Harvest & CAFOD

This summer we have all realised the significance of climate change, seeing wild fires all over the world, and then flooding in many places. The emergency services and aid agencies can never know when or where the next crisis will arise. Many of the areas struck this year have never known such weather in all their recorded history. This is why organisations like CAFOD seek to be prepared to move in even before an appeal can be launched.

Although our own weather this summer has been somewhat unusual, and, like most of the world, records have been broken, most of us have been spared the disasters of so many other places.

August 2022 brought devastating flooding to Pakistan, with over a third of the country under water. As well as the obvious catastrophe of homelessness, of the total loss of the harvest and the destruction of infrastructure, there was an immediate health crisis. A year later, researchers report that 40% of children had stunted growth and 25% were underweight due to malnutrition and insufficient healthcare.

CAFOD gives support wherever it is needed; it does not discriminate by religion although it remains our Catholic agency for aid and overseas development. Internationally it works with Caritas, and Charity can know no bounds.

Dr Nasha's Mobile Clinic

Dr Nasha's Mobile Clinic gets her and her team of doctors and nurses where they're needed – fast. Last year, when flooding hit Pakistan, the team travelled across hundreds of miles to treat people who needed medical help in the aftermath of the disaster.

That's how they met Meera. Meera gave birth just as her home was destroyed by the floods.

The family moved into a temporary shelter at the side of the road. And with little food and nothing but contaminated water to drink, diseases started to spread throughout the camp.

Meera told CAFOD: "Our children got sick, and we had no medicines."

When Dr Nasha and her team arrived in her village, Meera hurried to bring her children to the clinic and got them the life-saving medicines and treatment they needed.

Meera's baby, Marwi, is now a healthy one year old. Together, she and her husband have rebuilt their home and are working to recover what they lost in the floods.

The tenants in today's gospel reading claim the vineyard and its harvest as their own. They will not hear otherwise from anyone –





not the landowner's servants or even his son. We are all tenants – here on earth a short while, taking care of God's wonderful gift of creation. Who are the messengers that we do not want to hear? Those who tell us about the climate emergency? Our sisters and brothers around the world who are already facing the effects of flooding? Let's think today about how we can produce the fruit of God's kingdom – caring for our world and all those who share it with us

The season is over, creation continues

The pictures through the microscope have been fascinating, and whether it is the wonders seen through a microscope or a telescope, even those who do not acknowledge a creator, yet speak of the magnificence of creation

Pope Francis is encouraging us to care better for the environment, but in spite of this we see that climate change is getting worse, river pollution grows, inequalities in the world are not diminishing and the number of migrants and refugees is growing.

We can hope that governments will do their bit, and it is important that democratic governments realise that the long-term health of the planet is of greater importance than the short-term wealth of voters. None of us would willingly vote for the devastation that flooding has brought to Libya this year or to Pakistan last year. Certainly we would not wish this for ourselves, for our children or grandchildren. Nor would we wish the wild fires on their hometowns. Should we care less for those who live in Africa, Greece, Pakistan or any other places in the world? Or for their children and grandchildren?

Are we content to see the pictures of the brown water being discharged into our rivers? Would we be willing to swim in those rivers? Would we willingly drink the water from them? Yet many in the world only have polluted water in which to wash; only polluted water to drink.

Many of those who risk their life crossing the Mediterranean and the English Channel in small boats would be risking their life by remaining in their home countries, some by simply drinking the water coming from polluted rivers, or from starvation as their fields are flooded or parched, or from wars devastating their homelands.

There is a single eco-system in the world — our problems here are directly linked with the problems faced in other countries. If we roll back on climate change as we have done on foreign aid, we will feel the consequences.

8th October 2023, 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

First Isaiah was writing before 700 BC, when Assyria threatened and eventually overwhelmed Israel, the northern kingdom. Isaiah insists that only being faithful to God will protect the nation from disaster. The unproductive vineyard is the house of Israel, where, in spite of the care lavished on it by the Lord, there is bloodshed and injustice.

The psalm beseeches the Lord to protect his vine, Israel. Transplanted from Egypt, it has been severely damaged, but Israel promises not to forsake the Lord again.

In his affectionate farewell to the Philippians, Paul urges them to "rejoice in the Lord always", not anxious, but thinking about all that is good, letting the Lord know all their needs. They should imitate Paul in the way he relies on the Lord. Then God's grace will bring them peace. Our God is the God of peace. He is not

seeking to catch us out, but longs for us to accept the peace he offers and to rely on him totally.

