# It's our Anniversary!

13 years ago on 3<sup>rd</sup> September Bishop Leo McCartie came to consecrate our church, 50 years after it was first opened and blessed by his predecessor, Bishop Leo Parker.

In the 63 years that this building has been here, there have been great changes, both in the Church and in our community. It is good, from time to look back over the past.

Our vision is that we should be a 'thriving Catholic community confidently and humbly proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ'. In the light of this vision, we can examine our blessings, see where we can improve and look to the future in hope and faith

#### **Count your Blessings**

The history of the parish recounts many blessings; the faithful priests, religious sisters and lay-people who have worked here. There were those who had the vision to establish a mission in East Northampton (long before the 'Eastern Development' had been thought of) when Booth Lane marked the end of the town. The previous plan, which was to build a church on Wellingborough Road was changed as development grew east of Park Avenue. Sainsbury's now stands where the church was to be built, and an allotment site on the corner of Park Avenue North and Birchfield Road East was purchased. Initially a second- hand wooden ex-American army hut was bought and put up where the car-park now is. The parish of St Gregory's was established on 27<sup>th</sup> September 1947.

The original plan was that we would be the parish under the patronage of St Joseph, but there was already a chapel of St Joseph in Northampton, (the chapel of the Notre Dame convent school) and Bishop Parker wanted a church under the patronage of St Gregory, the Pope who first encouraged the evangelisation of Britain.

As the parish with the responsibility for the mission in Abington, we were to have the heavenly patronage of the saint who began the mission to England. How blessed are we! Our mission in the 21<sup>st</sup> century has the benefit of the prayers of the saint who began the mission fifteen centuries ago.

The first Parish Priest, Fr Eric Phillips, together with a loyal band of lay-people built up the life of the parish, and within a very short space of time the wooden hut became too small, and plans were made for the building of a permanent church at the front of the site.

Ours is not the first St Gregory's Church in Northampton. In medieval times there was a church of St Gregory in Marefair, very close to St Peter's church, which still stands.

There is a planned talk on the original St Gregory's church on Tuesday evening 12<sup>th</sup> September. It will be available to hear afterwards through the 'Friends of St Peter's' website: fostp.org.uk

Our St Gregory's was opened and blessed on 11<sup>th</sup> February 1954. It was originally planned that once the permanent church was built, the wooden hut should be demolished and the church extended. Hence the east wall was intended to be temporary, and is built with less good bricks than the rest of the church. However, increasing building costs made this difficult, and Northampton continued growing eastwards so the decision was made, rather than enlarging St Gregory's, to build a new church at Weston Favell. A particular blessing of this is that we have a small car-park. Had the church been enlarged, this would not have been possible.

Much more history of the church and parish is contained in the printed book on sale at the repository. It records that Nikolaus Pevsner (1902-83), the renowned architectural historian, visiting St. Gregory's around 1960, was rather unkind in saying the interior was "unsuccessfully eclectic". He believed that the merit of the building lay in its beauty. However there is another measure which is to do with homeliness and welcome. There are 'Ideal Homes', where nothing is out of place and you dare not sit down lest you un-plump a cushion. Churches are not like that! Everything in St Gregory's has a story, it is there because someone has given it; it is in memory of someone or some event or has some function. The beauty lies in the love of the people of St Gregory's, past and present, who have made it and continue to make it a house of prayer and the home of the community who meet here for Mass week by week and day by day.

#### **Looking to the future**

Our vision statement is an aspiration, and we recognise that we have not yet fully realised it. We need to respond better to the call of Pope Francis that we be a 'Missionary Parish' because 'thriving' means growing, and while we are maintaining stability, that is less than what is needed for growth.

For us to be confidently proclaiming the Good News there is a need for more and better ongoing faith-formation. We need to restore the opportunities for Bible Study and adult faith formation. For too long the Church failed to recognise this need, while putting a lot of emphasis on children's Sacramental preparation, providing little or no continuing development apart from in our teacher training colleges.

We need to grow in our prayer-life. In the years following the Second Vatican Council many traditional devotions were dismissed as 'old-fashioned' and 'out of date' (in spite of the actual teaching of the council (for example, Eucharisticum Mysterium, Chapter III). It would be wonderful to restore the weekly Thursday adoration to the full day.

May our future be as richly blessed as our past has been, and **Happy Anniversary to all our parish and friends.**

#### Courses in the Autumn (plus Alpha)

Before the pandemic and lockdown we were running a variety of courses here at St Gregory's and in other neighbouring parishes. These were highly valued by those who took part in them, and a number of people have requested that they should resume.

Many of the courses that we have run are those produced by Ascension Press in America. There have been no new courses produced in the last three years, but the Bible Timeline course remains the basic foundation course on the Scriptures, and helps in understanding the readings at Mass, and is particularly recommended for those who proclaim the readings at Mass.

The Bible Timeline course will run on Tuesday mornings after Mass starting in September. It runs for 24 weeks, and will break when schools are on holiday, ending in the Spring.

On Wednesday evenings there will be a course on the Mass; not using video presentation, but allowing plenty of opportunity for questions. This will be over 9 sessions starting on September 6<sup>th</sup>, starting at 7.30 pm in the Sacristy.

Fewer Electrical Hazards: Our statutory fixed wiring test, which was overdue thanks to the pandemic showed up a number of issues, none of immediate danger, but some areas of non-compliance with the latest regulations. While doing this it seems sensible to update the lighting to the latest LED lamps which will significantly reduce our electricity consumption and therefore our carbon footprint, particularly in the winter. The lights in the side aisles and at Our Lady's shrine have already been changed, as have those at the front of the nave. The rest will be done soon. There is now a new board with circuit breakers for the hall, kitchen and sacristy, meeting the current requirements. Part of safeguarding is to ensure that in every respect the church is as safe as possible for all who come here.

Fire Safety - Important notice. We have had trays made to go under the racks where the candles burn to prevent the possibility of a naked flame falling on unlit candles below. Unlit candles must not be placed on these trays in any circumstances & must not be stacked one on top of another. This has happened recently, and must not continue.

### 3<sup>rd</sup> September 2023, Anniversary of the Consecration

Ezekiel was deported to Babylon with the Jews in 598 BC. Today we hear about the extensive supply of life-giving water that will pour from this new temple, enough even to make the Dead Sea fresh enough for fish.

The Jews believed God dwelt in the temple in Jerusalem. But, writing from Ephesus around AD 54, Paul tells the Corinthians that "you are God's sanctuary" since "God's Spirit dwells in you". 

## The Season of Creation

The 'Season of Creation' begins on 1st September, and continues until the feast of St Francis of Assisi on 4th October.

Each week through the 'Season of Creation' there will be a microscope photograph in the newsletter taken by Mike Gibson, together with a description of the subject. We are blessed with wonderful nature programmes on television and Mike's pictures are offered to show a different view of God's wonderful work of creation. There is a beauty in these tiny pieces of creation; there is also a reason for their existence; they form part of our ecosystem, with a vital function in some way supporting the world we can see with the naked eye.



Diatoms - nature's jewels- are in fact tiny plants found almost everywhere in seas, rivers, lakes, and ponds; so abundant they can even be seen as ocean blooms from space. However, being so small, they can only be observed individually with the aid of a microscope as shown in this picture taken of some found in the River Nene, close to the university. Diatoms belong to a group of plants known as algae and are important not only in carbon capture, but also producing almost 30% of the world's oxygen we breathe! One last interesting fact is that Victorian microscopists started a craze that continues to this day for collecting and making slides of diatoms in order to study and marvel at their intricate transparent outer silica shell structures as shown in this picture.
