## All mankind shall see the salvation of God

The is part of the Alleluia verse for this Sunday's Mass, and is drawn from St Luke's account of the same event that Matthew is describing in today's Gospel. The gospel accounts are quoting from Isaiah 40:5, near the beginning of the second part of Isaiah, known as the 'Book of the Consolation'. It speaks of God's desire to bring all peoples to salvation.

VISION

We read this on the Sunday following the release of the news of the responses to the religious question in the 2021 national census, in which we are told that, for the first time, the number of those selfidentifying as Christian has fallen to below 50%.

Last Sunday we heard a pastoral letter from our Bishop in which were chilling words:

"Every year, our number of priests decreases and we need to plan the best way to deploy our clergy. Mass attendance figures are also in steady decline. We need to look at our parishes, their properties and resources and discern where the future lies. This is a challenging exercise for many reasons. When a church is closed, a whole story of endeavour to build it, sacramental memory and community cohesion is lost or at least fractured. These decisions should not be taken lightly."

We are all aware that the number of priests is in decline, and Mass attendance has not recovered from the pandemic. The Bishop has a responsibility to deploy his priests where they are most effective, and this may mean that some churches have to close. One of the determining factors must be the spiritual health of the worshipping community within the parish. A thriving parish community is more likely to survive than one which is not.

Bishop David spoke of Pope Francis' theme for the Synod next autumn: "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission". The idea of a synod is for a bishop together with the clergy and people of a diocese to talk about issues that face them. It is not of itself a decision-making body, and does not work like a parliament, nor is it a committee. There are some in the Church who seem to fear that it is a means of changing Church teaching. This fear is groundless; synods do not have that authority. The three headings are important.

#### Communion

The word 'Communion' can be understood in more than one way. First, we can see it as the gift to us of Holy Communion - of becoming one with God through receiving the body of Christ into our own bodies. But it is also at a human level the action of a community. It is a way of expressing fellowship one with another, and with a shared interest or purpose. We meet at Mass for Holy Communion, but our community life can be, and should be, greater than this. Our common purpose begins with our worship of God, but continues as we seek to make real our prayer that God's kingdom may come.

#### Participation

Communion cannot be the action of the few; it must involve everyone. That is, the participation of everyone. However, this participation can be expressed in many different ways, depending on the circumstances of each of us.

An example of this is our participation in Mass. Not everyone participates as the priest or the deacon; not everyone proclaims the Scriptures nor sings in a choir. Yet we all participate in making the responses, in participate in 'active listening'; above all, we participate in prayer and in Communion. We are not passive spectators nor just people who happen to be there.

So too in the life of the parish, if the parish is to be a 'thriving Catholic community'. The offer of refreshments after Mass on Sundays, and of a warm welcome on Monday and Wednesday mornings gives us the chance to get to know each other better and grow in fellowship and community. This is not a 'big ask' in itself, but may lead to other things.

#### Mission

Mission was Jesus' last command to his disciples: "Go, therefore and make disciples of all nations." The long-term thriving of a parish depends on mission. A part of that mission is directed to the children of the parish, and demonstrated in their Sacramental preparation and in Children's Liturgy. Another part of that mission is directed to the adult congregation, and is demonstrated by the ongoing Bible study, by the Small Communities programme and other ongoing formation opportunities such as the afternoon retreat last Saturday and the day retreat next Saturday.

But the most important part of the mission must be directed to those who are outside the Church altogether; those who do not call themselves Christian; those 37.2% of the population who said they had 'no religion'.

#### All mankind shall see the salvation of God

None of us can take on the responsibility for a mission to all mankind. But all of us can be responsible for a mission to someone.

The first reading paints a picture of a world in which all peoples live in peace without warfare and violence: "the wold lives with the lamb, the panther lies down with the kid, calf and lion-cub feed together with a little boy to lead them. The cow and the bear make friends, their young lie down together". (Isaiah 11:6-7) But this does not happen by chance. It depends on the previous paragraph; on the one on whom the Spirit of the Lord rests, that is, Christ. But he has given us the gift; we hear these words in Confirmation:

The Spirit of wisdom and insight, the spirit of counsel and power, a spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord.

Supplied with these gifts, in communion with each other, in mutual participation, we are able to engage in mission.

## Scripture Readings 8th December 2022, 2nd Sunday of Advent, Year A

The readings for Advent from Isaiah continue with this description of the ideal king, who will come from the remnant of Israel – the stump of Jesse, of David's dynasty. This was applied by Christians to Jesus. But Isaiah was seeking to comfort his people, under attack by Assyria, as he foresees an idyllic future when the whole of creation will live in complete harmony. Only the "fear of the Lord" and the "knowledge of the Lord" could bring this about.

The psalm looks forward to the coming of a perfect king, the Messiah, whose rule will be just and his reign glorious.

Paul's letter to the Romans exhorts the two groups of Christians in Rome to work patiently together, ignoring varying degrees of conformity to the Jewish Law. We must learn about God from the Jewish Scriptures, the Old Testament, so that we may worship him in unity of mind and mouth. The Messiah's sufferings show that God keeps His promises, and will lead all nations, both Jews and Gentiles, to praise God.

In the Gospel John the Baptist, the last prophet of the Old Testament, prepares the way of the Lord by urging people to repent, to turn towards God from their sins. But he condemns those who say they have no need of God.

Psalm Response: In his days justice shall flourish and peace till the moon fails.

(Isaiah 11:1-10; Psalm 71(72); Romans 15:4-9; Matthew 3:1-12)