This parable in Matthew's Gospel about a vineyard owner follows immediately after last week's story of the two sons. Matthew has brought Isaiah's tale up to date with the murder of the prophets and even the Lord's son. As with Isaiah's prophecy, Israel would again be devastated, in AD70.

Dei Verbum — The Word of God

In this short document, Dei Verbum succinctly addresses the Catholic Church's beliefs in regards to Sacred Scripture. First and foremost, Sacred Scripture is truly divine revelation; God revealed who He is to us so that we might know Him. "The invisible God...out of abundance of His love speaks to men as friends...and lives among them..., so that He may invite and take them into fellowship with Him." The Word made flesh united deeds and words so that "the deeds wrought by God in the history of salvation manifest and confirm the teaching and realities signified by the words." Jesus Christ was the fullness of revelation and there is no new revelation. What was revealed two thousand years ago was everything. Any further understanding is just that; a further maturity and understanding of God's Truth, but not a new truth. Even though His revelation "totally transcend[s] the understanding of the human mind," God "can be known with certainty from created reality by the light of human reason (see Rom. 1:20)." However, such knowledge is very difficult for man to attain and, as such, very few would attain it and of these, most would have mixed in some serious error. His revelation then is necessary to make "truths which are by their nature accessible to human reason...known by all men with ease, with solid certitude and with no trace of error."

Now, the source of Sacred Scripture is from Christ's commissioning of the Apostles "to preach to all men that Gospel which is the source of all saving truth and moral teaching." The bishops are the successors to the Apostles and were given the authority by them to teach in their place.

This sacred tradition which is handed down "includes everything which contributes toward the holiness of life and increase in faith of the people of God; and so the Church, in her teaching, life and worship, perpetuates and hands on to all generations all that she herself is, all that she believes." The Church is not, however, left alone as some would claim to forge a purely humanistic institution. Instead, she is protected and guided by the Holy Spirit whom Christ sent to the church from her infancy.

From tradition the Sacred Scriptures spring forth —see the various councils defining the canon of the Bible—and, as such, the "task of authentically interpreting the word of God, whether written or handed on, has been entrusted exclusively to the living teaching office of the Church." Importantly, all aspects of this teaching office, including the pope, college of bishops, etc. are not creators of the word of God, but mere servants to it and "teach only what has been handed on, listening to it devoutly, guarding it scrupulously and explaining it faithfully in accord with a divine commission and the help of the Holy Spirit."

Now, "all the preaching of the Church must be nourished and regulated by Sacred Scripture." That being the case, the Sacred Scriptures should be accessible to all the Christian faithful through careful translations and through the liturgy itself. And, "prayer should accompany the reading of Sacred Scripture, so that God and man may talk together; for 'we speak to Him when we pray; we hear Him when we read the divine saying."

Growing Up Catholic

Today is the date for enrolling in next year's preparation for First Holy Communion, after the 11.00 Mass. The programme is one which we have been using for a few years now, and has proved to be popular with families and effective. It is, however quite different from the programmes in use even 10 years ago.

The first difference is that it honours the role of parents in being "the first of teachers of their child in the ways of faith" (*from the Baptism service*). Many parents who were themselves prepared for first Holy Communion fifteen or twenty years before remember little of what they were taught, and it is unreasonable of the Church to expect them to, and yet we ask them to teach their children. Our programme is designed to help parents in this responsibility, and to help parents themselves to grow in their own faith.

The second difference is that the sessions are big community events, where children and parents/carers meet together, and together explore the basic truths of our faith in an atmosphere of fun and discovery.

At every session there are handouts which are worked through, and then taken home, so that the conversation can continue in the coming week after the session.

The title of the programme gives away the underlying thinking: it is to help the children to grow up as Catholic Christians, with a living relationship with Jesus; not simply knowing *about* Jesus, but having a love for him, and understanding of him that is not just based on knowledge, but on a real experience of him in their life.

It is about community; the community of faith which the children are entering in a new way. It is a Christian equivalent of weaning; it is where the children are prepared to be given the solid food; the Bread of Life. It is where they can share in the meal with the grown-ups.

For the parents, it is a time when they can renew their own faith-commitment, as well as a very special time for parent and child to bond in a shared love for Jesus and faith in God.
