Dear brothers and sisters,

HAPPY CHRISTMASTIDE!

As so many have written before: we profess that God became man and lived among us. Jesus walked this earth and He breathed our air so that He might die on the Cross to redeem us. It is this pilgrimage of God to be alongside us that brings us **eternal redemption**.

In a few days we shall hear how the Magi finished their pilgrimage to see the Child Christ at the home of Mary and Joseph. What motivated them to leave the comfort and security of their family? What inspired them to undertake a journey to a distant land? They believed something momentous had happened, that the Saviour had been born, and this was confirmed by an unusually bright star rising in the night sky. The Wise Men brought the Christ gifts: Gold for a King. Frankincense for a Priest. Myrrh for a corpse.

As Christians we too are on a mysterious expedition! The Kings were guided by the Star of Bethlehem until they found the home of Mary and Joseph. So where are we to find the Christ today? In the same place the Magi found Him: in Bethlehem, which in Hebrew means "The House of Bread", so we shall find Him in the celebration of the Mass when the Scriptures are proclaimed and the Eucharistic Sacrifice is offered.

Jesus is always to be found and thus heard and seen at Mass; yes, even when offered in our Primary School!

This year, unable to be in St Gregory's Church for the Mass of the Epiphany, we shall be fellow travellers with the Magi, as we journey to participate in the Eucharistic Sacrifice in the parishes of Northampton and beyond. As we do so, let us hold each other in prayer, and most especially as we see the Eucharistic Christ lifted up above the Altar, for us to adore; just as the Wise Men adored the Christ Child. Let each of us also remember that Christmas is a holy pilgrimage of great joy with blessings that last for several weeks!

Some Joyful News: Whilst our focus is ensuring that we can return to St Gregory's Church as soon as possible, two smaller projects remain underway! These are covering the sanctuary platform and ambo in new carpet called: "Gilded Chalice" and the creation of a tabernacle veil, ambo fall and lectern falls in "All Seasons" fabric:



"The birds have a symbolic significance; they are the mediators between Heaven and Earth and in early Christian art they signified

saved souls. The elegantly decorated urn, a container for oils and perfumes, signifies Mary Magdalene, one of the most popular of Christian saints and consequently much depicted in Christian art. Amongst the many flowers in the design, it is possible to distinguish the Blue Iris, a floral symbol of the Virgin Mary and the Thistle, a symbol of the Passion of Jesus Christ and the sufferings of the Christian martyrs. Finally, the grapevine symbolises abundant life and the grapes, the Eucharist."

Blessed chalk will be available after Holy Mass this weekend so that you might bless your home in this the New Year of Our Lord 2026. The blessed chalk is used to mark the year (20 - 26), the initials of the three Magi (C - M - B), whose names are Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar, and the Lord's holy Cross (♣) over the main door of your home as a sign of His blessing, i.e. 20 ♣ C ♣ M ♣ B ♣ 26. The initials of the Magi represent, in Latin, the blessing:

Christus mansionem benedicat
Christ bless this house.

This is a beautiful act of Faith and very often it will encourage questions from visitors to our homes.

St John Henry Newman prayed:

The Epiphany (Tuesday, 6th January): This solemnity celebrates the visit of the Wise Men to the Christ Child at the Home of Mary and Joseph and is a Holy Day of Obligation; please consult the newsletters of other parishes for the times of Mass.

2025 Jubilee Year: Called 'Pilgrims of Hope' this concludes on the Epiphany: Tues., 6th January.

Next Jubilee Year: 2033 will be of exceptional significance for the Christian community and the entire world. This extraordinary year will mark the two thousandth anniversary of the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, which is the foundation of our Catholic Faith. This will be a unique Jubilee, characterised by profound spiritual celebrations and a renewed commitment to the values of peace, reconciliation and solidarity.

Small bottles of Holy Water will be available to take home after Mass on Sunday, 11th January as we celebrate the Solemnity of the Baptism of the Lord; this is the final day of the Christmas season. This Holy Water can be used to bless one's home, the grave of a loved one, etc. but is not for drinking.
