# Behold, the Lamb

#### The Baptism of the Lord in St John's Gospel

We do not read from the Gospel of John on the feast of the Baptism of the Lord; this year we are reading St Luke, last year we read St Mark and next year we will read from Matthew. Such is the three-year cycle of the lectionary. Yet although he does not describe the Baptism itself, the account in John is helpful for us in understanding the significance of the event.

The events are told over a three-day period. The first, described in John 1:19-28 makes plain that John is not the Messiah, but that he comes in the prophetic tradition to anounce the coming of the Christ.

Here it is useful to turn to St Luke, who sets this in its historical context. Not only does he tell us that it was in the fifteenth year of Tiberias as Emperor, but that the land was divided, with different rulers in Galilee, Judea, Abilene, Ituraea and Trachonitis. The great kingdom of David lies divided; in ruins, under foreign domination.

"We see no sign, nor is there a prophet; we have no one to tell us how long it will last" (*Psalm 74:9 or 73:9*)

On this first day, John is not only telling the people (and us) that the time is at hand:

"When the fulness of time had come, God sent his Son, born of a woman." (Galatians 4:4)

He is both prophet and herald of the Messiah!

On the second day (John 1:29-34) the expected one, who, on the first had been "among you, but but whom you do not know" (John 1:26) is revealed as Jesus, whom we know to be in the royal descent of David (Luke 3:23-38), and in whom "all things will be gathered up, things in heaven and things on earth" (Ephesians 1:10), not just the Kingdom of David, but the entire universe. He is revealed as "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29). This is the day of the Baptism itself, which John describes only by saying: "I saw the Spirit descend from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him." |(John 1:32).

The third day, (*John 1:35-42*) Jesus is still in the area in which John is baptising, and John points him out again: "Look, here is the Lamb of God" (*John 1:36*), and John is inviting those who are his disciples to become disciples of Jesus. The exchange is interesting:

"Jesus turned and saw them following and said to them, "What are you seeking?" And they said to him, "Rabbi" (which means Teacher), "where are you staying?" 39 He said to them, "Come and you will see." (John 1:38-39)

Jesus asks Andrew: "What are you seeking?", and the reply is not really an answer to the question, but rather as further question: "Where are you staying?". Jesus says: "Come and see."

The third day, then points us to the mission of Jesus, which is a mission to the ends of the earth (*see Acts 1:8*) entrusted to Peter and the other apostles and through them, to the Church down succeeding generations. So it is on the third day that we are introduced to Peter, who is the 'rock' on which the Church will be built. (*See Matthew 16:18*)

The chronology continues in St John, with a fourth day when two more disciples are called, Philip and Nathaniel, and then on the Cana where the first sign is given, and then to Capernaum where he stays with the disciples and Our Lady for a few days. The sign of turning water into wine is important on several levels; at this moment it is sufficient to say that Jesus is in the business of changing things. It is important to keep the connection between this and Baptism. In both cases water is involved, in Baptism the water effects the change, at Cana the water itself is changed. But the change that Jesus really seeks is the change in the life of the disciple, and by the water of Baptism the person becomes a child of God by adoption (see Romans 6:3-4). In the wine of Cana we can also see a foreshadowing of the Last Supper and of the Wine of the Eucharist.

We should not read the three days of John the Baptist in St John's Gospel as linked to the three days in the tomb, but the description of Jesus as the 'Lamb of God' is certainly a link to the Passover Lamb, and, in fact after the stay in Capernaum, the next event in John's Gospel is Jesus visiting Jerusalem for the Passover; the first of three such visits, the last of which was for Holy Week; for his death and resurrection.

The symbolism of Baptism is of death and resurrection. Water has clearly a message of danger, which goes back to the story of Noah and the flood in Genesis chapters 6-9. It also links this danger to sinfulness, and so this death through water is a dying to sin (*see Romans* 6:3-8).

However, it is also the entry into new life. St Peter speaks of this in his first letter, when he says:

In the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight people, were saved through water. And Baptism, which this pre-figured now saves you, not as a removal of dirt from the body but as an appeal to God for a good conscience through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities and powers made subject to him" (1 Peter 3:20-22)

"Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptising" (*John 1:28*) is the very place where Joshua led the Israelites into the promised land (*see Joshua 3:14-17*). Baptism, for us, opens the door to the promised land and life in Christ. It is not yet heaven; and for the Israelites, as for Jesus, and for us, temptations will follow.

# Into the New Year, so far, no new rules!

This last week has seen a vast increase in the rates of infection in Northampton, and the hospital has declared a 'Major Incident', This is clearly not the time to relax our vigilance. Time will tell whether the rules in place for England or those for the devolved nations were the better, and whether the coming week will change the situation. We continue to maintain caution in church through offering sanitiser, mask wearing and operating social distancing, as well as regular cleaning of the church. We are experiencing a greater number of people at the 9am Mass on Sundays, and while this is very welcome, it does present a problem. Please note that the 12 noon Mass is still quite sparsely attended. The additional 12 noon Mass on Sundays continues while we keep social distancing, & good warning will be given about when this will end. The toilets can be used if necessary, but please will users apply sanitiser as necessary.

While we will continue to offer refreshments after the 9am Mass on Sundays and Wednesdays, it is understood that there will be some who would prefer not to come, and although masks should be worn as far as is possible, clearly while eating and drinking this cannot be done. However, please will everyone think of the well-being of others. If you feel unwell, DO NOT COME!

# Scripture Readings 13th January 2019, Baptism of the Lord, Year C

Writing in Babylon about 540 BC, second Isaiah majestically consoles Israel in its exile. God tenderly commands his attendants to comfort Israel and to prepare a sacred way for them to return to Jerusalem. He will lead his people to freedom across the desert in a new Exodus. The coming of God's rule should be announced to the whole world, shouted from the mountain-tops.

The psalm magnificently praises and celebrates God's creative wisdom and power.

Titus worked with Paul and later administered the church in Crete. In this pastoral letter Paul advises Titus on setting up church structures and choosing suitable presbyters for each local church. All Christians, and especially Church leaders, are urged to lead godly lives. We should reveal God's love to others in our good behaviour, while not disrupting the lives of others, in confident expectation of our redemption.

Jesus' baptism begins the period when this promise is fulfilled. Luke's Book of Acts describes his third phase, the beginning of the church.
