for forgiveness for our sins; and we make use of the Sacrament of Reconciliation seeking forgiveness. We can see today as a celebration of our Consecration as a parish and within the parish, as celebration our own personal consecration to God. We could see today as a sort of 'official anniversary' for each one of us in our personal journey of Faith. This is not 'just another day', but a special day of celebration.

Another text which is associated with the anniversary of the Consecration of a Church is from the Old Testament story of Jacob's Ladder: "Surely the Lord is in this place; and I knew it not" (*Genesis 28:16*), beautifully set to music by Anton Bruckner as "Locus Iste"; "This place was made by God". We can say that of our own body as well as of the church, and just as we seek to make the church beautiful and clean, so too do we care for our bodies and souls.

Jesus was not impressed by the physical beauty of the Temple in Jerusalem:

"And while some were speaking of the temple, how it was adorned with noble stones and offerings, he said, "As for these things that you see, the days will come when there will not be left here one stone upon another that will not be thrown down." (Luke 21:5-6)

The beauty he seeks in us is in the love and goodness of our life. Specifically, in the Temple of Jerusalem, it was the money-changers and the pigeon-sellers that he attacked. They were turning the Temple into a 'house of trade'.

"You cannot serve God and money" said Jesus, (*Matthew 6:24*) and that was true of the Temple as it is of us. If the purpose of the Temple was to make money, it was failing God, and equally, if our purpose is to make money, we become a servant of money, not a servant of God.

The problem for the Temple was that was just what it had become and not just that it had become a money-making enterprise; it was doing it through fraud by insisting that all transactions in the temple were done in temple currency, and the money-changers were setting fraudulent rates of exchange. This was nothing new; Amos spoke of this:

Hear this, you who trample on the needy and bring the poor of the land to an end, saying, "When will the new moon be over, that we may sell grain?

And the Sabbath, that we may offer wheat for sale, that we may make the ephah small and the shekel great and deal deceitfully with false balances. (Amos 8:4-6)

Jesus' complaint echoed that of Amos; it was not so much about the trading but about the dishonest trading: "you have made it a den of robbers". (*Luke 19:46*)

It was not the building itself that was committing the fraud, it was the people working in the building, but by so doing, they corrupted the building itself. The Church is, first of all, God's House, and as such, a house of prayer. It is where we meet to obey the Lord's command to 'do this in memory of me' — to celebrate Mass and to receive forgiveness. It is a place that is freely open to everyone as a place of sanctuary and a house of prayer. And we, who see it as 'our church' must likewise be open to the needs of others and people of prayer, being 'without spot or wrinkle'. (*Ephesians 5:27*)

## Scripture Readings: For the Anniversary of the Consecration of the Church

Ezekiel was deported to Babylon with the Jews in 598 BC. He explained the fall of Jerusalem and destruction of the temple as God's punishment for his people, and predicted a new day and a new temple for Israel. Today we hear about the extensive supply of life-giving water that will pour from this new temple, enough even to make the Dead Sea fresh enough for fish.

The psalm is a hymn of victory: we trust in the Lord, he will protect us in his city.

The Jews believed God dwelt in the temple in Jerusalem. But, writing from Ephesus around AD 54, Paul tells the Corinthians that "you are God's sanctuary" since "God's Spirit dwells in you". They are being built into "God's holy temple". They should stop quarrelling among themselves and be a community united in loving service. Sowing dissension damages God's temple and will be punished.

Near the beginning of John's gospel, after the disciples are chosen and the marriage at Cana, Jesus proclaims his mission by cleansing the Jerusalem temple. The temple had become a business, in which those in religious authority profited from the spiritual needs of the people. His Father's house should not be misused: trade and power have no place in it.

## Season of Creation starts tomorrow

Thanks to the creation of the "Borgo Laudato si" project, the beauty of the Pontifical Villas' Gardens has become the natural setting for the development of a place, open to all people of good will, to be trained in integral ecology. By setting up Borgo Laudato Si' in his residence at Castel Gandolfo, Pope Francis wanted to demonstrate that the principles described in the Encyclical "Laudato Si" could become a reality. The project has been developed in three directions: integral ecology education, circular and generative economy, and environmental sustainability.



Borgo Laudato Si' includes 55 hectares of extraterritorial area, divided into 35 hectares of magnificent gardens and 20 hectares of agricultural and

farming land, greenhouses and service buildings that the Borgo is committed to preserving and developing with loving care, by also adding to the investment on education the essential commitment to foster the culture of care.

Regarding the gardens area, the Borgo is entrusted with their preservation, maintenance, care, and at the same time development, by also applying new techniques and technological innovations







to better protect the wealth of the place and preserve its integrity for future generations.

In the agricultural area, production activities typical of the Pontifical farms are being reorganized and developed, by also employing a model of circular economy based on sharing, reusing, repairing, reconditioning, and recycling. The project also includes the creation of an energy community based on renewable sources.

In every activity, biodiversity preservation and harmonious interaction between human beings and nature are deemed very important. The main thrust of Borgo Laudato

Si' is education in integral ecology and fraternity, making it inclusive and accessible to everyone, especially to vulnerable people. From job training to educational courses, from immersion experiences into nature to seminars and cultural events, everything at Borgo is an opportunity to take advantage of the educational courses on the themes of the Encyclical Laudato Si'.
