Eighteen Years Ago

We are celebrating the event eighteen years ago when Bishop Leo McCartie came to dedicate our church 50th years after its original opening and blessing. It was on February 11th 1954 that Bishop Leo Parker opened and blessed St Gregory's, but not dedicated. This is because the act of dedication sets aside the building permanently, This cannot be assured if there is still a debt on the church. Although the debt had been paid off well before 2004, the church had never been formally dedicated, and the Golden Jubilee was a good time for this.



Looking at the crosses in the walls of the church, we may be reminded of the cross that was signed on us at the time of our own Baptism, Our Baptismal cross is not visible to others except by our way of life;

Our Christian life is not a 'bolt-on' addition to our everyday life, any more than the crosses in the walls of the church are bolt-on accessories. Just as the church walls are etched with the sign of the Cross, so our life must be indelibly marked with the sign of the Cross, shining out in our daily life.

One of the ways in which a dedicated church can be recognised is the sign of crosses and candles on the walls of the church. It is possible to buy crosses and candle sconces ready made which can be screwed onto the walls, but this could seem to make dedication a 'bolt-on' addition to the building rather than something which could not be unscrewed; in other words, to reflect the permanent nature of the dedication.

Also, the previous year the church had been re-wired, and the old light fittings, which were iron hoops hanging high up were removed and replaced with fittings attached to the walls, making the changing of bulbs less hazardous. The iron of the hoops was re-cycled into the brackets for the candles which were made by Mr Hugh Billingham from Thomas Becket Catholic School. The design was based on that of the two sconces in the sanctuary.

The Dedication Mass begins with the sprinkling of the walls and people with Holy Water, and the crosses and candles represent two further parts of the dedication ceremony. Each of the crosses is anointed with Chrism; the Holy Oil that is used in Baptism, Confirmation and Ordination. The candles are then lit. This sequence follows the Baptism liturgy, in which water is poured, the candidate is anointed with Chrism, and then given a lighted candle.

The church needs caring for and maintaining, just as our Christian life needs maintaining. For the church, the nourishment that it needs is in things like paint and cleaning materials; for our Christian life the first need is for the life of Christ Himself; given in the Eucharist. This is our most fundamental feeding. We also need the light of Christ to be shining upon us and within us, and this comes from the Holy Spirit.

We need to be hearing the Word of God in Holy Scripture, and taking this to heart. We hear this Word at every liturgy in the church, and we need to spend time letting this Word take root in our souls.

In many ways the Dedication of the Church has a parallel in our own Baptism and life of faith, and the dedication of the church is also the dedication of the people of the Church. [Notice that the church building has a small 'c' while the Church, the community of faith has a large 'C'.]

For many of us, our Baptism may have been many more than eighteen years ago; for others, more recently. But our celebration today can be seen as a celebration of our own personal dedication to God. May the Cross be deeply etched in our heart and life, and may the Light of Christ shine out through our life of goodness and love.



Scripture Readings 4th September: The Anniversary of the Consecration of the church

Ezekiel was deported to Babylon with the Jews in 598 BC. He explained the fall of Jerusalem and destruction of the temple as God's punishment for his people, and predicted a new day and a new temple for Israel. Today we hear about the extensive supply of life-giving water that will pour from this new temple, the source of God's blessing. An ample supply of water would obviously be an enormous benefit in this dry land, and even make the Dead Sea fresh enough for fish.

The psalm is a hymn of victory: we trust in the Lord, he will protect us in his city.

The Jews believed God dwelt in the temple in Jerusalem. But, writing from Ephesus around AD 54, Paul tells the Corinthians that "you are God's sanctuary" since "God's Spirit dwells in you". They are being built into "God's holy temple". They should stop quarrelling among themselves and be a community united in

loving service. Sowing dissension damages God's temple and will be punished.

Near the beginning of John's gospel, after the disciples are chosen and the marriage at Cana, Jesus proclaims his mission by cleansing the Jerusalem temple. The temple had become a business, in which those in religious authority profited from the spiritual needs of the people. His Father's house should not be misused: trade and power have no place in it.

Psalm Response: The waters of a river give joy to God's city, the holy place where the Most High dwells.

(Ezek 47:1-2, 8-9, 12; Ps 45(46):2-3,5-6,8-9; 1 Cor 3:9-11, 16-17; Jn 2:13-22)

Adult Faith Formation - Autumn

On Wednesday 7^{th} September there will be a Diocesan presentation on the Letters to Timothy which will be read on Sundays from 11^{th} September to 23^{rd} October. This will be on Zoom; please email to Fr Andrew for the link.

Starting on Wednesday 28th September, a course of the Psalms will begin. It is sub-titled "The School of Prayer", with the invitation to 'learn to pray like Christ'. We read a passage of the Psalms at every Mass, and the prayer of the Church, used by every priest, deacon and religious involved praying from the Psalms several times every day. As they appear in the printed Bible, they can be difficult to understand, but they formed the heart of the prayer-life of Judaism, and therefore, of Jesus, and have been the backbone of prayer in the Church from the earliest days. Jesus quoted from the Psalms as he hangs on the Cross (Matthew 27:46); St Peter quoted from the Psalms (Acts 1:20); the Holy Spirit inspired them, Israel sang them, Jesus would have heard them from his earliest childhood, as prayed by Our Lady. Within the Psalms we find every human condition; joy, sorrow, fear, doubt. We find prayers of pilgrimage, prayers in suffering and lament and we find prayers of praise and thanksgiving. This course will run on most Wednesdays from 28th September, but there will be a few breaks; on 23rd November there is the next in the Diocesan presentations on the Scriptures inviting us to look at the

readings through Advent and Christmastide. 2nd November is All Soul's Day, and there will be an evening Mass, and 5th October there is another meeting which Fr Andrew needs to be at.

After Christmas there will be a new course starting: "What We Believe: The Beauty of the Catholic Faith". This is from the Ascension Press.
